


Our Leadership





Important updates about Rotary Youth Exchange in 2020-21

The RI Board of Directors made an important decision about Rotary Youth Exchange in 2020-21 after reviewing a thorough risk assessment and carefully considering COVID-19 conditions around the world.

Although COVID-19 still causes uncertainty globally, especially because of the risk of infection, changing international travel restrictions, and school delays and closures, some regions may be able to host exchanges safely later this Rotary year. Where districts decide it is safe, short-term exchanges can resume in October 2020 and long-term exchanges can resume in January 2021, provided districts implement specific safety requirements outlined in the RI Board's April decision.

After reviewing the requirements, it is up to districts to determine whether they can proceed with Rotary Youth Exchange programs in accordance with the new safety guidelines. If your district is concerned, the best option may be to suspend the program temporarily and consider other ways to engage young people this year, such as facilitating virtual exchanges or getting students involved with Interact or RYLA. If your district is considering moving forward with the program, it will be important to consider the risks, create a comprehensive crisis management plan, and have volunteers who can commit more time to communicating with students and families, monitoring recommendations from health authorities, and acting quickly if the situation changes.

Coronavirus update for Victoria

Victoria has recorded 216 new cases of coronavirus since yesterday, with the total number of cases now at 3560.

The overall total has increased by 181, after 35 cases were reclassified - largely due to duplication.

Within Victoria, 30 of the new cases are linked to outbreaks and 186 are under investigation. No cases have been detected in returned travellers in hotel guarantine.

There has been one death reported since yesterday, with a man in his 90s passing away in hospital overnight. To date, 23 people have died from coronavirus in Victoria.

- 535 cases may indicate community transmission
- 1249 cases are currently active in Victoria
- · 49 cases of coronavirus are in hospital, including 15 in intensive care
- 2286 people have recovered from the virus
- Of the total cases, 3176 cases are from metropolitan Melbourne, while 279 are from regional Victoria
- · Total cases include 1876 men and 1659 women
- More than 1,095,000 tests have been processed to date

Stage 3 "Stay at Home" restrictions are in force across metropolitan Melbourne and the Mitchell Shire.

"These restrictions have become necessary because of the sharp increase in cases," said Victoria's Chief Health Officer Brett Sutton.

"If you live in these areas, there'll be only four reasons to leave your home: shopping for food and essential items; care and caregiving; daily exercise; and work and study, if you can't do it from home.

"Restaurants and cafes will return to takeaway and delivery services only, and beauty and personal services will need to close. Entertainment and cultural venues will need to close. Community sport will also stop.

"This Stay at Home direction will apply to your principal place of residence – which means you need to stay home and not use a holiday home.

"These are tough measures, but this virus is not selective - it will impact anyone it encounters, and personal contact is the clear source of its transmission. We need everyone to do their part and ensure it is stopped in its tracks."

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Volunteering at Eva Tilley

The Eva Tilley Memorial Home, which provides residential aged care in North Balwyn, is seeking volunteers for the facility's in-house kiosk. Eva Tilley is a community based and community owned not-for-profit facility, which has been supported by Rotary over many years. RC North Balwyn's Gardening Program is a good example.

The Rotary Clubs of Balwyn and North Balwyn are represented on the Board of Eva Tilley (Clarke Ballard and Tony Wells) and support for the proposed volunteering program is being canvassed with other Rotary Clubs in the Eastside Cluster to determine interest in sharing the workload. Participants would be part of a large team.

The kiosk at Eva Tilley normally opens each weekday between 10am and 3.30 pm and is operated basically by a single person. However the details are flexible and open for discussion – options might be to share shifts or split them into morning and afternoon sessions.



The kiosk is located in a central open space at Eva Tilley and provides a basic service, including beverages and food, available for purchase. Preparing coffee is part of the role and training can be provided for those who have not used a coffee machine.

Participants would need to register as an Eva Tilley volunteer and undertake an induction program. There would also be a requirement for a police check and flu immunisation.

Those who might participate extends to Rotarians, our husbands, wives or partners and other friends of Rotary.

To be effective the program would require list of willing volunteers committed to the program and a coordinator to develop a roster and ensure continuity. It is suggested we might consider taking responsibility for operating the kiosk on one, or perhaps two days per week.

Rotary's support for Eva Tilley reflects one aspect of community service in our area and the RCNB Board believes the request from Eva Tilley is a "good-fit" for our service program and well worth consideration and implementation.
