

# Rotary Donations in Kind West Footscray Store September 2024 update



## The 2024 Open Day was an amazing event with visiting Rotarians, their families and many guests.

What do 45 clubs from 4 districts, 200 plus attendees and representatives from Government, community organisations, health services and banks have in common? It's the 2024 Donations in Kind Open Day showcasing the **Magic of Rotary** in action.

In brilliant sunshine, people from across Victoria and as far away as Warragul, Mornington, Ballarat, Bendigo and Daylesford arrived at shed 39, 400 Somerville Road to be greeted by the aroma of cooking sausages and the welcoming greetings from Store Manager Colleen d'Offay and DiK Inc Secretary George de Souza.

Efforts throughout the week by volunteers showcased goods and opportunities including clothing, stationery kits, caps and hats, shoes, mobility aids, medical consumables and furniture. The feature – the iron lung and associated Polio banners and promotional materials. Many attendees had never heard of or seen such a machine – and were fascinated even dismayed at the sight. The formal opening ceremony was highlighted by the original song penned and sung by PDG Greg Ross and acknowledging quests and the work of DiK.

After a welcome from DiK Inc Secretary George de Souza, a speech by District Governor Michael Lapina and an address by Danny Pearson, MP for Essendon, Secretary George de Souza made a special presentation to Bob Glindemann and Laurie Fisher. They have given over 48 years of service assisting in the shipment of 708 containers over the years.

Several motor sport caps and children's hats were also snapped up and orders taken for chairs and more children's gift/toy packs.

By 2:45pm the clean up was almost done and thanks to Andy, Norm and Laurie the store was ready for duty again on Tuesday.

Donations in Kind has recently been offered a substantial quantity of 3M N95 Masks (8210 P2 Respirators) with an expiry date of September 2025.

While many local communities could greatly benefit from this donation, we may not be fully aware of the numerous community groups or individuals you collaborate with.



To ensure these masks reach those in need and avoid ending up in landfill, DiK is committed to facilitating their

distribution as quickly and widely as possible. Once we have an indication of the quantity, we will arrange for delivery to the DIK warehouse – at this stage the dates to collect are unknown.

- There is no limit on the number of cartons you can request—each carton contains 160 masks.
- Whether or not you are a DIK member, you are welcome to request as many masks as you need.
- Though DIK typically works with Rotary Clubs, this offer is open to anyone, including community groups at no cost.

The masks will need to be collected on a Tuesday or Thursday from the DiK warehouse in West Footscray. Alternatively, if you are located regionally, we can arrange to have them transported at your cost.

## Papua New Guinea

The Rotary Clubs of Brighton in partnership with the Rotary Passport Melbourne club have initiated a project to support schools in the very remote area of Tabubil in the Western Province of Papua New Guinea.

Tabubil is the base of operations for the Ok Tedi Copper Mine.

Container No 1 of 3 sent to the remote community has been distributed to a number of schools and community groups with

two members from Rotary Passport Melbourne, who are on the ground in Tabubil, managing the community

assessment and distribution. Ok Tedi Mines arranged the shipping from the

Port of Brisbane to Port Moresby and then to Kiunga.

Starwest Constructions, who purchased the containers, managed the challenging 150-kilometer road transport to one of their secure warehouses. But before that, the containers travelled from Port Moresby via



Under the watchful eye of the Rotary Passport Melbourne members, the Starwest team sorted the items for distribution.

Finalbin and Tabubil Primary Schools, Tabubil Elementary School and the Mt Fubilan Pikinini Library Learning Centre were the main beneficiaries this time with school desks and chairs, cabinets, books, shoes, sports colored shirts, bags and caps, stationery, balls and toys, fabric, beds and wheelchairs.

#### **Timor Leste**

# July and August were busy for the team at DiK.

- 1. New wiring was installed thanks to Dennis O'Brien and his team which will allow WiFi access throughout the store. This will allow for connectivity right to the far end, and will assist with logging details of goods.
- 2. Bronwyn Stevens with support from the team, has submitted several grant applications. These grants will support volunteer elements including additional forklift licence training.
- 3. A large quantity of clothing has been delivered, unpacked, detagged and sorted. This includes excellent quality school uniforms, flannel shirts and men's suits.
- 4. Thanks to Symmetry medical for a large quantity of surgical markers and rulers.
- 5. Geoff Taylor from Rotary Mount Waverley brought in a large donations of children's picture story and junior fiction books. This is a quarterly activity from him and his club.
- 6. Containers were loaded for Vanuatu, Timor Leste {2}, Tonga and Puntland {Somalia}. Every Tuesday, Frank/Laurie, Andy, Jim, Norm, Mark, Maurice and the regular volunteer team on a Tuesday do all the heavy hard work.
- 7. Frank, Colleen and several of the volunteers travelled to a former aged car home in Kew on 20 August where they collected a very large quantity of hospital and medical equipment including beds, furniture and consumables. They were also assisted by Jama Farah from Footscray Rotary with some of his communit6y members, who were collecting for another container to Ethiopia.

# Medical and Mobility Equipment for Our Local Communities

DIK has a large store of new and preloved medical and mobility aids that are supplied free-of-charge to disadvantaged people in the local community. This equipment is principally used in the home to support mobility and maintain lifestyle and is one of our most effective projects. While Australia provides high levels of medical care, many citizens unfortunately can slip through the cracks and are unable to afford the medical and mobility equipment they need.

DIK supply this equipment by working with local health practitioners including occupational therapists and physiotherapists and through local health provider organisations such as Co-Health and Bolton Clarke. Working with their medical support teams we provide much of the equipment they need.

Medical professionals, including occupational therapists and social workers visit the Store, select the appropriate mobility equipment and deliver it to their clients. It's a great result for everyone involved and for the environment, as without DIK much of the equipment would be dumped into landfill.

During 2023-2024, DIK supplied 346 items to 215 patients in 80 suburbs, principally in the Moonee Valley, Maribyrnong, Brimbank and Wyndham local government areas.



There are currently 30 DiK Inc members across several districts but there is always space for more.

Membership of DiK Inc allows clubs to access goods in the store for their international AND local projects. Not a member, then a financial contribution will be asked from you for goods.
