# Notes from the Service(s) Desk

• *ShelterBags* - swags for the homeless in inner Brisbane. Thanks to Wayne from RC Paddington for coming to Breakfast to show us the *Shelterbag*. It is very impressive quality design and with purpose-built manufacture and a great way for us to help our local homeless people here in Brisbane, in our own area. Order to be placed now with bags to arrive by April next year, timed for Winter 2025, and our *Shelterbags* will be distributed via 3<sup>rd</sup> Space. Cost is \$93/bag. We have agreed to purchase 20 bags and so far 14 members have put their hand up to contribute one bag each. Please transfer to our club bank account with *Shelterbag and your name* as the reference, and let Cindy know. Thank you to Margot and Lindsay for being the first to kick this off.



• Carparking for Cirqué du Soleil is cancelled - the organising club has decided to not proceed with this event as arranging 320 volunteers at less than 4 weeks notice has proven to be too difficult. (5 week run, 8 shows per week, 8 volunteers per show). We had looked at committing to 68 volunteer slots (1 week x 8 shows x 8 volunteers) and had only filled 10 slots up until now.

•Act for Kids is a for-purpose organisation that delivers evidence-led professional therapy and support services to children and families who have experienced or are at risk of harm. A District Grant has been approved and we are now in discussion with Act for Kids as to how we can fulfil our side of the grant obligations.

• **3rd Space Brisbane** is a day-time drop-in centre where people are experiencing or at risk of homelessness in Brisbane can find support, dignity and hope. Although we were unsuccessful in getting a District Grant, we met with them on 6 September to talk about how we can help them at their site in the Valley.

# Trifecta Tickets ... a good vintage

## ABSTRACT

**Care Packs for Destitute Mothers:** 

Our club has committed to providing 120 care packs over the next year - here's some detail about the need and benefits, and the packs oute social and econor

### • The problem

A significant majority of patients delivering their babies with Maternity ding sn Africa face family problems caused by poverty, conflicts with relativers each

Many mothers do not have sources of income. They are not gainfully employed and their families are not able to help them with many important necessities, such as accommodation, food and toilet liese 2024

After a woman delivers her baby, she needs at least two months to recover before resuming many normal activities. For example, many of them depend on casual work and small, informal businesses such as selling seasonal vegetables and fruit. Others are housewives.

When they have babies and do not have family support, mothers end up in misery and distress with their babies, particularly in the months immediately following delivery because they are unable to go out to work for an income.

If a mother is sure of having enough food for at least two months, she is more able to resume normal tasks, including small income generatingactivities. This will help her to buy food in the future and maintain a healthier diet so that the baby can be nourished better through breast feeding.

### The solution

Small care packs of daily essentials provided to destitute mothers. As a result they will:

- Feel cared for, sustained and encouraged, giving them greater capacity, ability and confidence to recover and resume other activities. - Feel more supported psychologically, emotionally, mentally and physically.

- Feel less of a burden to others who may be trying to provide for them, especially teenage mothers who are vulnerable as a result of feeling neglected by their families.

### • The Care Packs

Individual packs will be provided according to the needs of each patient. A typical support pack could comprise some or all of: 10 kg cornflour; 5 kg sugar; 10 kg rice; 10 litres cooking oil; toiletries; clothes / blanket.
