

Joint Project Partnership: Annual Medical Camp

1. Background and Objective

The medical camp was organized jointly by the Rotary Clubs of Kitante, Kyadondo, Kampala City and the Rotaract Clubs of Kitante and Kyadondo.

The objective was to provide medical services to the less privileged and those in need in Kamwokya. The services included testing, treatment, counselling and creating awareness among others.

This draft report is for purposes of providing accountability to the partners and isn't comprehensive. A technical and comprehensive report is being prepared by the Lead Doctor and facility and will be shared.

2. The District Governor's Visit

The Medical Camp officially commenced with the National Anthem and Opening Prayer. Remarks from the Local leadership representative and medical camp coordinators were glad to be a part of this sustainable project that has been organized on an annual basis.

The Presidents of the Rotary Clubs of; Kitante, Kyadondo and Kampala City had its first joint medical camp projects together this December month, where Rotary focuses on *Disease Prevention and Treatment*.

The District Governor, Geoffrey Martin Kitakule, was the Chief Guest of the event who addressed the Rotarians, Rotaractors, local leaders, and residents at the camp that, 'Rotary Eyamba' meaning Rotary seeks to help under privileged communities. A needs assessment was done by the Rotary Club of Kitante to ensure that sustainable support is given to the Kamwokya

Christian Caring Community (KCCC) Health Center III. Together with the Presidents, an Incubator was handed over. This is equipment that the hospital has been lacking for a long time.

The HC was delighted to receive the incubator because many cases have been referred to Mulago Hospital due its absence. Now that there is an incubator, it is very conducive for expectant mothers around Kamwokya.

The incubator will be of use to support a newborn baby in the following ways;

- ❖ Babies born prematurely may need additional time to develop their lungs and other vital organs such as the eyes, ear drums that normal light may cause permanent damage.
- ❖ In the event that the baby is not born prematurely, low birth weight may add to the essential sue of an incubator.
- ❖ Sometimes, babies will have fluid or meconium in their lungs that can lead to infections and an inability to breathe well.
- ❖ Incubators can also reduce the chance of germs and other additional infections as the newborn heals from an illness.
- ❖ Many doctors will briefly incubate a baby of the mother had gestational diabetes, so that the baby can be kept warm as their blood sugars are monitored.
- ❖ A newborn that has experienced trauma, during birth, they may require constant monitoring and additional medical support.
- ❖ Also, the incubator is essential when a baby needs to have surgery for a complication following their birth.

The DG commended the club in showcasing the motto of Rotary, which is ‘Service Above Self’ as well as adding to the current District slogan, ‘RotaryEyamba.’

3. Inspection done by the District Governor and the Medical Services

The District Governor made an inspection of the medical services being availed at the camp as well as the process from registration, blood pressure and weight checks, medical camp services to the pharmacy where the drugs are administered.

4. Corporate partners involved

The Medical Camp received donations from; HARISS International Limited who donated 10 bins for TLC to support in waste management, and refreshments (sodas and Krystal Mineral Water) for the camp attendees and blood donors. C-Care offered their medical personnel to volunteer. Fresh Dairy distributed 4 boxes of whole milk to mother at the camp.

A member of the projects advisory board and committee of the Rotary Club of Kampala. Rtn. Jimmy Serugo made a donation of 100 mama kits essential for expectant mothers and the Little Hearts Project Fliers.

Other partners involved include; Kamwokya Christian Caring Community (KCCC) Health Center III, HARISS International Limited, Maisha Meds, Nile Post, NBS TV, Torrid Petric Legacy Enterprises Limited, Jungle Mission, Reproductive Health Uganda (RHU), Bashglobal Initiative, Africa Test and Treat Initiative, Infectious Disease Institute (IDI), C Squared and Uganda Blood Transfusion Services from Mengo Blood Bank.

5. The Medical Camp Impact

The camp ran from 7:00 am to 4:00 pm when the registration closed. A total of 636 beneficiaries sought medical services. The camp attracted attendees from the villages in Kamwokya, Kisenyi, Kyebando, Bukoto, Mulimira Zone, Ntinda, Nsooba and Kisaasi.

NB: Integrated Health Education was provided, Sensitization and Counselling. Drugs were provided for treatment and a few referrals made. (A comprehensive report to be provided)

6. Observations and Challenges

- a. Wrong information given on start and close of camp in the first days of mobilization. The communication was camp starts at 8.30 am to 6 PM. This could have affected turn up. Many people turned up after registration had closed
- b. Language barrier
- c. Too many drugs were procured. There is need for more assessment of interventions offered to estimate right quantities of drugs. Many drugs remained, however this could also have been because the pharmacy dispensed the drugs donated by HFB before those procured from Salud Pharmacy.
- d. Data from the first patients wasn't captured at registration. Whereas the medical forms captured it, most of the patients went with the forms. There is need to always use a proper Hospital Medical Register to capture all the demographics.
- e. Whereas many Rotarians turned up, they didn't get involved in providing services leaving a gap and hence need for facilitated Volunteers (Rotaractors) as before.
- f. Some partners didn't deliver as expected and there were many complaints on the C-Care personnel. There were complaints not being able to prescribe medicines, they didn't want to work and abandoned station before closure creating a gap at the end.
- g. Partners didn't provide reports in time. A mechanism for getting all reports on the day of the camp or within a few days needs to be worked on.
- h. There is need to identify partners and lock them in early. It would be good to sign MoUs and agree on terms eg number of personnel, facilitation, roles etc. Otherwise the absence of written documentation created budget overruns.
- i. Meals were underestimated and need to budget for a bigger number for service providers
- j. Service providers need to report in time for example eye services, dental personnel turned up late.
