Ray's career started with Melbourne University Blacks and progressed to Hawthorn. He won Best and Fairest in 1966 and played in the 1971 Grand Final, winning against St Kilda by 4 points. Back in the rooms coach John Kennedy words were "Fellas, I want you to think of the 20 players next door"

In a talk covering coaches, players, umpires officials and fans, Ray captivated his audience. He related an anecdote of John Kennedy's difficulty in scoring goals against a country team. The first kick looked good but was awarded a point. The second received the same treatment and the third surely went through the middle and was finally questioned. The reply came back "It's hard to score a goal up here "

Ray finished his talk with a video of his grandson, the ultimate fan of Cyril Rioli, with eyes shining with enthusiasm for this wonderful game of ours.

Forget Milk Chocolate You must have Dark!

The results of a trial published in the *NeuroRegulation* Journal, revealed that eating high cocoa strength chocolate increased brain activity in a dose dependant way. That is the more you ate the better, within reason, as increasing sugar levels increased obesity.

- Brain images of 122 undergraduate students attending Northern Arizona University were taken, before eating chocolate, then five minutes and 60 minutes after eating chocolate.
- Results showed that eating high cocoa content chocolate 70% cacoa made the brain more alert and attentive.
- * The authors noted that there was a slight increase in blood pressure for a short time, but over a two week period, cocoa led to significant decreases in systolic and diastolic pressure that translated to a 20% reduction in strokes, and a 10% reduction in coronary heart disease.
- New research showed from two studies being presented at the Experimental Biology 2018 annual meeting in San Diego that consuming dark chocolate that has a high concentration of cacao (minimally 70% cacao, 30% organic cane sugar) has positive effects on stress levels, inflammation, mood, memory and immunity.
- * The authors noted that regular milk chocolate, high in sugar and milk powder, did not produce the same effect.

Mongolian Cultural Immersion program

On January 5th a contingent of 8 Mongolian students and 3 female chaperones arrive for a two week stay, departing January 20th. We are seeking home hosts for students and chaperones. Chaperones may be home hosted singly but Rotary International decrees students <u>MUST be hosted in pairs</u>. There are four boys and four girls in the group.

The students range in age from 12 - 17 years. The 12 year old boy is the grandson of the contingent leader, Byamba Chultem, who is very experienced in working with young people travelling internationally. Her grandson will be hosted with one of the older students. The ages of the other students range from 14 - 17 years.

The Youth Committee has planned a program comprising day activities, a bus tour along the Great Ocean Road and free time for host families to choose daily activities. The Melbourne students we took to Mongolia in July are invited to join the Mongolian students in all activities.

All members of the host family over the age of 18 years are required to have a Working With Children's Check.

Day activities will include catering for lunches or evening meals. Assistance with catering will also be required. It is another opportunity for RCNB members to meet and interact with the Mongolian group.

The visit by the Mongolian group in January 2018 was very successful with RCNB members contributing where they felt able to.

Is the NBN going to be overtaken before it's completed?

Amazon is moving forward with a plan to launch thousands of satellites into space in order to bring reliable broadband internet service to rural areas across the globe.

Amazon subsidiary Kuiper Systems has applied to the United States Federal Communications Commission (FCC) to launch more than 3,000 satellites into space under the name Project Kuiper.

The application states, "The effective implementation of global broadband services requires



more than the design, construction, and deployment of the technologically advanced satellite system, low-cost customer terminals, and gateways. It also requires worldwide terrestrial network infrastructure and customer operations capabilities."

"The Kuiper system will help bridge gaps in coverage by complementing the efforts of terrestrial fixed and mobile careers and reaching some of the most remote and hard-to-reach areas - where it is often geographically difficult of cost-prohibitive for terrestrial service providers to operate to-day."

Kuiper Systems Chief Executive Officer is Rajeev Badyal — SpaceX's former vice president. Interestingly enough, SpaceX launched 60 satellites into orbit on 23 May 2019. Their satellites are also intended to provide internet service worldwide.

The name of SpaceX's project is Starlink — and they are cleared to launch a total of 11,943 satellites. Chief Executive Officer Elon Musk says the plan is to launch 60 satellites at a time. He predicts they will achieve global coverage after 24 launches.



It would appear that these companies are involved in a satellite space race.

Amazon Chief Executive Officer Jeff Bezos said the internet satellites are a long-term project. For engineers, the project presents an incredible opportunity

While astronomers are worried that more satellites in space may begin obscuring some of the star systems they study, educators that do not have their eyes on the skies are thinking an interconnected world means more opportunities for education and training.

With more people connected to the internet globally, the chance for online education and training will naturally follow. Those in rural areas who cannot afford to move to a city for university could benefit from earning tertiary degrees through online means. Low-cost communication technologies and low-cost internet service provided by satellites could transform multiple careers around the world.

Items requested are Toiletries, non-perishable food and failing this, cash donations are always welcome!


Last year members asked local pharmacies and businesses for samples which was well received.
