Along with her sister Trish Ellis and brother Waine Donovan she has produced a local dialect indigenous dictionary which is being used in the local primary schools. Her talk to us was enlightening and entertaining. At the end of the night, I suggested she would be very welcome to come and visit us again.

Last week Kerry Boyenga—Dhurga Language

Kerry began her talk by thanking Robyn Legge for the pressure which had shaped her life and career- she as Aboriginal assistant at Moruya Primary, Robyn as the Principal recognizing and insisting that she should qualify as a teacher.



Kerry has seven siblings. Her mother and grandmother, both well known in our local indigenous people, were firm in their belief that the family should be educated and as a result most of them worked in teaching.

The late Jeff Ward, as Principal of

Broulee Public School, strongly supported revival of the Dhurga language, making time available to Kerry and her brother Waine Donovan to begin lessons in the language. Their eldest sister Patricia Ellis was well known for her lead position in several Aboriginal groups and in the National Parks areas. She taught Dhurga at St Bernard's, Ulladulla and Carroll College.

The Dhurga language was originally spoken from Jervis Bay to Wallaga Lake and westward to the mountains. Successive government actions had effectively killed it, so that only odd words were still spoken by local families. So the major task of Trish, Kerry and Waine was to rescue words and meanings, drawing on research by ANU scholars and others, and compile a workable dictionary, a copy of which was donated to our club. The money came from Aboriginal grants.

Kerry spoke with enthusiasm of the classes she runs in primary school, of the way the position of Aboriginal kids within the class has vastly improved to the extent that they look forward to school and taking part. The hope is that their futures might be shaped into positive contribution to our community.

Strange then that there is no money in the State School budget to support teaching of native languages. There is a continued requirement that a second language be taught, but that does not include Dhurga.

There was general agreement that Kerry in her excellent presentation had made a compelling case for the restoration of Dhurga, but who will pick up the campaign when the talented three are too old to continue?
