Step right up 3: In Rotary's membership game, everyone's a winner – more ideas for clubs

Make membership growth your club's top priority -

and make sure every member understands that. "I always tell presidents and presidents-elect that the best way to make their year as president easier is to bring in more members," says Gump. New members bring new energy to a club, he explains, and mean more people to serve on committees, work on projects and events, and raise money for the Foundation.

Look to young Rotarians for fresh perspectives

Want some suggestions about attracting younger members? Look at what's going on at the Roc City Rotary Club in Rochester, New York. "We are the next generation of Rotary," proclaims its website. "The baton has been passed. It's now our turn."

Chartered in February (and a provisional club since June 2016), Roc City targets recent college graduates and young professionals by keeping dues low (\$120 annually) and meetings infrequent. "We meet once a month and have a solid

turnout at every meeting," says Kristina Chartrand, who co-founded the club with her longtime friend Kelsey Christiansen (they met in 2005 as Interactors while in high school). "We want the game changers and move makers, people who are busy and thriving in their everyday lives. We attract young people who want to get involved but crave flexibility."

At press time, the club had 24 members, aged 21 to 33, as well as 20-plus "Friends of Roc City." Members are recruited through word of mouth and social media; it helps that Roc City convenes during happy hour at a local pub. "So many people see us and what we're doing and just stop by," Chartrand says. The club plans service projects three months in advance so members can plan ahead, and it regularly schedules speakers for its Adulting 101 series (topics have included "Paying Off Debt" and "How to Buy a House"). "We want this to be something club members look forward to every month" – for years to come.

International Toast:

Kerry proposed an International Toast to the Rotary Club of Dunedin, Florida.

The club was chartered 20 January 1947 and lies in District 6950. President Dave Kelly and members meet each Tues 12.15pm – 1.15pm at the Dunedin Golf Club.

For many years the club was known as the "The Banner Club" as the result of collecting banners from around the world. They have in excess of 22 000 banners, which have now been donated to RI.



An interesting fact about early days in the club was its strict attendance rule – if a member left a meeting without having been there for 60% of the time, they would be deemed absent. Wow! Also, all members of the club are part of The Paul Harris Society!

Over the past 60 years the club has many projects including – provision of a shelter, beach clean-ups, tree planting projects, supporting Interact, Adopt a Family program, school supplies for the needy, Clothes to Kids, school reading programs, Dunedin Fine Art Centre, Rotary Camp Florida, Dunedin Library resources, resources for Boy Scouts & Dunedin Historical Society, an annual community donation of \$50 000 back into the local community, over \$100 000 in scholarships to local high schools.

International projects include – involvement in Matching Grants to develop nations and support GSE teams to India, Scotland and Germany. The club has purchased an ambulance for a hospital in India, sent computers to and software to Croatia, school supplies to Haiti and West Samoa and shelter boxes to disaster areas around the world.

The club collaborates with Belize rotary clubs by funding humanitarian projects. In 2017, the club collaborated with other clubs to secure a global grant of \$100 000 to support a teacher training program in Belize City.

Members joined Kerry to toast President Dave Kelly and members of the RC of Dunedin and RI.


