


President's Letter

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EMPOWER WOMEN, RESTORE HOPE





Theodora Ghana Virtual Assistants (TGVA) is a Ghana-based social impact business. Its mission is to provide an exit for women who have had to resort to sex work to survive. It does this through a unique combination of training connected to direct employment. Further, the employment is providing virtual administrative services to small businesses and self-employed individuals in developed countries. This allows the women to be paid vastly more than they would get providing the same services in Ghana, a critical factor to give women a true, economically stable future.



TGVA's founder, Rotarian Michael Podolny, came to Ghana in February 2019. Attacking this problem of liberating women from sex work was far from his thoughts. However, upon arriving, he was introduced to the problem through others working to aid disadvantaged women. As he began to work with some of the women on a first-hand basis, he could see their incredible potential. He visualized the concept of using remote outsourced work as the driver to change the trajectory of their lives. Working with other Rotarians in Ghana, Michael developed a vision of not just employing these women, but empowering them through ownership. That led to the development of the Theodora program.

Today, TGVA has achieved goals few social impact enterprises have. It has transformed the lives of ten women in the past four years providing them the opportunity for a middle-class life in Ghana. It has achieved self-funding sustainability. The revenues provide 100% of the company's (employment) to the women who participate in the program. How many social impact organizations can make that statement? The vision of employee ownership is just on the horizon. An Employee Ownership Trust is scheduled to be initiated in the first quarter of 2025. And the Theodora women have taken ownership of the mission to help women get free from sex work. They are all now members of the Rotary Club to End Human Trafficking with one sitting on the Board of Directors

None of this came easy. Our program was launched in April 2020 just as the Covid 19 pandemic was closing down our country and the United States. We had to scramble to figure out how to do training in a locked-down environment. Our funding dried up. We were forced to go to market with services before we were ready. Nonetheless, we persevered, overcame, and succeeded.

All this was accomplished because of an initial influx of capital from donations and fundraising. We are proud that we have a business we know can support us. But we are greedy. We want other Ghanaian women trapped in sex work to have the lifeline and future building we are enjoying. To do that we again need to raise new capital through additional donations and fundraising.

For all we have achieved, we have a lot more that needs to be done. The circumstances of our launch meant we raised less money than our plan called for. This led to compromises in the original model. The target for our current campaign is \$41,000. The goal of the 2025 campaign is to rectify some of these compromises. They are as follows.

- Upgrade our computer systems Our current computer systems are outdated and do not support rapid work. They freeze during work hours and require many repairs. This causes frustrations and delays in the delivery of clients' work.
- Add New Participants and Fulfill Our Mission to Help More Women - We also plan on onboarding and training at least four more women. It takes six to nine months to fully onboard and train a participant to be fully utilized. During that period we need to pay trainers and provide them with a stipend so they stop sex work.
- Improve Work Space and Work Conditions We also need to improve our working space. Our current office location is very far from where our people live due to the high price of office space. Most of the ladies come from afar and they have to sleep in the office to avoid the traffic and stress from commuting. This causes a lack of sleep because of the noises coming from the moving cars and traders. Others end up getting sick because there's no bed in the office for comfortable sleep.

We need your help because we are not yet able to make these kinds of investments alone. The women we are serving are more than statistics, they are mothers, daughters, sisters, and future leaders. The Theodora model has shown they can achieve and become self-sufficient, productive members of society.

We urge everyone to support us by donating to help us raise funds for the 2025 goal.

CLUB FUNDRAISING DRIVE

The Rotary Club to End Human Trafficking (RCEHT) Board has identified three strategic priorities for the next 2 years. As with any organizational priorities, funding is usually required. With that in mind, we have estimated the financial needs to support these exciting initiatives. Because we are a small club with many of our members who come from countries where human trafficking is endemic, we cannot raise funds on our own. We are seeking your support AND ask that you reach out to your own networks in addition to ask them to support our club initiatives. Our initiatives for the next 2 years:

1. Economic Development: We are looking to provide seed funding to support entrepreneurs starting businesses as options to trafficking.

This Initiative:

- Focuses on geographic areas where trafficking is known to be a problem.
- Identifies candidates who are open to change and are ambitious despite the circumstances they are in.
- Recruits mentors who are passionate about the mission, empathetic, supportive, understand business, and are good teachers.
- Delivers core teaching (learning management system) in a manner easy for candidates to absorb.
- Provides capital and on-going support and community to overcome inevitable challenges.

FUNDING NEEDED for 2024-2026: \$2,000 USD

2. Support of our Club Branches and Branch members:

Our club has created "branches" in communities where we have a significant number of members. The goal is to maintain at least 2 branches with at least 10 people each. Our first branch in Ghana already has 12 people! Unfortunately, these members cannot afford the costs of membership, so we are looking for others to support these amazing people who have overcome so much and are improving their lives in their own countries.

There are two ways you can help:

- 1. Support an individual with their annual dues: 20 individuals at \$250 USD/year/person
- 2. Support a branch=2 branches at \$2,500 USD/year

FUNDING NEEDED for 2024-2026: \$5,000

3. Partner with other Rotary clubs for Rotary District and Global Grant matching grants

More clubs within our District are interested in projects that can impact other countries to end human trafficking. Our district has many clubs who are generous and great collaborators and know the power of leveraging dollars. Our club has already contributed \$500 to a grant that another Rotary Club was recently awarded for a Global grant of more than \$40,000. We want to continue to support great work with other clubs to increase the power of collaboration.

FUNDING GOAL FOR 2024-2026: \$2,000 USD

THE TOTAL FUNDRAISING GOAL FOR THESE PROJECTS ARE \$9,000. If just 1/2 of our mailing list gave \$100, we would blow past our goal. So please consider a donation now!

