Our bursary students have sent information about their Semester 1 studies:

Flynn Woodall

This semester I have found that I have begun to complete some of my elective major (Environmental Engineering) subjects. This has been really good as it has allowed me to explore a range of different topics while also decreasing my workload, in comparison to previous semesters. One thing that I was quite excited about was only having 3 final exams to study for this semester until I realised that one of them was 3 hours long.

During this semester the subjects I completed were, CHEE3005 (Reaction Engineering) where we focused on designing chemical reactors focusing on non-ideal, non-steady state reactors. Another subject that I took was ENVM3103 (Regulatory Frameworks for Environmental Management & Planning) where we covered the environmental law and legislation required when developing and planning projects. Personally, I found that this subject was very different from other Engineering subjects and although I didn't enjoy it, it was still a good subject to choose as it allowed me to realise that this career pathway isn't for me.

The third subject I completed this semester was CHEE3004- (Unit Operations) which focused on a broad range of equipment such as dryers, heat exchangers, distillation columns, absorption columns, thickener and evaporators and the design criteria for each of them.

My final subject I completed was Environmental Phenomena (ENVE3160) which was a combined Chemical and Civil course. As such, it involved revising a lot of content that I had already covered while also providing new content regarding biological contaminants and wastewater treatment as well as covering sustainability models. Currently I am working out at Tarong Power station as part of a Placement with the Health, Safety and Environment team.

Next semester the course that I have chosen are CHEE3020 (Process Systems Analysis), CHEE3007 (Process Modelling and Control), ENVE3150 (Environmental Systems Dynamics and Modelling) and GEOS3102 (Global Change: Problems & Prospects)

Dear Kingaroy Rotary Club members,

I hope all of you are well. This semester has flown by with both work and university. As I am writing this to you, I have just finished my exams and am finally getting my life back to normal after a very stressful few weeks.

This semester I joined the UQ Ecology Society, as my friend became president this year. It has allowed me to go on a variety of excursions with experts in their field and I have learnt a lot. A highlight was going with the Marine Society and seeing an endangered seahorse and nudibranchs in the wild. I have attached some photos below.

My favourite courses this semester were an Indigenous studies elective course and a core molecular biology course. My molecular biology course this semester was intense and covered a lot of complex content. However, I found it extremely interesting as it really goes into the mechanisms of how complicated a cell is and how organised every component is, making me glad that I chose it as my major. I also greatly enjoyed my Indigenous studies elective due to the evident care that the course coordinator put into the course. Each week there was an Indigenous person who guest lectured us on their career and experiences within their industry. A few examples of guest lecturers were ladies such as Freja Carmichael (Writer/Curator), Professor Anita Heiss (Researcher/Author), Professor Tracey Bunda (Researcher/Indigenous education) and Carroll Go-Sam (Researcher/Architect). This course was extremely interesting and widened my knowledge on a variety of topics covered over the semester.

Additionally, this semester I was also lucky enough to attend the Extracellular Vesicles in Neurodegenerative Diseases (EViND) symposium that had researchers from all over the world speak on varying topics such as the latest research in Parkinsons, Alzheimer's and retinal degeneration.

My continued work as a laboratory technician has been extremely helpful in building connections within the industry and giving me invaluable experience. I am actively working towards a chemist or micro/cell-biologist role for after I graduate.

Next semester I am really looking forward to my developmental biology courses, I really enjoyed my developmental neuroscience course last year and wish to further explore this topic. This choice was further cemented when I attended the symposium this semester. To which really went into detail about the mechanisms of these extremely prevalent diseases on a molecular biology level, which I greatly enjoyed.

I wanted to thank you again for your continued support of my education. Without your support I would not be able to have all these opportunities available to me. I cannot wait to update you as my studies progress.

In our clinical skills module, we have also learnt how to perform history taking and vital signs. My highlight for this semester was the subject Cells to Life, in which we learnt about the cells that compose different tissues and how these interact to produce a living organism. I will be attending a GP placement at a local clinic in Kingaroy these holidays, which I am very excited for! In semester 2, I am excited for all of our subjects. We will be learning about the muscular-skeletal systems, the reproductive systems, and genetics. I think it will be very interesting to look closer at these body systems, and it will feel more like we are studying medicine rather than just science. Finally, I would like to thank Rotary for your ongoing support, it was through your help that I was able to buy textbooks which are fundamental to my study.

I have had so much fun this semester. Just finished exams last week, pretty sure I'm happy with my performance but will not know until results are released in a couple of weeks. So far second semester has been a lot more difficult, yet simultaneously much more interesting. My subjects this semester were cardiovascular medicine, which is all about the heart, Haematology and renal medicine, which teaches functions of the kidney and blood. Respiratory medicine, about the lungs and airways, and rural remote indigenous tropical health, which targets common struggles faced by particular areas and communities in Australia. The highlight for this semester has been clinical skills, which is a clinical subject, where I have learnt to perform a cardiovascular exam, respiratory exam, ECGs and how to suture. I am really looking forward to placement next semester, especially considering I will hopefully get to use some of these clinical skills in a real clinical setting. This placement will be after exams are finished, where I am fortunate enough to be spending 4 weeks in Emerald, working in the hospital and neighbouring clinics to gain a better understanding of rural practice. Thank you once again for all of your support, can't wait to hopefully catch up again at the end of the year.

• Ray showed the meeting a video from the Rotary and World Health Organisation around the eradication of polio across the world – 2 countries remain with wild polio – Afghanistan and Pakistan – as both countries share a border, they have to work together to eradicate this virus. Extensive progress to provide vaccinations to children in the areas where the virus is still circulating. Also, extensive work is being done in Africa – the need to maintain vigilant in African countries is required to ensure that the wild polio virus continues to be eradicated – we need to make sure that children across the African continent so that community immunity is developed. Polio eradication is a global initiative. 1. Surveillance to identify and access risk – reporting back on polio, measles and diphtheria. 2, Micro-planning – to have knowledge of where all the children are for essential immunisation

- 3. 800 million immunisations across the world address what the communities of greatest risk need, eg. Soap
- Message to Rotarians thanks from the World Health Organisation enormous gains have been made because of the polio interventions we need to continue to ensure that we have zero virus across the world
