President's Report 2023-2024:

The Rotary year 2023-2024 was filled with remarkable service, teamwork, and impactful projects that embodied Rotary's mission to foster goodwill, community engagement, and global outreach. As President, I am immensely grateful to all our board members, volunteers, and supporters whose dedication and passion have driven the Rotary Club of Flemington Kensington forward, continuing a tradition of service since our club's inception in 1987.



This year, our journey exemplified the power of **initiative**, **collaboration**, **and resilience**, while also emphasising the importance of listening to the community and maintaining a clear vision rooted in purpose.

Key Achievements:

1. Community Engagement & Local Impact:

- **Op Shop Operations:** Despite economic challenges, the Op Shop remained a pillar of our community, contributing over **3,500 volunteer hours** and offering vital support through vocational scholarships and donations to various causes.
- **Mental Health First Aid Training:** With the support of Dr. Francis Acquah, we adapted our training program to meet the community's needs, enhancing participation and engagement over a four-day schedule.
- Youth & Scholarships: We proudly continued our sponsorships and scholarships for local schools, including Kensington Community High School and Mount Alexander College. The Op Shop also hosted work experience students and Duke of Edinburgh participants.
- **1000 Stories Initiative:** Over 1,000 books were distributed to Wingate Avenue and The Venny through community donations, promoting literacy.

2. Environmental Sustainability Initiatives:

National Tree Day: In partnership with Moonee Valley Council and Keilor East Rotary, our team planted 3,000 trees and shrubs at Rosehill Park Wetlands, reinforcing our commitment to environmental sustainability.

3. International Service & Humanitarian Impact:

Sri Lanka: Through collaboration with Donations in Kind and the Rotary Club of Colombo, we sent vital hospital beds and medical supplies, overcoming challenges through community connections, especially with the Sri Lankan diaspora.

- **Puntland, Somalia:** After years of planning, a container of hospital beds, dialysis machines, and educational equipment was sent to Jarriban Hospital, demonstrating the perseverance of members like Abdi Hassan and Mohammed Abbas.
- **Nepal Education Project:** In partnership with the Rotary Club of Tripureswor and supported by the Balwyn Centenary Grant, we initiated the Back to School project, helping students in Siraha and Udayapur districts access education and sanitation. A successful Global Grant application has been a blessing for this program to find its footing.
- **Maldives:** Books for schools in the Maldives were collected and shipped with the help of the Australian High Commission, showcasing our club's reach and collaborative spirit.

4. Fundraising Successes:

Trivia Night: Organized by Melina Caccetta, this sold-out event was a highlight of the year, bringing members and the community together for a night of fun and fundraising

• BBQs & Community Events: Spearheaded by stalwarts like John Sklenar and Drew Sheehan, our BBQs and events continued to raise funds and strengthen community ties.

Learning and Leadership:

Throughout this year, I've learned valuable lessons about the **power of trust, teamwork, and strategic agility**. As we are all always continuosly learning, this past year in particular has been actively working on the notion that, 'success in volunteer work lies in building **trust and passion-driven collaboration'.**

Treasurer's Report : Lesley McCarthy

The Rotary Club of Flemington is no longer registered for GST as our club income is below the threshold. All figures quoted in the report are net of GST.

The financial statements are to be read with the explanations. Several project areas received or spent monies in previous financial years, or will acquit in the following year so a clean breakdown is not always possible.

NOTE #1: Due to financial year discrepancies, some grants and payments are received or made in a year other than that which they were applied for or used.

NOTE #2: The accounts previously used for RORP and grants have been closed.

NOTE #3: The treasurer role was completed by Lesley McCarthy and Edith Chen together. Additional signatories were Shraddha Sharma, Melina Caccetta, Lyn Borghouts and Cody Bettanin.

NOTE #4: The Op Shop is managed as a fundraising operation by the Rotary Club of Flemington Kensington Foundation Inc, a charity registered with ACNC. All profits are donated to other charities, individuals or organisations whose mission is in line with Rotary's Areas of Focus and appropriate according to the ACNC regulations. The Foundation also has DGR status meaning we are able to issue tax receipts for donations.

NOTE #5: The Rotary Club of Flemington Kensington Foundation Inc holds an investment portfolio with Innovayt, established in 2019 with funds raised during 2013-2015 from Metro Rail events. The company associated with this account has 3 directors: Cody Bettanin, Lyn Borghouts and Lesley McCarthy. Shraddha Sharma is a signatory.

