#### President's Report 2018-2019

### **Lesley McCarthy**

This has been another very successful year with a number of successful projects, event and activities undertaken by the club.

We conducted several Club Forums during the year, encouraging and enabling members to have a say; participate in debate and discussions, and agree on changes to the club and our operations.

This included changes to our Constitution and By Laws in line with the recent Rotary International changes and also changes to meeting regularity, meeting times and location.



We also had the long drawn out and deep debate regarding the formal change of name. This was affected at the November Annual General Meeting and took effect on 1st January 2019.

With the significant change in our fundraising from BBQs to revenue from the two Opportunity Shops, we have modified how we manage and use our funds. The Op Shops are also a highly visible presence in the community enabling greater public relations, a community connection and a focal point.

We have continued to be active within the local community with increased focus on local rather than international projects; youth and educational activities.

The Rotary Overseas Recycled program {RORP} has taken off in force this year and with the Memorandum of Understanding signed with the Rotary Club of Columbo, we have extracted a large number of playgrounds and transported another container to Sri Lanka.

The piece de resistance for the year though must surely be the Flem Ken Festival of Arts & Ideas which found members working throughout the month of October on an event which, like Topsy, just "grew". From an initial thought of an art Show, we presented and oversaw over 100 events and activities held at numerous venues through the Racecourse Road surrounds and Kensington Town Hall. With sponsorship from the Moonee Valley Council and a number of commercial enterprises, this project incorporated all areas of The Arts and entertained 1000's of residents from far and wide.

#### VALE.

On September 29<sup>th</sup>, our dear friend Vance Hilton passed to Higher Service.

As a Charter Member, Past President and Paul Harris Fellow, Vance served the Rotary Club of Flemington as Secretary from its Charter and in 1987-1988; and as President in 1995-1996.

The Club made him an Honorary Life Member in July this year.

Vance Hilton was selected to serve as the District 9800 Governor in 1999-2000 and led a very successful District Conference in Canberra.

He later served on the Australian Rotary Council of Governors and as a Board Member of Rotary Down Under from 2004-2010. He was Rotary Down Under chairman from 2008-2010, and was awarded the RDU Distinguished Service Award in August 2011.

Vance was also a Knight of the Order of St John of Jerusalem, an invitation extended to him by Royce Pepin of the Rotary Club of Footscray in 1978.



In recognition of Vance's work, one of his special Rotary ties was framed and a raffle held to raise funds for research into Parkinson's Disease. Vance's widow Olga was tireless in her efforts to seel raffle tickets and the raffle was promoted widely through the District.

At a special meeting on Wednesday 19<sup>th</sup> March, the raffle was drawn by the Craig Goddard, the Membership and Fundraising Coordinator of Parkinson's Victoria.

The winning ticket was purchased by Allan Bruno and Olga was delighted with this result.

As per Vance and Olga"s wishes, and as agreed by Allan, the framed tie will be displayed at Camp

Getaway in honour of Vance's work in establishing the camp. The raffle raised over \$11,000 and Olga matched that amount with a personal donation to Parkinson's Victoria.





### Secretary's Report - Sam Nicol



The role of the Club Secretary is to ensure that the administrative requirements of the Board; District and Rotary International are attended to. This involves processing incoming and outgoing correspondence; submission of reports; updating membership databases and the submission of annual returns.

The Annual Statement to Consumer Affairs Victoria was submitted in October.

**February** Dr Fiona McDonald from Victoria University spoke to us about her research into the efficacy of breakfast programs in schools.



Hanyah Abdou Said and Aziza Sawiz from Mount Alexander College spoke to us about their sponsorship and the opportunities this provides them. Haniyah is the inaugural De King Award recipient and Aziza attended NSYF in January.



March Craig Goddard from Parkinson's Victoria attended and spoke to us about

the work they do mainly in funding research. He then drew the raffle for the Vance Hilton tie.



Melanie Del Monaco is the Community & Partnerships Engagement Officer at the City of Melbourne and spoke to us about her role, and how



we can work together for the betterment of the community.

