
North Balwyn Rotary Club 40th Birthday Celebrations

The birth of The Rotary Club of North Balwyn

In the latter half of the 1978-79 Rotary year the Board of the Rotary Club of Balwyn identified the opportunity to sponsor two new Clubs in the area. The then President the Late Trevor Penry approached the Late Jack Nankervis District Governor Elect with the proposal to establish the Rotary Club of North Balwyn and the Rotary Club of Ashburton.

Upon taking office as DG Jack appointed the Late Past President Duncan McKenzie of the Balwyn Club as his Special Representative to undertake the establishment of the Rotary Club of North Balwyn.

An interest meeting attended by approx 40 prospective members was held on Thursday 10th April 1980 followed by an Organisational Meeting on Thursday 24th April attended by 33 prospective members at which it was decided to apply to Rotary International to Charter the Rotary Club of North Balwyn.

The first Meeting of the Provisional Rotary Club of North Balwyn was held at the Marwal Ave Senior Citizens Club on Thursday 1st of May 1980 chaired by Charter President Stan Hibbert at which the Guest Speaker was Ron Tudor of Fable Records.

The signed Charter was received on Thursday 8th May 1980 less than one month after the first interest meeting. At this time "Provisional" was dropped from the Club Title and we were up and running with 31 Charter Members most of whom were unknown to each other and all but one with no Rotary experience.

A formal Charter Presentation Night was held at Camberwell Civic Centre on Thursday 29th May 1980 attended by 27 of the Charter Members many accompanied by their wives who were welcomed by DG Jack his wife Marj and Charter President Stan and his wife Bev.

The Club Charter Night was attended by representatives of 44 of the then 51 Clubs in District 980,as it was then known. A very formal occasion at which various clubs made presentations to the new Club of items including the Sergeants gong and gavel, rostrum, flags ,banners and suchlike. In an attempt to break down the formality a friend of Stan's the President of another Club presented him with a bottle of White Crow tomato sauce.

The Rotary International President was James L Bomar whose Theme was "Let Rotary Light the Way"

President Stan adopted his own theme of "Fellowship through Communication" and in addressing the members said

"Fellowship in our first year is most important, for therein lies our strength, getting to know each other along with our families will not only make our Club life more enjoyable, but will assist us to enjoy our participation in SERVICE PROJECTS"

Rotary in 1980 was very different from today.

Membership was by invitation from an existing Rotarian.

Membership was available to males only.

It was limited to one person from each Business Operation or Profession through the allocation of a Classification.

Meetings commenced with a Rotary Invocation, the singing of the National Anthem and a Toast to The Queen of Australia.

Insignia of Office was worn throughout the meeting by the President and Sergeant.

Our original meetings were alcohol free. This changed when we moved to The Sentimental Bloke Hotel.

Weekly meeting attendance was expected or a Makeup required which necessitated attendance at another Club's Meeting within 7 days of the missed home Club meeting.

Our early years were spent undertaking many projects involving all avenues of Rotary Service: Community, Youth, International and Club always ensuring that there was a fellowship aspect in each one:-

We held car rallies, picnics, progressive dinners, pool parties, took children from Yooralla on outings, supported charities such as Edar (Eastern District Association for the Disabled) with their fundraising fete and white elephant stalls, organised community health checks for blood pressure, diabetes and xrays for tuberculosis, conducted student career counselling sessions, promoted an essay writing competition for many years at Greythorn High School, engaged in fundraising activities including fashion parades, an art exhibition, catering and car parking activities for the Doncaster Aeromodeler's Club, purchasing aluminium cans from the public and reselling to Alcoa as part of the cash-a-can program. Not all of these were financially successful I recall excess food being auctioned off to the public following a cold wet day at the aeromodeler's day. We planted and nurtured trees along the south side of the newly constructed Eastern Freeway only to find that after about 2 years growth the Council lawn mowing crew not only cut the grass but also our beloved tree, we assisted in the Macedon area with the cleanup following the Ash Wednesday bushfires, this lead to a special relationship for many years with the Rotary Club of Gisborne.

We became involved in Youth Exchange hosting Menami Condo from Japan and Koichi Hara the following year also from Japan and sending Liz Roy, Janice Alexander and Jenny Hunter to Japan in our first 3 years of existence.

