TRAGAST LIBRARY PROJECT

At the Programs and Projects committee meeting on March16 (with members Annette, Cindee, and Erin present), it was decided to **recommend** that RCEHT fund the Thailand Rotary Action Group Against Child Slavery (TRAGAST) Library Project.

The TRAGAST Library project is "soft marketing" raising awareness of human trafficking and the fact that Rotary is involved in the fight. Also, by purchasing books written by Matt Friedman we are supporting his excellent work and we know that profits from these books are put back into the fight against human trafficking.

As funding and manpower become available our plan is to duplicate the library project in other cities like Bangkok, Pattaya and Phuket, thus increasing awareness of RCEHT, RAGAS and TRAGAST. For Rotary Year 2023 – 2024 we hope to replace books in existing libraries and install at least 5 new libraries in Bangkok.

The team has free libraries at various locations throughout Chiang Mai. Locations are frequented by the English-speaking community and tourists. Each library has a sign identifying RCEHT, RAGAS and TRAGAST. Each book has the same information on a sticker inside the front cover. The purpose is to attract attention to our organizations and the fight against human trafficking. We monitor each library, keeping close track of Matt Friedman's books at each location. RCEHT financial support for this project will allow us to expand the library project to other cities; perhaps Bangkok or Pattaya.

The goals for this project is to :

- Educate every child about the dangers of human trafficking.
- Increase Awareness, especially within the Rotary Community

Strategies :

- Collaboration Increased awareness and cooperation between actors involved in the fight against human trafficking in Thailand and the Mekong region.
- Prevention Projects to deliver education curriculum to students in schools and migrant learning centers throughout Thailand, aiming towards 5 – 18 years of age.
- Awareness -increased awareness of TRAGAST through presentations and social media.

The club and foundation boards approved \$450 for this grant which will provide 10 copies of "Where were you" and 10 copies of "Dancing in the Light of the Moon".