The club is in a strong financial position despite the reduction of income from BBQs, and the Op Shops due to COVID.

Op Shop report: Melina Caccetta:

This financial year has been disappointing from a trading point of view. While we have still had many customers, sales have been less as is the situation with all traders in Flemington.

We have retained our valued volunteers who have amassed a huge 3,500 volunteer hours during the year. Alex De Bortoli, Deborah Ryan, Frances Stratford, Barbara Ryan, Vinh Ly, Rui Keng, Nahla Khidhir, Emily Qoroya, Gael Moran, Nina Farmer and Diana O'Toole have been regular and reliable supporters. Volunteers were recognised with lunches during National Volunteer Week and at Christmas. They were also presented with Volunteer acknowledgement certificates and a Christmas cake.

We have accepted Work Experience students from Mount Alexander College.

We had JobFind candidates until December 2023. We received \$3000 from them for the July-December prior.

The RagMan paid us \$111 over the year. Rags are collected fortnightly.

There have been several instances of shoplifting and of drug/alcohol affected customers as well as some experiencing mental health issues. I attempt to defuse and calm the situation but have at times felt the need to close. This too is typical according to reports from Flemington Traders.

We have had further issues with the roof and electricity. The landlord arranged for the roof to be repaired. Dennis O'Brien was called into do some minor electrical repairs, and a plumber was needed for some tap issues.



The Food Pantry continues to be necessary.

Environment:

We continue to partner with Moonee Valley Council on tree plantings. On National Tree Day, the team worked at Rosehill Park Wetlands.

International Service:

1. RORP - whilst our members have taken a step back, Peter Cribb continues his role and is supported by John Sklenar and others as time permits. The program managed by Bob Allardice at Rotary Nunawading has continued. At this year's changeover, a Certificate of appreciation was warded to Bob Allardice.

2. Philippines – the club continues to support Lorry Rowe in her work. This year, we contributed \$1000 for the street kids food program and towards dental programs through Rotary Calabatuan.

3. Sri Lanka – 2 containers filled with hospital beds and assorted medical equipment have been shipped through RARE in South Australia and Donations in Kind. The container from RARE was funded by the Australian Sri Lankan Association of SA.

4. Maldives – through Peter Cribb's recent visit to Sri Lanka this request was accepted. Peter identified books and collected them with assistance from John Sklenar, Abdi Hassan, Jo Walker and Shraddha Sharma. Books were then sorted, culled and repacked at DiK by Peter and Bec, Jo and Lesley before being taken to the shipper at Tullamarine. This project was funded by the Australian High Commissio0n in the Maldives at no cost to us.

5. Puntland, Somalia – this project to support the Jarriban University and hospital has been 2 years ih the planning and organising. Managed by Abdi Hassan and with funding support from the Somali community, this container contained hospital beds and equipment, university desks and chairs and medical supplies. It shipped in August.

6. Nepal – supporting education in rural Nepal. Shraddha's passion project more than a year in the planning and organising. A Global Grant was submitted and an application to the Rotary Club of Balwyn for their Centenary Grant was also successful. This project is in partnership with the Rotary Cub of Tripureswor.

YOUTH

The club's focus on youth programs continued strongly. Scholarships were presented at Ascot Vale

West PS, St Brendans PS and Debney Meadows PS.

MAC: The Del King Scholarship was awarded to Sarah Alman. Sarah also volunteers in the Op Shop. The Ted Frank vocational award was presented to Taylor Setina. KCHS: The Eugene O. Scholarships at Kensington Community HS were awarded to Eden Lawrence and Clay Crawford.

The Op Shop accepts work experience and Duke of Edinburgh students for placements.

She has attended meetings and participated in a number of club events. She has planted trees, helped at BBQs and worked at the Op Shop.



ROTARY IN THE NEWS

Ron and Shraddha expressed their delight at this opportunity for Rotary to support young people who were unable to obtain the required supervised driving hours.

Education and supporting young people are key pillars of the work being done by Rotary in the community and Flemington Kensington Rotary contributes thousands of dollars annually through scholarships, sponsorships and material support in the Flemington, Kensington and Ascot Vale communities.

Mayor Pierce Tyson was accompanied by Cr Rose Iser, L2P Coordinator Emma Phillips and performed the formal ribbon cutting alongside DG Ron and President Shraddha.

