GLOBAL COMPENDIUM OF HUMAN TRAFFICKING LAWS

RAGAS is excited to partner with Jones Day on a Global Compendium of human trafficking laws.

The Global Compendium-Human Trafficking Laws project seeks to create a global compendium that would make available the first single standardized summaries of human trafficking and modern slavery laws of each country and all U.S. states and territories.

The intended users of this Compendium include governments, legislators, NGOs, companies, victims, victim advocates, academics, attorneys, and others. The information in the Compendium not only summarizes laws and identifies resources but also provides that information in a standardized format.

This standardization should facilitate use of compendium information and permit users to easily compare the laws of different countries on the same topic. For example, a country's human trafficking laws on supply chain reporting are in Section 4 for each country chapter. Some country chapters also contain custom sections addressing specific additional information.



The law firm of Jones Day partnered with the Rotary Action Group Against Slavery and various corporations to produce this Compendium.

The initial installment of the compendium contains about 90 separate pdfs of the human trafficking laws in various countries/states/territories. To summarize each country's human trafficking laws is a substantial undertaking especially as laws change from time to time. Rather than delay availability of this information, it was decided to release portions of the Compendium in installments. In the future, additional country chapters will be added and existing chapters updated.



NEW BOOK: "WHERE WERE YOU?: A PROFILE OF MODERN SLAVERY"

Matthew Friedman, RAGAS Board Member

There are more slaves in the world today than any other time in history. Enter the world of human trafficking and explore what we can do together to end this global crime. Where Were You?: A Profile of Modern Slavery by Matthew Friedman provides an up-to-date overview of human trafficking, a largely ignored present-day evil, and recounts true stories of enslavement in Asia today.

Former United Nations and USAID expert Matthew Friedman obtained in-depth first-hand knowledge with boots-on-theground work over 35 years throughout Asia. Human trafficking exists in nearly every nation on earth and Friedman has personally interviewed hundreds of freed slaves and imprisoned traffickers throughout South and Southeast Asia. The modern slave trade operates in brothels, fisheries, clothing and chocolate industries, as well as a myriad of other manufacturing jobs and is a billion dollar business that continues to grow unchecked.

Even with the collective response of governments, the UN and civil society partners, less than 0.2 percent of the victims are assisted. "We"re not winning the fight against human slavery.

Relying solely on the anti-slavery community around the world to tackle the scourge of modern slavery and the criminals behind it simply is not working. "Unless something drastic changes, this trend will continue unabated," writes Friedman.

This book not only reveals the plight of human trafficking victims; Friedman also offers valuable advice and guidance related to his own personal experiences working in the counter-trafficking and development world. He offers valuable lessons for those thinking about entering this field.

Please celebrate a milestone with me: my new Penguin book, WHERE WERE YOU?: A PROFILE OF MODERN SLAVERY, has been published and is available worldwide. In this memoir, I explore the early days of meeting modern slavery survivors and recount true stories of enslavement in Asia.

I recall painful moments that literally changed my life, reflect back on the different approaches to fighting human trafficking over the last 35 years and give an account of the early beginnings of the fight against modern slavery before the phrase "human trafficking" was adopted.

As I reflect on the deeply personal lessons learned, my first and foremost goal for this book is to motivate more people to join me in helping to fight this global crime.

NEW CLUB! ROTARY CLUB OF THE PNW ENDING SEX TRAFFICKING

Please welcome our newest club: Rotary Club of the Pacific Northwest Ending Sex Trafficking, charted on October 1, 2021. We are a unique club in that we are regional, virtual, and single cause, all at once. First, a little bit on our origin story.

The idea for this club germinated from a speaker at Seattle Rotary and was incubated for in the Seattle Rotary Peacebuilders Committee for many years.

As part of the Seattle Rotary
Peacebuilder Committee we completed
several successful projects, the most
successful of which was the Health Care
Alliance where 1,000 health care
professionals and 1,000 Seattle Fire
Fighters were trained on sex trafficking
identification and response. This project
won the best peace project in District
5030 for the Rotary Year 2019-20.

You might be wondering, if the quest to fight sex trafficking is well addressed in an existing Rotary club, why start a whole new club? Great question!

Like all of us, Rotary is innovating. Rotary is working to serve up Rotary in new and creative ways to attract a new membership base and energize an existing membership base.

For people who want to do a deep dive in a single area of focus, these single cause Rotary Clubs are a very compelling format to do so. Rotary PNW Ending Sex Trafficking chartered with 23 members: 16 are brand new to Rotary, 2 are Rotaractors graduating to their first club, 5 are people who had left Rotary years ago and came back.



In addition to these 23 members, we have 8 Rotarians who are fully committed to other clubs but are coming alongside us as mentors.

We meet on the first and third Monday of the month at 5pmPST via zoom. Once a month we have a hands on service project and once a quarter we have an in person fellowship.

Our dues are \$50/qtr plus a \$100 annual contribution to The Rotary Foundation. Here is a quick overview of our service projects:

- Backpack build party with Stolen Youth for homeless youth

FALMOUTH, CAPE COD, U.S. ROTARY CLUB SUPPORTS SLAVERY PREVENTION AND SURVIVOR EDUCATION AND TRAINING

The Rotary Club of Falmouth Cape Cod, in Massachusetts in the USA, has taken up the challenge of focusing on Girls' and Women's Empowerment. President Paul McCadam was Inspired by Rotary International President Shekhar Mehta's passion for helping vulnerable girls and women, and combatting human trafficking.

