The Rotary Club of North Balwyn has lost a much loved and respected member with the passing of Paul Fitz, a man whose life reflected the Rotary ideal of "Service Above Self".

Paul was born on 19th Sept. 1938 and died on Sunday, 15th March 2020, aged 81. He is survived by his wife Sue and three children – Cathie, Louise and Mark – Father-in-law of Rodney, David and Jodie. There are six grandchildren.

Paul grew up in Sydney (Woollahra then Pymble) and attended

Saint Ignatius College, Lane Cove, and St Aloysius College in Kirribilli, followed by studying science at the School of Textiles & Technology in Kensington (later renamed University of New South Wales). He obtained a Bachelor of Science.


It was when travelling overseas that Paul met Sue and coaxed her to follow him back to Australia where they were married.

His entire working life of thirty years was spent with the Australian Wool Bureau in Melbourne – later to become the Australian Wool Corporation, specializing on the technical side, and subsequently responsible for the development and launch of "New Young Wool".

In 1991 when Paul retired from the Australian Wool Corporation, he was General Manager of the Product Marketing Group.

Many of his friends first met when Paul joined North Balwyn Apex Club in 1968 and was a member to 1971, when he was transferred to Sydney with his employment.

There he joined French's Forest Apex Club and was a member from 1971 to 1977. Being transferred back to Melbourne, he rejoined North Balwyn Apex Club until reaching the compulsory retirement age of 40 and was presented with Life Membership.,

On 8th May 1980, Paul became a Charter member of North Balwyn Rotary, and has remained an active member since – two months short of 40 years.

His Classification was Wool Marketing (Retired).


In 1980/81, Paul was Club Sergeant.



In the 1983/84 club year, Paul was Vice President, Club Service Director and Grapevine editor (Paul was responsible for the naming of the club newsletter).

In addition to these duties, Paul chaired the Club's first Fashion Show, held at the Camberwell Civic Centre before a dinner dance crowd of some two hundred guests.

He was Club President in 1985/86; Vice President again in 2002/03; Director of Club Foundation in 2004/05 and Chair of Horizons Committee in 2006/08.



District 9800 recognised his outstanding contribution to the Rotary Foundation with the coveted District Foundation Service Award in 1990. His description of the Foundation as "the engine room of Rotary" will be long remembered.

Paul held the office of District Chairman of ROMAC (Rotary Overseas Medical Aid for Children (its original name) and

subsequently was instrumental in promoting ROMAC throughout Australia, resulting in having ROMAC recognised as a National Rotary Program – one of only three such bodies (Rotary Health Foundation and RAWCS).



He was ROMAC's first Multi-District ROMAC Committee; first National ROMAC Committee Chairman and was presented with Honorary Life Membership of ROMAC in 2004.

His other District offices included District Governor's Group

Representative; GSE Chairman; District Secretary' Humanitarian Grants Committee Chair; Leader of the GSE Team to USA and Canada; and Chairman of the following District committees – Youth Services, International Services, Foundation Committee.



In his spare time, Paul found time to partake of his love of golf, and joined the Kew Golf Club on his return from Sydney. He joined the board of the golf club and was elected as Club Captain for three years, and was responsible for a number of policies being introduced in the long term interests of the members,

Rotary, golf, Kew Golf club, shiraz and the Geelong Football Club numbered amongst his real loves – second only to his love for Sue and his family.

He was true to his belief that if one couldn't say something nice about someone, it was better to say nothing (other than opposing footballers!).

Paul will be long remembered by those close to him for his enormous courage shown during his prolonged illness – illnesses which he bore without complaint.

Someone once said: "Our goal isn't to live forever. Our goal is to create something that will".

On reflection Paul Louis Fitz could be said to have achieved that.

Our Rotary District facilitation process helps a Rotary Club design its own VISION, and then sets out the steps necessary to achieve that vision. The result is not a vision decided by the Rotary District or by Rotary International, it is a vision designed and endorsed by the Club's own members that will help to ensure continuity and consistency in its leadership & programming, to set the stage for future progress.

By starting with the end in mind, successful clubs:

- Sustain and increase membership
- Implement successful service projects
- Support the Rotary Foundation
- Develop leaders in the club and beyond

And develop a long-range plan which creates:

- Continuity of leadership, vision and process
- Consistency in programming
- Consensus, solidarity & unanimity in purpose and action

During the session, a team of approx. 20 Members of the Rotary Club of North Balwyn will review every aspect of the Club's functions and determine the way forward for the Club.

During the coming weeks all Members of the Rotary Club of North Balwyn will be invited to participate in an online survey, which should take between 15 and 20 minutes to complete. This will benchmark your Club as it sits currently. The results of your anonymous survey will be forwarded to Club Co-ordinator, Greg Cribbes prior to your Club Vision session and will provide information of members sentiments into the post session implementation phase.

The information gathered in the survey will serve as a starting point

for the Club Vision facilitation on **Saturday 16th May 2020** at Kew Golf Club which will commence at 9.00am and go for 4 hours. At the end of the 4 hour process the members will have a clear vision of:

- What the Club stands for in its community
- The Club's target membership size in 3 years
- Identification of the Clubs attributes
- Top 3 objectives for each Avenue of Service
- Ways to improve the Club's leadership development
- Understanding of the Club's Leadership Plan

It is anticipated that a good representation of Club Members will volunteer to attend the facilitation session. Once the facilitation is completed, various responsibilities will be allocated and implemented at the Club. Study links air pollution to osteoporosis By Ben Coxworth

Air pollution has long been associated with health problems such as respiratory diseases, and has more recently even been <u>linked to psychotic experiences</u>. New research now reinforces the theory that it may also cause osteoporosis.

For the recent study, scientists from Spain's Barcelona Institute for Global Health (ISGlobal) assessed the outdoor air quality of 28 villages near the Indian city of Hyberabad. They were particularly interested in levels of suspended fine particulate matter and black carbon.

The researchers additionally analyzed the bone health of 3,717 residents *of* those villages. A technology known as dual-energy x-ray absorptiometry was used, to measure bone mass at the lumbar spine and the left hip.

The data was gathered over a four-year period, from 2009 to 2012. During that time, residents also completed questionnaires regarding the type of indoor cooking fuel they used.

It was ultimately found that the villagers' average annual exposure to airborne particles (measuring 2.5 micrometers or less) sat at 32.8 micrograms per cubic meter. This is far above the World Health Organisation's maximum recommended level of 10 micrograms.

Importantly, it was also noted that the higher a village's levels of outdoor air pollution, the lower its residents' bone mineral content and mineral density tended to be. There was no correlation, however, between bone mass and the use of biomass such as wood for cooking fuel.

"This study contributes to the limited and inconclusive literature on air pollution and bone health," says ISGlobal's Dr. Otavio T. Ranzani, first author of a paper on the research. "Inhalation of polluting particles could lead to bone mass loss through the oxidative stress and inflammation caused by air pollution."
