CLUB SPECIFIC INFORMATION MEMBERSHIP TYPES

Each Rotary club can have Active as well as Honorary members, they may also add other designations. Ours are as follows:

- 1. Active Members are full voting members of the club who can hold any leadership position.
- 2. **Branch members** are full voting members of the club who can hold any leadership position. They are created when 8 or more members live geographically close and would like to organize local community efforts. They have their own organizational structure and leadership model.
- 3. Organizational memberships are all part of the same organization. We require that the organization name one primary representative who will be considered "the full paying member". Dues will be assigned to this member with the understanding that the organization will cover the costs. Subsequent members from that organization can join and pay a lesser dues amount, as determined by the board. All Organizational members will be full Rotary members, can hold office and vote. Organizations must be approved by the Board.
- 4. Associate members are members of another Rotary Club. All Associate members are considered full voting members, but they are not eligible to hold a board position.
- 5. Honorary members are not required to pay dues and have no voting rights. Honorary membership is used to recognize people who have distinguished themselves by meritorious service and embody Rotary ideals, or those considered friends of Rotary for their support of Rotary's causes.

MEETING BASICS

We have social time 15 minutes before and after each Business Meeting.

We also have time allotted to share what you are up to regarding human trafficking.

You are welcome to invite others, just don't post the meeting link on social media and let President@endHTrotaryclub.org know who is coming so we know to let them enter the meeting space.

ROTARY 101





ROTARY TIMELINE

1905 Paul P. Harris convenes **first Rotary meeting** in Chicago, Illinois.

1907 First service project - public toilets to improve sanitation in the city.

1910 Members representing 16 Rotary clubs gather at the first Rotary Convention and create the **National Association of Rotary Clubs of America.**

1912 Rotary becomes an **international organization** with the chartering of the Rotary Club of Winnipeg, Manitoba, Canada.

1912 The chartering of a club in London, U.K. puts Rotary in Europe.

1917 An endowment is established "for the purpose of doing good in the world," which becomes a precursor to **The Rotary Foundation** which is formally named in 1928.

1919 Rotary charters a club in Montevideo, Uruguay which brings Rotary to **South America**.

1919 A Rotary club is chartered in Manila, Philippines bringing Rotary to **Asia**.

1921 Rotary reaches Oceania and Africa.

1943 Rotary adopts <u>The Four-Way Test</u>, one of the world's most widely printed and quoted statements of business ethics.

1957 <u>Paul Harris Fellow recognition</u> is established in 1957 to show appreciation for and encourage substantial contributions to the Foundation.

1962 The <u>first Interact club</u> is certified at Melbourne High School, in Florida, USA. Interact empowers students in intermediate and secondary school to learn leadership skills.

1968 Rotary <u>certifies its first Rotaract club</u> at the University of North Carolina at Charlotte in the U.S. Rotaract is created as a program for collegeage students and young professional.

1975 Rotary clubs have been facilitating student exchanges since the 1920s. In 1975, Rotary recognizes **Rotary Youth Exchange** as an official program administered by clubs and districts.

1979 A multi-year grant project to immunize children in the Philippines <u>launches Rotary in the fight to eradicate polio</u>

1987 <u>Women join Rotary clubs throughout the U.S.</u> following a decision by the U.S. Supreme Court. In 1989, women join clubs worldwide.

1988: **Peace Forums and advocacy:** The Foundation holds its <u>first Peace Forum</u>.

1999: Foundation Trustees approve the <u>creation</u> of the Rotary Centers for International Studies in peace and conflict resolution

2014: Progress against polio: India was once thought to be one of the most challenging places to end polio. In 2014, India goes three full years without a case of polio caused by the wild polio virus and the World Health Organization (WHO) South-East Asia region is certified polio free. In Nigeria sustained efforts to vaccinate children, who previously couldn't be reached because of a lack of security in the country's northern states, finally results in that country reaching the three year milestone. The WHO African region is certified wild poliovirus-free in 2020.

DID YOU KNOW...

The name **Rotary** was selected by early members because meeting locations rotated among their offices.

The Rotary Club to End Human Trafficking (RCEHT), a 100% virtual club, is building our Rotary network via our Associate members, who are already members of community-based Rotary clubs. #MYFREEDOMDAY 2025 UPDATE

Did you know, 12 million children are trapped in slavery right now? **#MyFreedomDay is on March 11th** and is all about raising awareness of modern-day slavery and celebrating the importance of freedom.

For this year, the organizers are hoping to engage at least one school from every country. All they are asking is for students to make a **short**:12 second video holding up a sign that says **#MyFreedomDay** – a simple yet powerful way to stand in solidarity. Any number of students - from 1 to 1,000 - can take part. Right now, schools from over **150 countries** are participating. The best part? **It's completely free** to take part and every school will be included on television and broadcast via CNN International around the world! And here are some other ideas, resources, and messages from other organizations in preparation for #MyFreedomDay on March 11. Nonprofits and companies can support students in these efforts locally and on social media, as well:

- All school walkout in honor of those trapped in modern slavery
- Host a Fair Trade/ethically sourced products fashion show or food sale. See the guide here.
- Host a panel discussion with local experts
- Host a color run
- Organize a stand for freedom
- Create a school-wide art installation with messages of freedom
- Host a student concert
- Host a movie night that raises awareness of the issue
- Organize petition signing and letter writing to companies and local lawmakers
- Bring in curriculum to train faculty, staff, students, and parents on the dangers of human trafficking
- Host a film festival dispelling myths about trafficking
- At the very least post to social media, what makes you feel free and include #myfreedomday in your post.

HERE IS A STORY





IN A SMALL TOWN, A SMALL DEBATE ABOUT HUMAN TRAFFICKING

RCEHT Board Member Erin Maloney often takes walks with her friend "Marie" in their petite ville in the Eastern Townships of Québec (Canada). From time to time, Erin has mentioned Rotary and her club's cause. While Marie still doesn't really understand "Rotary", Erin feels like Marie now has a better grasp of the problems with human trafficking.

Last week, Marie was at a supper party without Erin. Someone casually mentioned, there's no such thing as human trafficking. Marie piped in, *mais oui!* There IS human trafficking. You know Erin! She's in some kind of organization -- I can't remember the name of the organization -- but it fights human trafficking. It exists!

And, another person said, *oui*, human trafficking does exist. And the first person was surprised, but not in denial.

Moral of the story: Now a few more people in a small, non-English-speaking town know a bit more about human trafficking, and will perhaps look at the world in a slightly different way. (They do not, however, know a thing about Rotary.)



January 11, 2025 was National Human Trafficking Awareness Day, aka #WearBlueDay, in the US. Throughout the month, Blue Campaign hosts several special events and educational activities, with a spotlight on #WearBlueDay.

Why blue? It's the international color of human trafficking awareness.

The theme for 2025 was Preventing Trafficking, focusin on a holistic approach to prevent trafficking by recognizing its connections to other forms of violence and abuse, such as labor exploitation, online harassment and abuse, and interpersonal violence.

Every year, the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime estimates that the majority of persons are trafficked from Asia to Europe.