Rachel Sumich spoke to us about The Retro Girls and the Spark the Dark project to light up communities.

**Matiu Bush** spoke to us about his work and research into isolation and loneliness in the elderly in our community.

**May** Nicole Dobson, Science Coordinator at MAC reported on her recent trip to Scotland and participation in the Women in STEM program, with the implications for curriculum development and teaching approaches from early primary school.

**June** Kate Stevanovic is the Leading Teacher Student Welfare at Mount Alexander College and she spoke to us about receiving a Rotary Robbie Mitchell Scholarship in 2015 to study at the Centre for Adolescent Health, and how she has applied this to her role.

Community Service - Anne Heyes/ Allan Bruno

A great year in Community Service funded mainly through profits from the Op shops saw the following projects funded or supported by your Club:

- 1. The Homeless Person Program operated through the Royal District Nursing Service in West Melbourne requested our assistance with items for Christmas for their clients. The club provided hampers for 50 persons including Christmas cakes and cookies, food and toiletries.
- 2. Kensington Youth Mental Health Program asked for assistance for the Christmas Lunch for isolated and single people in the community. Most of the targeted people were single people living with mental health issues. They were given a festive lunch on Christmas Day at J.J. Holland Park. The club provided a number of Christmas Cakes, Puddings and biscuits and contributed \$1000 towards the cost of the meal.
- 3. The Maternal and Child Health Nurses operating through the centres at Hopetoun Avenue and Wingate Avenue asked for our support providing Christmas packs for the children of their disadvantaged and single mothers. Christmas packs containing books, toys, sporting equipment and sweets were provided for 48 children. The mothers were provided with a pack of toiletries.
- 4. One Good Ride asked for assistance in funding for a Trio Bike for the program to assist in reducing isolation and loneliness in elderly and disabled clients of the RDNS and community. Together with a matching grant from the Rotary Foundation, we contributed 50% of the cost of the bike and provided introductions to local agencies to assist.
- 5. Kensington Festival. We again supported the Kensington Festival with a BBQ throughout the day on March 31st. This was a wonderful community day with great promotion of End Polio as well as our work in the community.
- 6. Moonee Valley Council sought our assistance for Carols by Candlelight in Queens Park. We again ran the BBQ, a great evening of community and festive spirit with all members engaged.
- 7. Harmony Day Festival at Flemington Community Centre found us supporting the local community and providing sausages and drinks to attendees.
- 8. Kensington Market. Lyn Borghouts represented the club at the monthly Kensington Market, providing a face and selling items sourced from the op Shop. This is an excellent community engagement and PR activity and keeps us visible in the wider community.
- 9. Debney Meadows Garden Renewal. Anne Heyes and Anne McMahon started the conversations with the Principal Rachel Rasmussen which led to this project. Garden beds were rejuvenated and planted over 3 separate working bees including children parents and teaches as well as Rotarians and friends. A Foundation Grant contributed \$2500 allowing plumbing works to take place.

The two Opportunity Shops continued to be the club's main focus in Community Service throughout the year.

#### Fit4Use Store

Retail over the past 12 months has been very difficult and competitive. The Werribee Store experienced a 18% decline in gross sales; however this is not totally unexpected given the level of sales during 2017/2018 and the tough retail conditions during 2018/2019. Plans are in place to extend trading hours during the 2019/2020, with the view to increasing sales and revenue for the Club. The Shop is ably managed by Lorry Rowe, with a wonderful band of volunteers. The past 12 months has seen the introduction of many new volunteers and this should help the Shop going forward.



### Flemington Opportunity Shop

The Flemington store faced similar challenges to that of Werribee. Decline of 10% in gross sales. Manager: Sam Nicol. Thanks to the wonderful group of volunteers working at the Flemington Store, many of which have been with us for several years. The Flemington Opportunity Shop is in urgent need of relocation to a larger shop front - cost being the issue. Or may be a complete overhaul of the existing site?

The shop continues to be the face of Rotary in the community and provides a social and connection opportunity for many people. Volunteers are dedicated and continue to be a great support for Sam.

