



Club Meeting 20 February

To mark the start of the second stage of our Drought Relief Program in Numurkah, our guest speakers were local dairy farmer Bridget Goulding and Saputo Dairy local manager Brendan Ley.

Bridget talked with passion about her experiences with her husband in building their dairy farm from 1997, living through the millennial drought, the unbundling of water rights from farm ownership and the current drought and water access challenges.

Through her local community connections, Bridget also told us of some of the difficulties for people living and working in the Numurkah area.

Brendan told us about how the corporate players in the dairy industry have changed, and about some of the economic and operational impacts on the industry of this drought.

Some statistics from both speakers were : more than 700 dairy farms around Numurkah have ceased to operate ; 14% of water access rights are now held by non-land-holders ; milk production in the area has halved from 2.7 billion litres pa in the last few years ; and water flows in the Murray River below Wentworth have reduced by 33%.

Greg Cribbes attended the Presidents Elect Training Seminar (PETS) held in Ballarat on the weekend. The Districts support teams provide a great service to clubs by helping incoming presidents learn the ropes and gain new strategies for the new rotary year.

At our February Board Meetings the following points will be of interest to members.....

A review of our 2019_20 Mongolian Cultural Immersion Program recommends we do not conduct the program in 2020_21. Jane is considering other options to replace this activity. The contribution of members involved with the Mongolian program is commended and we thank everyone involved.

The Camberwell Sunday Market allocated the takings from two week's markets to Fire Relief and they have invited us as a contributor to be involved in the decision making of how these funds will distributed. Tony Hart has volunteered to participate.

Nino has planned a **Bunnings Fire Relief BBQ** in May with Bunnings and The Bendigo Bank support.

Greg Matthews is making contact with **East Gippsland Rotary Connections** to see how we may support that community and BlazeAid has published a list of ways everyone can help them reach their short term and long term strategies.

Other Clubs in our District have been, and are planning further, BlazeAid fencing participation, however as we are in the middle of our major fund raising period with the Charity Golf Day and the Grand Prix we are not planning BlazeAid fencing participation at this stage.

The Drought Relief Project continues, and has reached out to the dairy district at Numurkah with strategies learnt from St Arnaud.

Club Visioning. The District offers a Club Visioning Program to help Clubs plan into the future. We have undertaken begin a Visioning Program this year, kicking off in May. All members will be asked for input.

Container to Sri Lanka. JJ and International Director Rowan submitted a business case for the delivery of a 40 foot container of hospital supplies to a Rotary contact of JJ's in Sri Lanka. The proposal has been approved and DIK have been provided a list and they are confident that the requested goods can be supplied. More about this later.

The demise of Holden.

In the last few days, many people have asked me how I felt about the retirement of Holden from the automotive scene.

My answer is simple. I feel very sad, not for myself although I spent nearly 40 years representing General Motors and their various brands – Vauxhall, Bedford, Holden and Isuzu – both as a retailer of these products but also as a member of their respective Dealer Advisory Councils.

But even more personally, I am sad for my late Grandfather, Sydney Albert Cheney.

To explain why, I would like to quote from the book “Big Wheels and Little Wheels”, the autobiography of Mr.L.J. Hartnett – later Sir Lawrence Hartnett - Managing Director of General Motors-Holden’s Ltd from 1934 till 1947 – the year before the first Holden rolled off the assembly line in Salmon Street, Fisherman’s Bend.

Quotes (page 59-61):-

“Whenever I’m asked who founded the Australian motor-body building industry, I have no hesitation in nominating Bert Cheney, the grand old man who is head of S.A.Cheney Pty. Td, the Vauxhall distributors in Melbourne.

“Cheney was a distributor of Dodge cars in Adelaide during the First World War and one of the pioneers of the car-retailing industry in Australia

“.....On 10th August 1917, the Government announced its decision to ban the import of completed cars, but allowed unrestricted import of car chassis.

“The big drawback was that hardly any motor-body –building facilities existed in Australia. A few custom-built bodies were being made, but only by slow and costly methods with hand labour.

“It threw the responsibility on to Australia to create a new industry – an industry that could become one of the biggest employers of labour in the country.

“That morning, (10.8.1917) Cheney went into action. He decided that if the Government would allow the bonnet, scuttle, dash, mudguards, running-board and valences to come in as part of the chassis, the rest of the body, beginning at the dashboard, would be reasonably simple to make.

After one unsuccessful phone call—

“The next phone call was to the saddler, Mr.H. J. Holden. Cheney spoke to Holden’s son, Edward Holden (later Sir Edward Holden) who had recently graduated from Melbourne University.

“Father and son arrived at Cheney’s office promptly at 8.30 am. Cheney, enthusiastic, spoke to them of the chance the Government decision presented to Australia to start a completely new industry”.

End of quotes.

As Australian importer and distributor for Dodge cars, S.A. Cheney guaranteed Edward Holden a minimum of 5,000 Dodge chassis if Holden would agree to switch their saddlery business over to producing car bodies.

The rest is history!

Holden Motor Builders was soon making bodies under contract for all the different makes of chassis imported into Australia. This continued till the depression hit in 1931, and General Motors acquired the controlling shares held by Holdens and thus General Motors-Holden’s was born.

My Grandfather, who died in 1968 at age 85, would turn in his grave had he lived to see the demise of the great Holden name.

Geoff's Health Tips:-**The Evidence is Clear- Coffee is Good for You**

With coffee assuming the mantle of Australia's most popular beverage, you will be pleased to know that a massive review of the scientific literature has found that drinking three to four cups of black coffee a day provides the most health benefits.



The study, recently published in the [British Medical Journal](#) found benefits reducing the risk for such issues as heart disease, multiple sclerosis, type 2 diabetes, liver disease, prostate cancer, Alzheimer's, computer-related back pain and more.

Alzheimer's Disease

Last week I made mention of tea in reducing the risk of dementia, in particular, Alzheimer's disease;

- » there is now evidence that compounds in roasted coffee may be responsible for preventing the build-up of brain plaque believed to cause the disease.

Parkinson's Disease

From a report in the [Archives of Neurology](#), an article from research out of Sweden revealed that:

- ⇒ drinking coffee reduces the risk of Parkinson's Disease even when genetic factors are taken into consideration.

Multiple Sclerosis

Research published in the [Journal of Neurology, Neurosurgery & Psychiatry](#) revealed that drinking at least 4 cups a day:

- ⇒ may help protect against the development and reoccurrence of Multiple Sclerosis.

Type 2 Diabetes

Research on coffee from the [Harvard School of Medicine](#) showed the risk of developing Type 2 Diabetes was lowered by 9% for each daily cup of coffee consumed.
