

Step right up 4: In Rotary's membership game, everyone's a winner – more ideas for clubs

Appeal to local volunteers

In fall 2014, the Rotary Club of Evanston, Illinois, held its inaugural "Heads Up, Evanston!" an event that's equal parts community outreach, game show, and, as one member puts it, "organizational speed dating."

"We encourage participants to connect with each other during and after the meeting and find new ways to collaborate and partner based on what they have heard each other say," explains Past Club President Paul Larson. "We follow up

by sending all participants a PDF with everyone's contact information as an added convenience."

The participants in this service-oriented dating game are local not-for-profit organizations, about 25 per annual session. Representatives from each organization get exactly two minutes to, as Larson puts it, "give a commercial or news item about themselves." The time limit is rigidly enforced, albeit in a light-hearted manner. Talk too long and speakers are cut off by a "cheesy disco song from the '70s," Larson says. "This makes it fun since people do their best to finish before the dreaded sounds of an old Bee Gees tune or the theme from Rocky tells them time is up." Finish your "commercial" in 90 seconds or less and the Rotary bell rings, meaning the speaker gets invited back for a free lunch with the club and another opportunity to speak. The "Heads Up" gathering includes a modestly priced lunch – which "organizations are happy to pay," says Larson - and post-gathering mingling around tables laden with promotional materials.

"While the event definitely has the potential to build membership in the long term, we use it strategically as a supplement to more direct recruiting efforts," Larson says. But, he adds, it's also a way for the club to provide "a service to the community – a way for us to offer unique value as a forum for leaders." And because the club also presents its own "commercial," he notes, it's also an opportunity for "awareness building about what Rotary is and what we do." Sounds like a love connection.

International Toast:


Deb proposed an International Toast to the Rotary Club of Las Vegas






Jessica Love

Executive Director, Daring Girls

Jessica Love is Executive Director of Daring Girls, which partners locally with organizations in Africa to ensure that girls have the knowledge, tools, mentorship, and support to confidently design their own futures. Together, Daring Girls and our partners are building a world where every girl has the skills, confidence, and savvy to design her own future and dare to become who she wants to be



positive changes in society, yet only 39% of girls in Tanzania go to secondary school, and only 3% go on to tertiary education. Daring Girls develop programs that help younger girls stay in school and complete their lower secondary education while building critical skills that build confidence and inspire belief in their future potential. They also support mentoring programs for older adolescent girls that help them build leadership skills, as well as personal qualities like confidence and resilience, supporting them to succeed well beyond secondary school. All of the programming they support pairs girls with a university educated woman mentor who serves as a role model and example of what every girl can become: a woman who confidently designs her own future

Jessica joined the organization in 2020. In the last four years, Jessica has been able to secure the largest single gift in the organization's history, successfully renamed and rebranded the organization from its previous name, AfricAid, to Daring Girls, and she has expanded the organization's reach from one country to four, serving more girls in more countries. She is an experienced communications strategist who has managed media relations, community and stakeholder outreach for domestic and international nonprofit, foundation and corporate organizations for 20 years. Before joining Daring Girls, she provided communications counsel to a variety of organizations, including HOPE Foundation for Women & Children of Bangladesh and Fistula Foundation, where she previously spent several years leading communications efforts to raise awareness and funds to treat women suffering from obstetric fistula, a devastating childbirth injury.

What We Have Accomplished DID YOU KNOW?

- January Service: 8 club members and 8 Palo Verde High School students cleaned our designated portion of the Red Rock Loop (Highway Clean Up), providing a total of 40 hrs of volunteer service.
- January Community Service: 3 Rotarians plus a former Rotarian provided 9 hrs of volunteer service at Discovery Museum's Community Resource Fair.
- Community Grants: Approved grant of \$2,400 to Family To Family Connections for educational school supplies.

Santa Clothes is a multi-club service project spearheaded by the Las Vegas Rotary Club and supported by all the Southern Nevada area Rotary Clubs. Santa Clothes could not happen with the help and support of its longtime supporter JC Penny's.

More than 366 people helped with the shopping and logistics at JC Penny's. When the kids were done, they were taken to UNLV to play at various stations hosted by members of UNLV's men's and women's athletic teams. Thereafter they were fed lunch and were given an inspirational speech about the importance of hard work and education. When they left, they all received a sports ball.

Named for one of the founders of the Rotary Club of Las Vegas, Walter Bracken Elementary School is a recognized learning center serving approximately 450 children. Bracken has become a Science, Technology, Engineering, Art and Math (Steam) Academy and a Blue-Ribbon Magnet School. The Principal, Katie Decker, was named at the top Magnet School Principal in America in 2013. As a result of our partnership, the school is run according to the Rotary 4-Way Test and twice each year the Rotary Club of Las Vegas provides grants for large projects not in the School's budget.

The Club participates in Reading Week and in Career Day at Walter Bracken Elementary School. Rotarians also judge the Science Fair and the Engineering Fair, paint the States, individually, on the sidewalk squares, and paint the hopscotch areas with Roman Numerals.

In further support of learning and the arts, the Las Vegas Rotary Club sponsors the annual Disney Musical, donates books to the school library and refreshes the Lego lab.

Replacing high water consuming grass, the Club supports the vegetable gardens and fruit trees at the school. Rotarians are also a visible presence at the school and help in many different special assemblies and gatherings.

Tony spoke about:-

- The purpose of the RF which was set up to fund humanitarian work that Rotary does. It is Rotary's only charity.
 - RF Motto to do good in the world
- RF has 7 focus areas Peace Building & Conflict Resolution, Preventing Disease, Water Sanitation & Hygiene, Maternal & Child Health, Basic Education & Literacy, Community Economic Development, Environment

Connection between the money the RF receives & how it is managed & spent

- <u>Polio</u> every dollar raised is matched by the Gates Fdn. Still 450 million children being vaccinated every year / 12 cases in 2023 / 99.5% eradicated / last case of wild polio virus was in Pakistan
- Annual Fund invested for 3 years then distributed through district & global grants
 District grant examples from RC Burleigh Rotary Broadwater Chapel, Solar Buddy projects,
 Fishing Buddies, medical equip to health centre in India
 Global grant example partnering with UNICEF

- Endowment Fund money is permanently invested with interest being distributed to district & global grants. Peace Scholars 130 every year
- **Disaster Response Funds / Grants** \$25 000 US grants
- **Corporate funding** RF Aust has Public Benevolent Initiative. Tax deductible.

RF in top 1% of world's charities 92c in dollar goes to the cause 4 star rating 15 years in a row
