

Drought relief program commences

THE Rotary Club of North Balwyn's drought relief program in support of the Numurkah district community has officially commenced.

The first, and central, part of the program is the distribution of vouchers for exclusive use at selected local businesses. The vouchers will be distributed through rural financial planners, who received tens of thousands of dollars worth of vouchers last week, to start distributing to clients immediately.

Rotary Club of North Balwyn members Greg Matthews and Geoff Haddy told the *Leader* the club hopes the first vouchers will distributed to those in need in coming weeks.

"Hopefully the vouchers will start getting out to those who need them sooner rather than later, and start providing a bit of relief," he said.

The vouchers can only be used at nine local businesses, selected because they provide essential goods or services such as food, healthcare and petrol.

Where more than one type of a business exists in town, all are selected in order to avoid creating an unfair advantage.

The businesses involved in the program are: Foodworks Numurkah, Ritchies IGA Numurkah, Louis Hamon Amcal Pharmacy, Numurkah Guardian Pharmacy, Meat on Melville, R&B Butchers, Numurkah Home Timber and Hardware, Murray Goulburn Trading Numurkah and McPherson's Numurkah.

Geoff Haddy and Rob Head visited the participating businesses last Wednesday, accompanied by Lorraine Greenwood and Kay Moodie from the Rotary Club of Numurkah, to provide them with the information and resources they will need to facilitate the program. Geoff told the *Leader* that all of the businesses were enthusiastic about their involvement.

"The response from businesses has been terrific since we first approached them, and they are quite excited to get started," he said.

"It's a tried and tested program, so we have a good system for reimbursing participating businesses, and we have made sure they have everything they need."

Gayle Buzza from Numurkah Home Timber and Hardware said the business was pleased to see the program, which they believe is much needed.

"The drought has had a devastating impact on local farmers, and so many good farmers have left the land or are thinking of leaving," she said. "We've been seeing it for a while; customers who used to make quite big purchases are just

buying the minimum they need to get by. "You can see the impact it is having on them

personally, sometimes they will stay and talk for a while because they need to debrief. Support for them is essential, and we are really pleased to be part of a program that will provide that."

At a preliminary information session about the program held in January, chair of the program, Geoff Kneale, told the audience that a number of factors had influenced Numurkah's selection for the program.

"We spoke to farmers and interest groups from across Victoria to see where there was a strong need," he said.

"We were looking for a place that was suffering as a result of the drought but wasn't benefiting from similar programs delivered by other Rotary clubs.

"We were also looking for a place that had a strong Rotary club that could help us deliver the program, because there is no more efficient means for us to get funds and programs into a community than through working with the local Rotary club."

"Through all of that, Numurkah stood out as the best location because there is a very serious need here with the impact on the dairy industry, and that flows on to the rest of the community."

Although a limited number of businesses are involved, an analysis of the program by University of Queensland researchers has shown that money spent at one business will circulate through the local economy five to seven times, as the owners of that business spend money at other local businesses.

Vouchers will be distributed through rural financial counsellors, and will be in denominations of \$50 with an expiry date of March 31, 2021. Although vouchers will only be able to be used at selected businesses, there will be no restriction on what they can be used to purchase in those businesses.

"We believe that the individuals themselves are best placed to determine what they need," Mr Kneale said.

Vouchers are just one element of the program however.

Free events to bring the community together, such as a comedy night and rock legends concert, are also being planned to provide some stress relief to those affected by the drought.



The result is not a vision decided by the Rotary District or by Rotary International, it is a vision designed and endorsed by the Club's own members that will help to ensure continuity and consistency in its leadership & programming, to set the stage for future progress.

By starting with the end in mind, successful clubs:

- Sustain and increase membership
- Implement successful service projects
- Support the Rotary Foundation
- Develop leaders in the club and beyond

And develop a long-range plan which creates;

- Continuity of leadership, vision and process
- Consistency in programming
- Consensus, solidarity & unanimity in purpose and action

During the session, a team of approx. 20 Members of the Rotary Club of North Balwyn will review every aspect of the Club's functions and determine the way forward for the Club.