The car, a Kia Rio, proudly wears the Rotary Flemington Kensington branding along with L2P and Moonee Valley Council. It will be based at the Ascot Vale Leisure Centre and joins the existing vehicle which is housed at Moonee Ponds Police Station.

Flemington Kensington Rotary began their Flemington Kensington Rotary began their involvement with learner/migrant drivers in 2013 when they initiated the RoadStart program in conjunction with VicRoads and the Victorian Government. This project supported people to obtain the required hours of supervised driving through volunteer mentors. In 2015, the program became DriveLink managed by council.

The funds for this donation were raised during 2013 when the club participated in a large number of sausage sizzles for the Metro Rail Link upgrade where a breakfast BBQ, fruit and drinks were provided for commuters being bussed from the Werribee line to Flemington racecourse. Members ran these BBQs at Flemington racecourse and Sunshine railways stations throughout the year.

Rotary runs Mental Health First Aid program Lesley McCarthy Valley staff at the Djering Hub also took up the challenge of reaching out to the community with their talented multilingual staff to promote the program.

Rotary Flemington Kensington recently organised a Mental Health First Aid (MHFA) program with a difference.

efugee backgrounds with need trauma in their lives.

Having organised Mental Health First Aid programs in the past, President Shraddha Sharma was keen to run this program again. Moonee Valley Council offered their facility at the Djerring Hub, with a large and airy classroom containing AV facilities. Moonee

A culturally sensitive and linguistically capable presenter was a priority. Dr Francis Aquah OAM, PP Rotary Greensborough was selected. Flemington Kensington Rotarians were well aware of challenges to mental health and wellbeing faced by residents of local social housing estates, having worked with community members for many years. Among the towers, there are many residents with refugee backgrounds who may have

As the program was designed for mothers, it was scheduled to run over four days during school hours. Childcare was also offered. We had previously run a mental health forum in 2022 at a time when community distress was high. A takeaway from this forum was the need to support families dealing with mental health challenges among their children and teenagers. So members began exploring options and ways to address this need.

Early in March, the program kicked off with 21 participants anxiously collecting their workbooks. Cultural groups represented included Eritrea, Ethiopia, Ghana, Kenya, Somalia, Sudan and Uganda, as well as Australia, Italy, China, the Philippines and Vietnam.

Francis in his colourful outfit soon had Francis in his colourful outfit soon had them at case and gently easied into what was at times quite challenging material. Throughout the course, there were frequent breaks, timeouts when the topics became confronting and special signals when someone needed a break. A Rotarian was on duty throughout the sessions to offer support, solace and tissues. There are some clear barriers to obtaining mental health support that arose during discussions:

In some of the languages used by participants, there is little vocabulary for anciety, depression, bullying, suicide, self-harm and other mental health issues such as achicophernia. Thus children/teenagery parents might struggle to clearly articulate or discuss what is happenning in their lives.
With English as an additional language, communicating concerns and asking for help can be very difficult. Similarly, navigating the health system with limited English language skills or a lack of digital literary can be a barrier.
Ack of trust was a concern.
Heren can be stigman around raising mental health issues.
Parent can struggle to know when and

health issues. Parents can struggle to know when and how to intervene with their loved ones.

Clarity around some of these points from Francis was vital. Things to consider include how long symptoms have been noticed, the severity and escalation of symptoms and the impact on a person's life.

ALCEE (the mental health first aid action plan) became everyone's best friend as we discussed and considered presentations: • Approach the person, assess and assist with any crisis • Listen and communicate non-judgmentally • Give support and information • Encourage the person to get appropriate professional help • Encourage other supports

After the fourth session, participants were presented with Certificates of Attendance, with formal accreditation provided following submission of feedback and a small assessment. On hand to congratulate participants were

members President Shraddha Sharma, Abdi Hassan and Mohammed Omar Abbas from Puntland, Somalia, as well as Past President Lesley McCarthy.

The biggest impact from this program is the confidence now evident among participants to support and assist young people and adults in their community.

Through the program, Rotary have expanded our reach with the community, strengthened our relationship with council, and developed contacts with local social support agencies.

Feedback was very positive with many asking for further training focusing on other MHFA programs.

One participant said, "I learned a lot and I am applying the ALGEE to my community and colleagues, and neighbours."

Another said, "The course was challenging especially the videos containing distressed people. But now I understand how to assess the situation, listen and offer support. Thank you for the opportunity."
