I don't believe that children will be disadvantaged in the long run by this time of unprecedented schooling. So long as they stay connected with their school and keep their hand in with their learning just a bit, it will all be ok.

It was a great privilege to have some of you in our street on ANZAC Day at 11 am to hear our boys play Amazing Grace on their bagpipes. This was an initiative proposed by the Victorian Pipe Band Association in lieu of the piping for the march which they usually do on that day.

Malaria Awareness Day

30 APRIL 2020

Zero Malaria Starts With Me



Led by the RBM Partnership to End Malaria, World Malaria Day is observed on **25 April** each year to raise awareness of the global burden of malaria, a preventable and treatable disease that puts **half the world** at risk and kills a child **every two minutes**. In 2018, these investments saved almost **600,000 lives** and prevented nearly **100 million malaria cases** compared to 2000 levels. Globally, in 2018, an estimated **1,109 deaths** occurred daily as a result of malaria infections. Of 1,109 deaths, an estimated **67%** were children **under five years**. The global theme for World Malaria Day, **'Zero Malaria Starts with Me'**, emphasizes everyone's power and responsibility – no matter where they live – to ensure no one dies from a mosquito bite.

The global theme for World Malaria Day, 'Zero Malaria Starts with Me', emphasizes everyone's power and responsibility – no matter where they live – to ensure no one dies from a mosquito bite.

We want to raise awareness of the fact that malaria is preventable, and that early diagnosis and treatment are critical to saving lives and reducing human suffering. In 2018, an estimated 228 million people were infected with malaria, worldwide. In that year, there was an estimated 405,000 deaths with 1,109 deaths per day and 67% of deaths were among children under 5 years of age.

DROUGHT RELIEF PROGRAM

St Arnaud

- The current St Arnaud voucher program is drawing to a close. Today is the last day shopkeepers in St Arnaud can accept vouchers. It will be another two or three weeks (after they send us invoices) until will we know the final dollar figures but to date we have paid out \$32,450 on the \$50 vouchers distributed via the Rural Financial Counsellors. Last week Geoff Kneale reported on the fantastic feedback and gratitude from recipients.
- The next step for St Arnaud will be a review by the DRP Committee in conjunction with the RC St Arnaud and the senior RFC. We will seek an understanding of ongoing needs in the St Arnaud area and the extent to which recent welcome rains have eased the long term drought.

Numurkah

- The Numurkah voucher program is now underway, with its first full month concluding today.
- On the mental wellness objectives no plans are in place as yet for any community events, nor will there be until we emerge from the Virus situation.
- However, we previously reported on the substantial quantity of L'Oréal hair products donated for use at Numurkah. Numurkah RC were very keen to get these into the hands of schools and school children before Mothers' Day as gifts for local mothers. I met with Numurkah's President Lorraine today in Nagambie for a handover of more than 100 boxes each with a dozen or more items. As an amusing aside, I did not have to use my 'get out of jail' card, being a signed authority by a Numurka Police Sergeant saying I was authorised to stray from my home.




