The Foundation Grants Committee

The Annual Fund Share will be allocated to the following 2 areas.

- 1. The Block Grant are the funds to be used for District Local and International Grants and our Year 11-12 school scholarships. An application for US\$72,000 has been applied for the District Block Grant for the 23-24 year.
- 2. The remaining funds are used for Global Grants and RI projects including Peace Centres, Polio Plus, and Global Scholars.

The D9800 Annual Fund Share for the 2023-2024 Rotary year was \$185,209.69 (= 50% of funds donated to The Rotary Foundation (TRF) by D9800 individuals and clubs 3 years ago). We also include **\$5176 which is 50% of Available Endowment fund** share earnings and **\$51,400 carried forward** from unspent funds in 22-23.

You may recall from my last report that in 22-23 a total of 15 District grants were approved in 22-23 (\$53k) and the school scholarships (\$12k) amounting to a total of \$65,135 allocated. At the time of writing the \$51,400 carried forward from unspent funds in 22-23 have been fully exhausted for new projects this year.

As part of the district process a total of twenty-six completed grant intention forms have been submitted by clubs, along with several applications and intentions for Global Grants. This is continually changing as more grants are updated and application forms submitted. Most are considered likely to be approved if acceptable grant applications are lodged which will mean a very successful year of projects supported by the Rotary Foundation.

There has also been an excellent response to the Year 11-12 scholarship grants with 17 applications received by the closing date. Although oversubscribed from our initial allocation of 10 grants the committee approved all 17 applications.

Polio update



As you would be aware Rotary has been working to eradicate polio for more than 35 years, and we have made incredible progress in the fight to rid the world of it forever. As a founding partner of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative, Rotary has helped to reduced polio cases by more than 99.9% since the mid-1980s. It is crucial to eradicate polio from the last two countries where it remains endemic and to keep other countries polio-free.

If all eradication efforts stopped today, within 10 years, polio could paralyse as many as 200,000 children each year. **No place is safe until polio has been eradicated everywhere.**

The Global Polio Eradication Initiative is a public-private partnership led by national governments with six core partners - the World Health Organization (WHO), Rotary International, the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF), the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation and Gavi, the Vaccine Alliance. Its goal is to eradicate polio worldwide. The Polio report (2023) shows the progress being made in the battle to eradicate Polio **with only 12 Wild Polio cases confirmed over the 2023 year.**

Rotary Walk with Us End Polio



Over the month of October, District 9800 Rotarians again took to the parks, pavements and walking machines to raise money towards ending Polio in the world. A huge thank you to everyone who participated; walking and raising money during October for our End Polio Campaign. Sixty-five individual walkers in 18 teams raised just over \$47,000, with **Robert Fisher from Rotary Melbourne** topping the individual fundraising leaderboard and the **DG Team** topping the teams' category. Attendance at the new event Paws for Polio and the Studley Park walk was excellent and **a big thankyou to District Polio Chair Jane Pennington** for organising the events this year.

The District Foundation committee will match the first 10 clubs to donate \$1000 to the End Polio Campaign this year. The district contribution will also be matched by RI. Rotary is committed to raising \$50 million per year over the next three years, with every dollar to be matched with two additional dollars from the Gates Foundation

Polio Plus Society



This new fundraising and recognition program supports PolioPlus where Rotary members and others pledge at least US\$100 per year (AU\$160) to the PolioPlus Fund until polio is eradicated from the face of the earth. Contributions will count toward Paul Harris Fellow recognition and Major Donor

status and will be matched 2-to-1 by the Gates Foundation. Our numbers have continued to grow to 81 members.

End Polio has a stand reserved at the District Conference on 12-14 April 2024. **The new district owned Iron Lung will be on display on the conference.** See more about the Conference at the end of the newsletter.

Peace Fellow program

Sadly, D9800's "Black Caviar" record of having produced one or more Rotary Peace Fellows every year since the program began in 2001, is no more. For the first time in 22 years, neither of our two endorsed candidates were selected from 22-23 selection process and they were the only two applicants we had this year. Whilst disappointing it is an amazing record and D9800 still stands out as the leading District for overall successful applicants.

District Peace Scholar chair PDG Murray Verso has already convened two meetings of the Peace Fellow committee to review and update our materials and process to improve our approach for 23-24 Rotary year. Confidence is high that we will obtain a successful candidate this year. On the good news front, we have already had contact from two people about applying for the fellowships and applications open in February 2024.

Global Scholars

There has been quite a bit of activity on the Scholars portfolio over the past few months. Kristine Tay has settled into her course at Oxford – and loving it. Her only complaint is the intense workload.

John Croker was also at Oxford (and attending New Scotland Yard) and he, along with PDG Karen Everleigh (D1090 - Oxford) attended the Rotary Club of Burford with D9800 Scholars chair David Gorman on Monday 16 October. They were the guest speakers for the night.

Royce Abbey Awards and Scholarship



The **Royce and Jean Abbey Vocational Scholarship and the Royce Abbey Award** were established in recognition of Royce Abbey's contribution to Rotary as an inspirational Rotarian and leader from 1954 to 2014, and as president of Rotary International in 1988-89. **The Royce Abbey Award** is available to Rotary Clubs wishing to recognise Rotarians showing enthusiasm and commitment to the Ideals of Rotary. By doing so the club contributes AUD\$1,000 to the Royce and Jean Abbey Endowed Fund.

The Fund helps finance **the scholarships** which assist communities in developing countries in the Asia-Pacific region. Scholarship recipients would spend up to three months in Australia undertaking practical training in his or her field assisted by funding of USD\$10,000. The Scholarship program covers all Areas of Focus.

Those that follow the district webpage and Facebook page will have noticed the wonderful news that PDGs Murray Verso and Dennis Shore were joint 500th Royce Abbey Award recipients (500a and 500b) at a dinner held in November 2023. Congratulations Dennis and Murray.
