Karyn Walsh, CEO of Micah Projects



Karyn Walsh has worked in the not-for-profit sector addressing homeless since 1978. During this time, Karyn has worked with many groups to create organisations and services to respond to the local circumstances of people experiencing homelessness and the economic and social systems which create homelessness in the first place.

This has involved work across many population groups such as young people, young pregnant and parenting women, women and children escaping domestic violence, individuals, couples and families living on the streets, in cars, parks and motels.

In recognising our current housing crisis across all communities in Australia Karyn is particularly interested in how we create a more equitable and inclusive housing system that is affordable, has security of tenure and when needed embedded services and healthcare tailored to the needs of tenants. Karyn has advocated for Housing First and Supportive Housing to form an integral part of our housing system.

Karyn is the CEO of Micah Projects which provides a range of services and is the backbone organisation for Brisbane Zero. She is also an inaugural member and former Chair of the Australian Alliance to End Homelessness.


Seb @ St Judes

International Toast

This week we are celebrating the: Rotary Club of Tokyo Mitaka, Japan



Yoichiro Miyazaki switched into high gear to raise money for the **PolioPlus Society**. Miyazaki, a member of the **Rotary Club of Tokyo Mitaka**, cycled the length of Japan last October, covering 2,500 km in 24 days.

"If you don't act, there's no point," he tells Rotary Italia magazine, using a slogan developed for his year as governor of District 2750 in 2023-24.

Along the way, fellow district governors, other Rotarians, and well-wishers cheered for him as he traversed twisting roads, uphill climbs, and tunnels. RI General Secretary John Hewko, another avid cyclist, offered a video message of support.

Prompted by news coverage of his ride, donors contributed \$140,000.

Miyazaki continues to pedal strong: In late April, he finished the Osaka-to-Tokyo challenge just three hours shy of the 30-hour goal en route to more fundraising for polio.

Bill & Elenor's Travels

Bill & Elenor Leveritt are in the UK – there is a train theme to this trip:

It was an interesting flight over, with the plane doing a zig zag route over Pakistan, Afghanistan, Turkmenistan, Azerbaijan, Georgia and Turkey. That's to avoid flying over Iran, Ukraine or Russia.

After a couple of days in London doing essential housekeeping (renewing railway passes, getting a new UK SIM card, jet lag recovery) we went to Devon to spend a few delightful days with our friends Joe and Lindsay at their home on the bank of the River Exe. Then it was on one of the longest train journeys that it's possible to make on a single train in the UK - Exeter to Edinburgh - though the train actually started in Penzance. For us it was 8 hours, and the train was full most of the way, with some passengers even having to stand for part of the journey between stops in the Midlands.

We are now in Edinburgh, and we will be here for the next week.