A subcommittee of the Falmouth Club was formed, led by new member Robin Singer, in order to partner with Her Future Coalition. HFC is an impactful organization, which was formed in 2005 to help survivors of trafficking and at-risk girls through employment training, education, shelter, counseling, and guidance.


The Rotary Club of Falmouth Cape Cod has been given full support and encouragement by District 7950, led by District Governor Billy Roberts, and District Foundation Chair, Stephen Certa. Guidance was also provided by Dave McCleary and Malcolm Baird of RAGAS, the Rotary Action Group Against Slavery.

Her Future Coalition has two new major initiatives for helping some of the world's most vulnerable and at-risk girls and women. One project is in Kolkata, India and the other is in a rural village in Nepal. Some of the worst situations of trafficking of vulnerable girls and women into brothels can be found in these locations.

HFC is building a Learning Center near the Sonagachi Red Light District of Kolkata; the Falmouth club was recently awarded a **District grant** to outfit the tutoring room of this new facility.

The grant will be used for computers, furniture, and supplies. At the facility, all at-risk girls and rescued trafficking victims will have access to computer literacy training, English classes, employment guidance, and financial literacy classes, and a variety of other programs determined by their needs and interests.

The Kolkata Learning Center can be seen during its construction in the picture below.







A school has recently opened in a rural Nepali village, with the support of Her Future Coalition. It was opened by a young woman named Anjali Tamong, who was trafficked from there to the brothels of India, and managed to escape and receive an education through HFC and partner organizations. Her story is told in the book, "Standing in the Way, From Trafficking Victim to Human Rights Activist," which can be accessed here.

Through Ms. Singer of the Falmouth Cape Cod Rotary Club, a tutoring program for English literacy has begun at this school (pictured below), and several additional Rotarians will be participating through writing letters and reading stories.

convenes local service providers, law
enforcement, healthcare workers, and
other community leaders in Lenexa and
Leawood, Kansas to equip them with the
skills to identify human trafficking
systems in their community and develop
networks, techniques, and collaborations
to counterattack these trafficking
systems, thereby reducing the
occurrences of trafficking.

Rotarians are working with Lucy Bloom, Veronica's Voice, and Ashley Chapman, Justice U and Engage Together, to implement this education and collaboration project.

The <u>community conversation videos</u> cover many topics and are informative to everyone involved in anti-human trafficking initiative.

The District 5710 Rotary Human
Trafficking and Domestic Violence DropIn Center global grant in Topeka, KS
established a site with services to support
victims' psychosocial needs and assist
with basic needs of food, rest, laundry,
clothing, and shower facilities in a safe
environment.

The center is an entry point for longerterm community support services. The "Day Center" as it is known, was established in 2019 and is providing services to 25-30 victims per month.

The District 5710 Reintegration of Survivors of Sexual Exploitation and Trafficking global grant in collaboration with Rended Heart and several international and local Rotary clubs has been has been instrumental in the opening of The Ready Training Center and Chosen, A Rended Heart Boutique. The Ready Training Center provides resources and assistance needed to support survivors on their path to sustainable employment. The boutique sells high-end clothing donated by Rotarians.

Survivors will have on-the -job training in retail sales, marketing, financial management, inventory, customer service, and business management. Here is a short video of the organization learning about human trafficking and shopping at the boutique all proceeds from sales go to support survivors.

OTHER EDUCATION INITIATIVES

In April 2021 Rotary Club of Community Action Against Human Trafficking (CAAHT) held a virtual <u>Human Trafficking Summit: Educators Role in Preventing Human Trafficking.</u> Ashlie Bryant founder of 3Strands Foundation along with other panelists discussing curriculum, educations efforts, certification for educators and other resources for community members, teachers, and educators to take part in preventing human trafficking.

Students Stop Traffic - Rotary clubs have partnered with local organizations Intouch Group and Lumen Touch to spread awareness about child trafficking.



Together, the organizations have launched a contest, Student Stop Traffic, which aims to inspire Kansas City-area high school students to create a compelling awareness campaign or idea to combat the trafficking and targeting of peers in their own communities. Ideas could include an advertising campaign, a live event, a social media campaign, or something more.

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DISTRICT GRANTS SUPPORTING HUMAN TRAFFICKING VICTIMS

Rotary Club of Topeka South has used District Grant matching funds for 3 projects.

Fresh Start Kits - When victims are rescued or choose to leave the life they only have the clothes on their backs. This project provides them with a duffle bag of new basic need items, including a set of clothing, socks, underwear, and hygiene products. (See attached list) The Fresh Start kit shows them that someone does care about them, their life has value, and to encourage them to accept help to escape from the life of being trafficked. For many victims this is the first time they have owned anything new.

Safe Line - When victims are coerced or groomed, one of the first things the trafficker does is take the victim's phone and place tracking software on it to maintain control over the victim. This grant is for TracPhones, providing a safe way for victims to reach out for help and escape from the slavery of human trafficking. They will be able to confidentially seek help, reconnect with family and friends, and apply for employment. We have distributed over 100 phones and 30 day unlimited use cards to victims.

Stepping Out - Through our Global Grant project at the Day Center, we learned that traffickers take victims' shoes from them, making it more difficult to leave, especially in winter months. This project provided new shoes in the 5 most common sizes that were distributed to those in need through the Day Center site.