#### **BBQ** Program

Although Allan has resigned as BBQ Coordinator, other members have stepped up to assist in organising.

A very busy schedule of Community Service and Fundraising events was conducted throughout the year, superbly organised and managed by Allan Bruno and Ted Frank. These events raised substantial sums for the club as well as providing an ongoing focus and familiar face in the community.





## Youth Service - Cody Bettanin & Chris Brock

The Rotary Club of Flemington Kensington strongly supported Youth programs again this year.

**Rotary Youth Exchange**: **RYLA** – Susan Dang attended the camp at Mt Evelyn and presented to members on her experiences at the February meeting.

**Science Experience** – MAC nominated 2 students to participate and they presented to members with the Science Coordinator in March.

National Youth Science Forum – We sponsored two students to attend 2019 NYSF and were successful with one student. For the first time ever, MAC nominated a student and Aziza Sawiz was selected to attend NYSF in Brisbane. She presented to our members in February along with the Science Coordinator Nicole Dobson who was very grateful for the opportunity given to Aziza.

The club also supported Mount Alexander College through a **Breakfast Club**.

**Scholarships** were donated to local schools for awarding to students at end of year assemblies with criteria of Civics & Citizenship and family financial need. Rotarians attended most assembles to assist in the presentations.

Two additional scholarships were awarded for December 2018:

**The Del King Award** to a student entering year 11 at MAC. The criteria were: financial need, deserving, academic record, community and school involvement, effort and attendance.

**The Eugene O. award** was offered to Kensington Community High School with similar criteria. The school chose to offer the scholarship to year 10 as an encouragement to stay at school.

The **Sports Scholarship** was not awarded in 2018-2019.

**Shine On Awards** – We nominated Jake Tynan from Ascot Vale Special School. He was acknowledged at the presentation day along with 5 others and received a Certificate for his endeavours.

**Careers advice** sessions were presented at Mount alexander College in May and 6 members participated in the 2 sessions during the morning.

The **1,000 Stories** project grew with over 6,000 picture story books donated to the Maternal and Child Health Centres at Hopetoun, Wingate and Maribyrnong Road Ascot Vale.



#### International Service - Peter Cribb

**Rotary Overseas Recycled Playgrounds** continues to row at a phenomenal rate. In this Rotary year, 2 containers were shipped to Sri Lanka with all playgrounds allocated prior to shipment.

Everyone looks forward to the installation of a new playground. But what do you do with the old playground? This question is faced by councils, schools, childcare centres, fast food franchises and many other places all over Australia.

In the past, most of the redundant equipment has gone to the tip or maybe to a recycling centre, as it was seen as just too difficult to repurpose the equipment for use elsewhere. Occupational health and safety standards, risk assessments and playground safety standards presented a seemingly insurmountable obstacle to those who wished for an alternative life for their outdated play equipment.

In Australia our play equipment generally has a life between 15 and 20 years. Fashions and fads come and go and play equipment is no different in that it is subject to 'the latest trend'. In many cases the play equipment that is being removed is in pretty good condition, but it is now classified as boring or past its 'use-by' date. However in many countries, playgrounds are unknown and financially out of reach of the average school or municipal council.

The international service organisation Rotary discovered all this when giving aid to an orphanage in Sri Lanka. The orphanage had a list of things they would like donated, starting with computers and ending with a playground. The Rotary Club of Flemington (Victoria) made contact with the City of Greater Geelong. To cut a long story short, they were able to help with the disassembly of a combination unit and then organise for it to be shipped to the orphanage in Sri Lanka where it was reassembled and is very much appreciated by the children of the orphanage today. Paul Cotter was the key person responsible at the COGG for enabling this to happen, and huge thanks are due to Paul for his efforts and leadership to date.

