LAST WEEK'S MEETING

We had a great response to our guest speaker, Peter Turner, from the RC of Toowong, on the topic of drought proofing Queensland. He presented a concept for piping water to outback towns to grow and store hay, so they are better prepared to deal with the impact of drought. Wendy Protheroe also presented a proposal and BHR has agreed to be the lead Club in applying for an RI special Grant in honour of Rotary's 100 Year anniversary in Australia. The special project being proposed is the expansion of the RFDS Field Days that are being piloted this year, using funds raised from the Rotary Art Show. Evaluation of this initiative is underway by Minter Ellison and will provide strong evidence of the positive impact these events have in rural communities for our application. Wendy and Russell Postle have already met with the RFDS to scope the project, gained endorsement for the project from the BHR Board and also gained approval from all members at our meeting on 25 July. So far everyone has been in agreement that this would be an iconic project by two iconic Brands - Rotary and RFDS. At this stage there is no need to do anything, just be aware that behind the scenes this grant application is being prepared and conversations are taking place with our neighbouring Rotary Districts to join in the application. We will keep you updated as we progress through the stages. This is an amazing opportunity for Rotary and Brisbane High Rise to have a huge impact in Rural Australia.
