Rotarian Review

At the August 22nd meeting, I shared with the club an article entitled <u>United in Friendship and Service</u> printed in the August Rotarian Magazine.

Paul Harris, in his speech to the Rotary Convention in Edinburgh, Scotland, said, "The motivational power of Rotary is friendship."

In the most recent annual survey of membership conducted by Rotary International, Mr. Harris' statement held true: 45% of those surveyed cited friendship as the reason they remain in Rotary, while 42% cited opportunity to impact their communities. Rotary International conducts the annual survey, in part, for purposes of long-range planning and strategic success of the organization. In 2021, 70,000 Rotarians responded to the survey.

On a local level, the survey provides information we can use to attract and engage membership. Included are information about why members leave, demographics related to age and gender and the effects of the Pandemic on Rotary clubs around the globe.

Here's a short list of the survey findings about what respondents like and dislike about their clubs:

Like	Dislike
Friendship and Fellowship	Weak, unresponsive leadership
Learning new things	Virtual meetings with no in- person connection
Interesting discussions	Poor time management in meetings
Opportunities to serve the community	Uninteresting guest speakers
Hybrid meetings	Rituals like singing
	Lack of diversity