This resulted in the recruitment of two exceptional members who served the Club for many years, Ron Roy, the father of Liz and the Late Max Hunter, Jenny's father.

These and many other activities undertaken provided the basis for the Fellowship for which this Club is known which in turn has enabled the Club to achieve so much in the past 40 years.

Our early meetings were held at Marwal Ave Senior Citizens Club where we set up the meeting room each night, prepared and served the meals, waited on tables, cleared up and washed dishes following the meal and replaced tables chairs etc and vacuumed the hall following the meeting. On many occasions when visitors arrived unannounced a member was despatched to the Lemon Grass Chicken Shop to purchase additional food to serve.

In these early days when we had come together as strangers, knowing very little about one another there were challenges to be overcome one of the most difficult to my mind being the task of Sergeant undertaken so ably by the Late Paul Fitz who each week managed to entertain us all with fines despite not having any depth of knowledge about his victims. One of Paul's habits was to, every week, levy a 20 cent fine on a particular member who had a reputation for being rather thrifty.

We all came from diverse backgrounds but through our Fellowship and Service activities soon got to know one another and formed firm friendships. In the first year there were 5 new members inducted into the Club and unfortunately one resignation.

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The practice of undertaking Makeups was also stringently required as District kept and published attendance records of each club on a monthly basis and there was great competition to achieve 100% attendance.

Makeups could be an interesting experience providing the opportunity to meet other Rotarians, see how other Clubs operated and learn of various projects. I well remember some of my experiences firstly being in Hong Kong in 1981 and attending a Meeting of the Hong Kong East Rotary Club where as a visitor I was made most welcome and with other visitors invited to sit at the President's Table and along with the other guests to introduce myself and speak about my Club. At the conclusion of the introductions the President then advised the guests that they may have difficulty following the meeting proceedings as the Club was a Mandarin speaking Club. Thus the next hour was somewhat wasted.

On another occasion visiting the Rotary Club of London at their lunch meeting being rather surprised at being seated at the same table with Mr lain Duncan Smith the Leader of Her Majesty's Opposition in The House of Commons who was also a visitor at that meeting.

Rotary Membership can provide some unusual and memorable experiences.

Over the past 40 years Rotary has been responsible for numerous different experiences and has been an integral part of my life, always involving my wife Pat and originally involving our children. We have made many lifelong friends through our membership of this great Club and I am extremely grateful to have been invited to be a Charter Member of the Rotary Club of North Balwyn.

Duncan McKenzie had the task to form a brand new club, North Balwyn was its name for North Balwyn was its hub.

The Charter date in 1980 was Thursday eighth of May, There were 32 members in our Club who started that first day With Stan Hibbert as Charter President, only four remain today, But so much has been accomplished in four decades on the way. To try and do true justice and cover what we've done Is really nigh impossible but my challenge has begun.

What is it that's made the Rotary Club of North Balwyn last this long? What's its essence, what makes it continue to offer service strong? The answer is a mix of people who share like-minded goals, Who share a sense of fellowship and who take on different roles, Whether serving the community within Australia's shores Or using our Rotary membership for international cause.

Today, on this our birthday, let's look at some highlights
That stand out in our history, over many days and nights.
We have had three District Governors whose Conferences we ran
In Adelaide, Melbourne, Launceston, so shone the North Balwyn clan.
Ross, Reddish and Studebaker, our DG's who went full steam
While Cheney, Hibbert and Matthews, they chaired each Conference team.

We've had many outstanding members, too many for this roll call, But Ron Carnell is one to mention, his legend still stands tall. He was named 'Rotarian of the Millenium,' was Secretary, ten years, He ran our Rotary radio and, with Betty, earned our cheers. After strong debate within the Club regarding female membership Maria Moffat became our first, and our numbers didn't dip.

It should be noted, as a fact, that President Tom Wing Young Earlier inducted a female member, whose background was far-flung. Though massive in her stature, Suzy Wong, in truth Clive Hughes, Had Glen Walmsley playing Sum Ting Wong, what a wife to choose! But when it comes to dressing up, Judy Reddish was fantastic, Her Lily Marlene was just one hit, her face was quite elastic.



