#### **TEENS IN TROUBLE**

#### Sexual Health Education by Pictures provides solutions to teenage pregnancy in the Philippines

The Australian crew of five Rotarians met at Sydney airport and 2 days, 2 flights and a squishy 6 hour drive later, we arrived at Gingoog, Mindanao in Southern Philippines at 4 am. 'Today we talk with Superintendent of Education and the Mayor,' we are told. 'We meet at 7 am.' Okay we went and got permission to teach SHEP in high schools. Eleven young local excited trainees eagerly awaited a chat and demo class – they had done their homework.

Next morning was an enigma wrapped in a mystery. But it all went swimmingly. We had the idea that the Sydney team would set an example. My first class was Year 11 and the young men quickly informed me that their one female classmate was pregnant. She gave a sheepish smile. This was a bit awkward and I skipped the scariest dangers of childbirth for those under reproductive maturity i.e. 18.

The schools teach in English but the students spoke their local dialect at home. Quickly it became obvious that our young trainees were more effective



teachers than aging Rotarians. But we were unique, terrorists have scared away tourists and enterprise from Mindanao. So curious brown eyes gathered excitedly around us wanting a photo. Most had mobiles. 'You are like pop stars,' we are told. A 7-year-old gazed at me with amazement, 'You have blue eyes.'

When teaching a similar program five years ago, the clear anatomy drawings caused a loud whoop, the girls covered their eyes and the boys stared intently. This time even the year sevens were unmoved. 'They watch pornography,' the teacher explains. So they know basic external Anatomy but have not heard of consent. W Concerning which President Rodrigo Duterte – a local hero – had passed a law raising it from 12 (only country lower being Nigeria with 11) to 16 with conviction resulting in 15 years jail. The young ladies take note, the young men also but for different reasons.

Philippines University research shows an increase in younger teenage pregnancies. A teacher said, 'We have always had girls pregnant at 15 and 16 now they are 13 and 14.' The Head says, 'They arrange to meet on the phone, the parents cannot stop them, they come home at 1 am.' Another, 'One of our students has HIV, we have been told, but we not which one.' Then, 'We have chlamydia.'

Other disturbing statistics include: 51% of pregnancies are illegitimate and a high percentage of the fathers are in a 'different age group to the woman'. When I tell the classes this I can feel the young ladies understand and take note. A difficulty is that the Catholic Church, 84% of the population is catholic, and has convinced the population that the pill is, 'dangerous for women.' We can talk about condoms but were refused consent to actually show one.

The outcome for younger teenage pregnancy is in every school: the dropout rate, the health consequences, stigma and loneliness, the cycle of poverty, child care by a rotation of family members. Teachers are concerned and sympathetic, a few judgemental. Work overload, embarrassment and lack of training prevent them teaching the compulsory lessons. Hopefully our classes open conversations.

I was surprised that four of the 11 new trainers who wrote me strong personal messages of the benefits they recieved, 'My experience with you and this mission will be a strong testimony to me. I pray you will continue to be a light for other people' ... 'Aside from caring for the young people. I learned a lot from your project.' Worldwide change is rapidly affecting the structure of families, work, sexual choices and consequences. For young people to have facts, be aware, discuss and explore ideas, gives confidence and power to make choices and decisions and that give them, and those they care for, a chance of healthier, happier lives.
