## Photo Taking Guide:

A good set of photos makes it easier for all parties involved in RORP.

In general, it is better to have too many photos than not enough.


The components of each set need to be able to be easily:

- Tagged on a plan,
- Identified on site for marking up,
- Seen how it is to be reassembled.

Complex pieces will need many more photos than simple ones such as swing sets, rockers and seesaws.

Take photos of unusual connections too. An example is a multi-piece spiral slide.