This happened due to much behind-thescenes work by the Rotary volunteers and with the assistance and advice of Play Australia. They have now helped to repurpose several playgrounds from a variety of locations and have refined their system in the process. Peter Cribb of the Flemington Rotary who is the driving force behind the RORP (Rotary Overseas Recycled Playgrounds) project, felt the process could be improved, he contacted fellow Rotarian Rod Greer and said "do you know anyone who can help us?" They researched the market and now use Filemaker Pro to capture all the necessary data and allow sharing. Rod explained "reassembling a playground is a cross between lisea and Lego. The lynchpins are getting the data together and putting coding on the actual pieces which allows the end user to follow the codes."

- An offer is made of a playground from the owner to Rotary. Steel playgrounds are preferred over timber.
- The playground is checked and photographed from all angles by Rotary volunteers.
- A birds eye view of the playground in situ (from Google Maps) is taken showing the current layout.
- 4. A plan from this photo is crewted.
- The play equipment is marked with codes. Bolts are sprayed with a lubricant.
- 6. When the fence goes up, Rotary moves in and disassembles the play equipment. Bolts are only out off with an angle grinder as a last resort because replacement bolts for a typical playground costs about \$600.
- The contractor then lifts out the uprights with machinery and carefully removes the concrete before placing it to one side.
- Rotary bads and removes the equipment and it usually goes into storage before a container can be filled to be sent overseas.
- Rotary feel a charge of about \$500 covers the costs of disposing the playground.
   This cost can be built into the contract.

Rotary have now organised 'Hub' clubs across Victoria to deal with their surrounding region. 'Councils and schools are wanting to do the right thing by recycling,' said Peter 'and an added bonus is that some schools are making contact with the school the play equipment





is being relocated to and that fosters wonderful links." Councils need to ensure that the 'non-destructive removal of the playground in consultation with the nominated charity' is written into the contract specifications.

Before the initial donation, the City of Greater Greelong created a form indemnifying the donating council and this was reviewed by MAV Insurance. This form is now available from Play Australia. "Council will not be faced with an unbelievable document – it is simple," said Peter However each Council will need to ensure it is reviewed by their own legal advisers to ensure it suits their own needs. He went on to say "there are always issues to be addressed but they can be worked through." Many playground manufacturers have been extremely helpful supplying plans and parts to simplify the reassembly overseas.

To date playgrounds have gone to Sri Lanka and Timor Leste. The Rotary model could conceivably be used nationally by a variety of service organisations and councils to repurpose playgrounds all over the world.



### Together We Grow at Debney Meadows

A grant from the Rotary Foundation has doubled the impact of Flemington Kensington Rotary's garden renewal project at Debney Meadows Primary School.

Flemington Kensington Rotary's Vocational Chair, Dr Anne McMahon, developed the project in conjunction with Principal Rachel Rasmussen who has been delighted with the support.

"Together We Grow" is a 3-stage plan to renew and develop the gardens and playing areas for the children who mainly come from the high-rise estate and have little experience with plants and growing things. On one planting session, some children were planting removed the tired old mulch and soil, replaced to the state and have been included in the main



After school one day, parents, children and staff assisted with planting a range of appropriate native plants, shrubs and ground covers, and some edible native plants. There was wonderful conversation about plants, planting methods and care.

The project has had support from Bunnings; the VRC; and Professor High Stewart, Jon Temby and Jacqui Van Heerden, who recommended plants most suitable for the climate, soil and location.

Stage 2, "Digging into Learning', will see removal of the old planter boxes, installation of new boxes constructed by the Men's Shed, and planting of vegetable gardens. Teaching about the different vegetables, fruits and edible plants, and inclusion of cooking classes for children and mothers will also occur.

A special report prepared for Rotary International by the Johns Hopkins Center for Civil Society Studies found that Rotary members had volunteered a total of 5.8 million hours within a four-week survey period. Extrapolating those results over an entire year, the report gave a conservative estimate of nearly 47 million hours of volunteer effort generated by Rotary members in a typical year.

The report then analyzed the economic impact of all those hours and estimated the value conservatively at \$850 million a year, if communities had to pay for the services that Rotary volunteers provide.

This figure doesn't even include the in-kind contributions and the money that Rotary clubs and the Rotary Foundation raise every year. In addition, the figure doesn't include the volunteer work of the many relatives and friends of Rotary that members often involve in a project,
