MEETING REPORT

Our Guest Speaker, Alister Boyd, is the Grains Manager for the VFF, a rural association with 6000 members, and provided us with very interesting insights into the world of agriculture in Victoria.

Alister talked about:

- There are many challenges facing farmers today. These include rising Port charges, stock theft, financial viability of grain trading businesses, limits to services proved by rural councils, Glyphosate usage and the capacity of rural infrastructure to handle current transport needs.
- The need for farms today to be run as business operations, and for farmers to become drought-ready as our climate patterns change.
- * The gap between urban and rural areas in the understanding of life in farming and rural communities, together with media and education opportunities through VFF and others to 'bridge' this gap.

Alister also answered our many questions in an open and constructive manner, which added to our learning's about our rural communities.

CLUB GUESTS FROM ST ARNAUD

It was great to also have as our guests at this meeting Russell Steel [pictured right], Secretary of the St Arnaud Rotary Club, and Colin Coates [pictured below right], VFF director and property owner in St Arnaud. Both involved in our Drought Relief Project.

Both spoke briefly to the meeting, with Russell providing an insight into the situation of a farmer who on average has a \$5million asset vitally dependent on the weather, and Colin thanking the Club for its interest in and support for their community.

An example of challenges facing the area was cited by Russell from the local newspaper, stating.. "Farmers are reporting worst harvest in 40 years but due to being defined by lines on a map rather than the fact they have had virtually no rainfall, these communities are not eligible for support from government".

Russell and Colin made the trip from and back to St Arnaud just for our meeting, and we greatly enjoyed the opportunity for the Club to meet them both.

Continuing on from last week....

The conversation I had at Wellington Airport with Pam, whose role in Christchurch is head of the department delivering victim support services training, turned to the shock it bought to the New Zealand community.

The response by the New Zealand community in support of the Muslim Community has been outstanding and continues at all levels. What has been particularly outstanding is the events that secondary and university students have organised.

Pam and I exchanged the poignant moments we had experienced as the horror of the events unfolded.

The first for me was a gentleman in a wheelchair who had fled from the Al Noor Mosque and was being interviewed by a reporter. Farid Ahmed had seen friends shot and feared for many more of his friends and relatives. Farid was composed while answering the reporter's questions.

This composure was again evident with a worshipper covered in the blood of a friend he helped from the Mosque.

Perhaps one of the greatest examples of grace and personal strength was exhibited by Salwa Mustafa in several interviews.

Khaled Mustafa and his family thought they had found safety in New Zealand after fleeing the bloody chaos of Syria only a few months ago. Khaled, 44, and his two sons, Hamza, 16, and Zaid, 13, were praying at the Deans Ave mosque when the shooting began. Khaled's wife Salwa, received a call from 16 year old Hamza shortly after the shootings started.

He said 'Mum, there's someone come into the mosque and he's shooting us' and he was running with his brother who had been shot in his leg. After that I heard shooting and he screamed and after that I didn't hear him. "I called Hamza, Hamza, and I can hear his little voice and after that it

"His phone was on, but I couldn't talk to him, after that someone picked up the phone and told me your son can't breathe, I think he's dead."

Meanwhile her husband was dead, with gunshot wounds.

"Our lives have completely changed," Salwa said from Christchurch Hospital where Zaid recovers from two gunshot wounds.

She said she did not feel anything for the alleged gunman.

"God will punish him, my son and my husband are in heaven now and we're going after them, we're going to follow them to the heavens."

Farid's wife was shot dead in the back after leading a group of children to safety, returning to the mosque to check on Farid because he was wheelchair bound, Despite the horror, Ahmed — originally from Bangladesh — still considers New Zealand a great country.

"I believe that some people, purposely, they are trying to break down the harmony we have in New Zealand with the diversity. But they are not going to win. We will be harmonious."


The way the Muslim Community have responded to this most horrendous event

has been nothing but exemplarily. Positive, well articulated responses in interviews, grace and composure without bitterness, has generated in a new perception of Muslim's, replacing previously held norms in New Zealand.

Pam and I both agreed that out of this adversity, barriers have been removed and the Muslim population has become more understood and therefore more accepted.









Geoff's Health Tip

Vitamin C is one Vitamin I find essential

Fortunately, we have people on our planet that set themselves apart from everyone else, in their ability to make observations of the cause and effect of changing circumstances.

One such person was James Lind, a Scottish naval surgeon, who in 1747 discovered that a nutrient in oranges or limes (now known to be Vitamin C) prevented scurvy. Another was Dr Tadeusz Reichstein of the Swiss Institute of Technology who observed that dogs, and most other animals (when stressed), can produce their own Vitamin C. Unfortunately, this ability is not available to humans, most primates, fish and some birds.

Of all Vitamins, Vitamin C is the most widely sold, and for several good reasons:

- We were first made aware that Vitamin C was 'good for preventing colds, or at least reducing their severity,' and I can personally attest to that.
- It has since been discovered that Vitamin C is a potent antioxidant with increasingly diverse uses in disease prevention and providing support to the immune system, thus promoting healthy ageing.
- As an antioxidant, Vitamin C has been shown to prevent endothelial dysfunction (vascular thickening).
- * Vitamin C also alters fatty acid profiles and coagulation factors to prevent strokes and there is evidence that Vitamin C reduces cellular DNA damage, the first step in cancer initiation.
- Research shows Vitamin C is essential for the growth and repair of our body's cellular tissue.
- Vitamin C helps heal wounds and repair and maintain healthy bones, teeth, skin and cartilage.

My observation, based on taking **Vitamin C powder** for more than 35 years, shows it is important to take sufficient - half a teaspoon of Vitamin C powder dissolved in orange juice is a minimum ((half a teaspoon is equivalent to drinking the juice of 30 oranges).

Can you take too much? Yes, you can, and you will most likely get diarrhoea the next day. All this means is that you should reduce the dose for the next few days.



Is the Entertainment Guide good value?



People have said, "What's the catch?" There is none. The book is the real deal.

Businesses offer discounts because they get the benefits of advertising. Often, they participate to support their local community.

As for the Entertainment Book, it earns money through the sale of books and digital memberships. Its key selling point is that it only distributes through charities.

The secret to making use of the book is to use it. I find many people feel pressured into buying a book to support a charity, and then are too embarrassed to redeem – or they forget.

For some people there is a social stigma to presenting a voucher, especially in front of other people.

My experience of using the vouchers is positive, and the new digital membership app makes it easier to use (plus I never forget it as it is on my phone).

A discount is only a bargain if you are spending money on something you need or want; it can be easy to fall into the trap of going after deals just to make a saving.

My tips for maximising savings with an Entertainment Book membership:
