Our mission was to ask everyone we met whether they knew about Rotary's efforts to eradicate polio, and tell them about our progress.

Though some residents took out their wallets, we were not (nor could we be) fundraising. But as we meandered through Highland Park's shopping district, we met many folks who clearly remembered what it was like when they were little, new moms not quite understanding why their children still needed to be vaccinated for polio, and many who had friends and acquaintances who had polio as children. More than we expected to hear about.

One story stood out. We met one elderly woman and her daughter who told us a bit about their life in Ukraine during and after World War II. She and her husband had been born in Germany but ended up in Ukraine when the fighting started. Her husband was a pediatrician. The woman teared up when speaking about how frustrated and helpless her husband felt when trying to treat his little polio patients – it affected us too as we comforted her. But the reassurance that the cases were now down to 9 worldwide, and Rotary's worldwide vaccination of children lifted her spirits – and we said our farewells and moved on.

We probably saw over 50 folks on the streets of Highland Park today, and several more in the restaurant afterwards, including our US Congressman, who was aware of Rotary's polio efforts. He thanked us for our outreach to the Highland Park Community.

Taking our EPN message to the wider non-Rotarian community energized us. And makes us even more determined to share Rotary's message of hope and action to more communities and non-Rotarians through service project participation in the coming months. Stay tuned!