During the coming weeks all Members of the Rotary Club of North Balwyn will be invited to participate in an online survey, which should take between 15 and 20 minutes to complete. This will benchmark your Club as it sits currently. The results of your anonymous survey will be forwarded to Club Co-ordinator, Greg Cribbes prior to your Club Vision session and will provide information of members sentiments into the post session implementation phase.

The information gathered in the survey will serve as a starting point

for the Club Vision facilitation on **Saturday 16th May 2020** at Kew Golf Club which will commence at 9.00am and go for 4 hours. At the end of the 4 hour process the members will have a clear vision of:

- What the Club stands for in its community
- The Club's target membership size in 3 years
- Identification of the Clubs attributes
- Top 3 objectives for each
 Avenue of Service
- Ways to improve the Club's leadership development
- Understanding of the Club's Leadership Plan

It is anticipated that a good representation of Club Members will volunteer to attend the facilitation session. Once the facilitation is completed, various responsibilities will be allocated and implemented at the Club. The entire membership will be given a summary of the outcomes of the session and the plan will then be implemented in the coming month.

The District Club Vision Facilitation Team is looking forward to assisting the Rotary Club of North Balwyn with this very important facilitation session.

Helicopter drone is made to drop bombs on forest fires By <u>Ben Coxworth</u>

One of the good things about drones is the fact that they can safely be flown in conditions that would prove hazardous for crewed aircraft. That's where the JC260 unmanned helicopter comes in, as it's designed to fight forest fires.

Created by Chinese manufacturer QilingUAV, the JC260 can be equipped with two of the company's retardant-filled "fire extinguishing bombs." Dropped separately or in unison, each of the bombs can reportedly cover a flaming forest area of 50 cubic meters (1,766 cu ft).

Lift is provided by two sets of counter-rotating rotor blades, measuring 3.6 m (11.8 ft) in diameter. These are powered by two 34-hp water-cooled gasoline engines, taking the aircraft to a claimed cruising speed of 100 km/h (62 mph). One tank of gas should be good for a flight time of three to four hours.

A ground-based operator remotely pilots the drone in real time, based on output from its onboard cameras. A simple one-click system on the remote is used to drop the bombs.

The copter measures 2.8 m (9.2 ft) in length, and tips the scales at 260 kg (573 lb) – bombs included.

And as a side note, we've previously seen a drone designed to <u>assess forest fires</u>, and even a flame-throwing drone attachment that <u>causes controlled burns</u> in order to prevent actual forest fires.

Brazen fox demands top prize in animal photography competition By Rich Haridy

Amateur photographer Roger Cox has won the top prize in the UK Mammal Society's annual photo contest. The extraordinary image of an urban fox staring down the lens is just one of several superb shots in this small but impressive animal photography competition.

The Mammal Society is a London-based charity dedicated to science-led mammal conservation. Its annual photo contest may be small, with entries in the hundreds, but the quality of this year's celebrated submissions is strong.

"Entries were varied and include small mammals in the captive environment to larger mammals found in our seas and oceans, as well as species that were encountered during vital research projects together with those trying to eke out a living alongside our busy lives," says Brett Lewis, this year's head judge.

Lewis says this year's overall winner is the kind of photo that gets overlooked in other competitions. It may not be technically perfect but it certainly captures a thrilling and unique moment between an animal and a human, in an urban environment.

"This animal often foraged for the wild cherries that fell from the trees and landed in the wells between the bonnets and windscreens of parked cars," explains winning photographer Roger Cox. "It was also used to getting food from people who threw food out of their car windows at night during the early hours. I took this picture ... when it jumped up on my car to investigate if there was anything of interest for it, as I'd seen it do several times before."

Another highlight in the contest is the winner of the Elusive Animal category. Photographer Dan Lettice captured this beautiful shot of a dolphin in mid-air off the coast of West Cork, Ireland. Ecologist and judge Roo Campbell suggests the perfectly timed snap shows impressive photographic skill.

"Obtaining clear photos of dolphins above water isn't easy," says Campbell. "Dan Lettice's Breaching Common Dolphin, poised mid-air almost as if it had been swimming above the waves all along, is a fantastic shot allowing a rare view of this handsome species."