At our 21st birthday celebration 'The Village People' sang, To see that group perform with skill, the acclamation rang, And then, of course, at Christmas time you'll hear our members singing Although 'Twelve Days of Christmas' sees some members' hands a-ringing.

Annual golf and fellowship trips, early days preferred Rich River, Since then our President Elect decides, with scant regard for liver. In early days a fashion parade took place through one Ron Liner Who told most everyone he met, 'There is no painter finer.' When Paint Your Heart Out Melbourne happened in nineteen ninety-two Ron jumped at the chance to help organise and show what he could do.



Police Mentoring in recent years has been a job worthwhile, Building skills and a relationship leaving everyone to smile.

Some community service activities that we have come to master Revolve around bushfires and drought, and even flood disaster. Special thanks to those who've worked at Ash Wednesday and Benalla, In Gisborne, Grampians and so much more, no mention of Walhalla. Only last year 'twas in St Arnaud we held a comedy night To raise morale for the farmers there in their drought affected plight.

From donating blood, Red Shield appeal and a house for Anglicare, Eva Tilley, Boroondara Family and the River Ride to share, Variety, Servants, Second Bite plus our garden project shine, Through Ted it's been Carols in the Park since nineteen eighty nine. While at Axedale, east of Bendigo, Ken Maxfield came to play And so inspired a project grand ... we love Camp Getaway

Ian Mollo has us playing bowls, now next to our Men's Shed, What a monumental task that was but now full steam ahead.

We've gone to Vanuatu to help build an eye clinic And work done in the Solomon's should quell the fiercest cynic Sue McDonald's skills in midwifery have been used in Timor Leste While Bill Oakley, famous for his jam, his work with RAM's the best. ROMAC also served so well through Paul when he was fit, While Oleg and his tractor was a one-off Robson hit.

We've supported The Rotary Foundation, Vietnam's now our focus, Through Matching Grants so much achieved, no hint of hocus pocus. We're funding a PhD Scholar in our mental illness fight Through ARH's 'Lift The Lid' research, looking for the light.

We've encouraged senior students to explore their love of science And through MUNA we have given some the chance to end their silence. A great program for young leaders, RYLA simply is the best While RYPEN gives a lift to those who seem unsteadiest.



We Do Have Something to Learn from Bats

Since the COVID-19 pandemic began, bats have been slandered on social media, targeted for culling's and looked upon as vermin, pillaging ripening fruit from backyard fruit trees. From a young age I remember I was fearful of this unusual flying mammal, in fact the only mammal that can fly.

Not so long ago a Queensland horse trainer died along with 13 of his horses from an infection caused by the Hendra virus, believed to be carried by bats. There have been several other cases in northern NSW, all related to infection originating from bats.

Bats are known to carry many deadly pathogens including Ebola, Hendra and the Corona viruses, but the question remains, how are they immune to these deadly diseases and rarely if ever fall ill or at least show symptoms?

Researchers in many countries are studying the remarkable resilience that bats have to disease - a relationship that may produce some novel therapies to shore up our own antiviral defenses.

Michelle Baker, a bat immunologist at CSIRO says, "when humans and other mammals, detect a viral invader they'll battle it with inflammation, a wildfire-like weapon that helps purge the invader from the body, but can also wreak havoc on the host's own tissues. Bats, on the other hand, are able to damp down these risky responses."

"On top of this, laboratory experiments suggest that bat's bodies may continuously churn out powerful proteins that instruct cells to block parts of the viral life cycle to keep invaders away without causing unnecessary harm to their own bodies."

"When bat viruses do make the hop to humans, it's almost always because people have encroached into the territory of animals. We are driving these species to the edge of their ability to survive, driving them into new environments and causing them undue stress. This in turn increases the likelihood that they'll shed pathogens into their surroundings."

We know that in recent decades human interactions with wild species have escalated to an unprecedented degree as urban areas continue unabated and the global wildlife trade, including the sale of exotic luxury meats, booms in the Asian markets.

Raina Plowright, a disease ecologist at Montana State University says, " it's important to note that when a pathogen does cross the species divide from animal to human, bats are almost never to blame - there is almost always an intermediary host, in the Covid-19 case, believed to be a pangolin."

You also finally got to taste like your own cake! Home made with love, just for you. You are my motivation to cook and bake!