SUCCESS STORY



EXAMINING FACTORS PREDICTING SEXUAL EXPLOITATION AMONG VICTIMS OF HUMAN TRAFFICKING

Bassey, our club's president -elect, attended the 2024 Annual Meeting of the American Society of Criminology in San Francisco Marriott Marquis on Wednesday 13th November, 2024. He presented a paper titled "Examining **Factors** Predicting Sexual **Exploitation Among** Victims of Human Trafficking" at meeting.



The document focuses on identifying and understanding the factors that predict sexual exploitation among victims of human trafficking. Key aspects of the study include the methods traffickers use to control victims, the types of sexual services victims are coerced into, the nature of the relationship between victims and traffickers, and how different female age groups are impacted.

The study uses data from the Counter-Trafficking Data Collaborative (CTDC) covering 2002-2019, and applies Biderman's theory of coercion to analyze the control mechanisms used by traffickers, such as debt bondage, threats, sexual abuse, and psychological manipulation. The research also identifies which age groups are more vulnerable, revealing that younger females are at higher risk of sexual exploitation.

The study concludes that traffickers' methods of control, such as the use of threats, sexual abuse, and false promises, significantly predict sexual exploitation. Additionally, the study finds that victim-recruiter relationships, including intimate partnerships, play a crucial role in the likelihood of exploitation. The findings emphasize the importance of focusing on age vulnerability, highlighting that older women (30 and above) are less likely to be trafficked for sexual exploitation.

The paper suggests that law enforcement and victim assistance programs could use these insights to better target interventions and prevent exploitation.

ERIN MALONEY FINALIST FOR VOLUNTEER PRIZE IN QUÉBEC

RCEHT member **Erin Maloney** was surprised to have been nominated for a Québece-wide prize. She was even more surprised when she found out that she was one of three finalists for a 2024 Solange-Chalvin prize, in the category of "Volunteer who assisted people in learning French".

Erin was nominated by the <u>Adult Education Center that serves her region</u>, basically the towns and villages surrounding the city of Sherbrooke, Québec -- especially Magog, Val-des-Sources and Windsor.



As background, Erin moved to Windsor (Québec) during the summer of 2021 with an intermediate knowledge of French. In January 2022 she enrolled in the province-sponsored French courses, finishing the final "advanced" level 18 months later.

Erin found the courses rewarding because she learned not only French but also more about the culture of living in Québec.

Before even finishing her courses, Erin discovered that the teachers at the Center where she started her classes were struggling to teach the 25+ students in the evening courses at Val-des-Sources. She proposed to her former teacher Madame Marie-Mai Barlow that perhaps she could somehow help, as a sort of "volunteer teachers' aide".

Erin volunteered there one evening a week for over a year. She found it to be a "win-win" situation, in that she was able to improve her own French while assisting the teachers and students, the latter being primarily temporary workers, who even in "free" places like Québec can be victims of human trafficking.

Erin would like to continue volunteering with the Center. Unfortunately, however, French courses for temporary workers have been suspended for an undetermined period, starting November 1, 2024.

Nevertheless, the ceremony took place on Friday, November 8 in Montréal with Monsieur Jean-François Roberge, the Minister of Immigration, Francisation and Integration. Erin was very happy that Madame Sophie Mailhot, the person from the Center who nominated her, could attend the ceremony. They are together in the photo.

CLUB SPECIFIC INFORMATION MEMBERSHIP TYPES

Each Rotary club can have Active as well as Honorary members, they may also add other designations. Ours are as follows:

- 1. **Active Members** are full voting members of the club who can hold any leadership position.
- 2. **Branch members** are full voting members of the club who can hold any leadership position. They are created when 8 or more members live geographically close and would like to organize local community efforts. They have their own organizational structure and leadership model.
- 3. Organizational memberships are all part of the same organization. We require that the organization name one primary representative who will be considered "the full paying member". Dues will be assigned to this member with the understanding that the organization will cover the costs. Subsequent members from that organization can join and pay a lesser dues amount, as determined by the board. All Organizational members will be full Rotary members, can hold office and vote. Organizations must be approved by the Board.
- 4. Associate members are members of another Rotary Club. All Associate members are considered full voting members, but they are not eligible to hold a board position.
- 5. Honorary members are not required to pay dues and have no voting rights. Honorary membership is used to recognize people who have distinguished themselves by meritorious service and embody Rotary ideals, or those considered friends of Rotary for their support of Rotary's causes.

MEETING BASICS

We have social time 15 minutes before and after each Business Meeting.

We also have time allotted to share what you are up to regarding human trafficking.

You are welcome to invite others, just don't post the meeting link on social media and let President@endHTrotaryclub.org know who is coming so we know to let them enter the meeting space.

The Board meets the 1st Thursday of every month.

ROTARY'S ORIGIN STORY

The first Rotary club was started in Chicago, Illinois, USA, in 1905 by an attorney named Paul Harris. Harris wanted to bring together a group of professionals with different backgrounds and skills as a way to exchange ideas and form meaningful acquaintances. In August 1910, the 16 Rotary clubs then in the United States formed the National Association of Rotary Clubs, now Rotary International. In 1912, Rotary expanded to a few more countries, and by July 1925, Rotary clubs existed on six continents. Today, there are over 46,000 clubs worldwide with over 1.4 million members.

Rotary was founded on principles that remain at the heart of the organization today. These principles reflect our core values — integrity, diversity, service, leadership, and fellowship, or friendship. Our core values emerge as themes in our guiding principles.
