It gives me great pleasure to report on the activities of the 6 Burnaby/New Westminster Area Rotary Clubs (Burnaby, Burnaby Deer Lake, Burnaby Metrotown, New Westminster, New Westminster-Royal City and Vancouver Collingwood).

As Assistant Governor for the past three years I have enjoyed immensely working with these clubs in supporting Rotary's mission. The Burnaby/New Westminster Clubs have a combined age of 226 years (New Westminster Club the most senior-chartered in May, 1928) a total membership of 204 and 10% of District 5040 membership.

What is striking about these clubs is their close proximity has flourished a great deal of comradery. The **New Westminster Rotary Clubs** are celebrating the 100th anniversary of Rotary's founding by jointly contributing \$100,000 over 3 years to the building of the New Westminster Greenway system, a public corridor providing opportunities for urban recreation.

The **3 Burnaby Clubs** (including financial support from the former Burnaby Hastings Club) are participating with the GVRD in refurbishing the Piper Spit Boardwalk on Burnaby Lake as their Centennial Community Project. The Heart of the Matter Fund raiser jointly put on by the New Westminster-Royal City and Burnaby Club do a terrific job of raising funds for international projects. This years event held on February 6, 2004 raised funds for The Club Foot Program, Ukraine Bukovina Project and Monarch House.

The **Burnaby Metrotown Club** sponsors the premier of all "Music, Food, Wine Festival Events" in the Lower Mainland with their upcoming event scheduled for Saturday, March 13, 2004. Last year they raised over \$40,000 with net proceeds going to the Polio Plus Campaign and local Burnaby community projects.

I would be remiss in not mentioning the terrific work the **Deer** Lake Club has done this year. Their Mystery Manor fundraiser in partnership with Metrotown Mall and the Interactors from Burnaby Secondary School was a great "Halloween" event. Pictured here, Val Harrison enters into the spirit and gets "all spooked up" !



At Christmas they held a Festival of Lights fundraiser and a pancake breakfast with Santa for the 500 Children at Edmonds Community School. Each student received a book of their own wrapped with a candy cane.

In closing I would invite all of you to "make-up" at the Burnaby/New Westminster Area Clubs. Take in their fellowship and share your rotary experiences. My last comments are saved to acknowledge the contribution Gerry Holmes, Past President of the Burnaby Metrotown Club made to Rotary. Gerry was no doubt a character but we will miss his sharp wit and dedication to Rotary's spirit.

THE ROTARY OVERSEAS SUMMER EXCHANGE PROGRAM (ROSE)

Beginning in 1989 District 5040 Youth Exchange Committee began a 3 to 4 week short-term summer exchange program that had been very successful for a number of European Districts. The exchange is for young people between 15 and 19 years of age at the time of the exchange. This short-term exchange is different from the long term exchange in that it is a Family-to-Family exchange. The exchange begins in late June and ends in late August. Depending upon the exchanging country, our student may go overseas first, with both students returning here after 3 or 4 weeks or the hosted student may come here first with both students returning to the country abroad. (Variations on the schedule may be accommodated).

The program is limited to Rotarian families, their relatives or families recommended by a Rotary Club. The sponsoring Rotary club is responsible for ensuring the suitability of candidates and their family. They must be good ambassadors for District 5040. Candidates may obtain applications from their Rotary Club or download from our website http://www.d5040youthexchange.ca, Short Term Link. After the Club has approved the application, it is submitted.

Applications must be submitted by the Club before

February 28th in order to provide time to arrange matches. Currently we may exchange with France, Germany, Denmark, Finland, Belgium, , Netherlands,. Every effort is made to arrange an exchange but there is no guarantee than an exchange will be made as this is dependent on the availability of overseas openings.

A \$100 registration fee, payable by the Family, for the summer exchange covers the cost of mandatory Health and Accident Insurance, communication and courier fees.

Please have the candidate and parents complete the application form, read and sign the "Program Guidelines for Parents and Students" and submit these (one original and two Xerox copies) to the sponsoring Rotary Club along with a cheque for \$100 registration fee made out to District 5040 Youth Exchange The signed application is sent to:

Brooks Interact Club president Clara Croft spent some of her time knitting during the 24-hour famine last weekend. Students raised more than \$1,000 to build a well in India.



High school students went without food for 24 hours in order to make a difference half a world away. Members of the **Brooks Interact Club** and other students from grades 10-12 participated in a famine on January 30 and 31, 2004.

Invited guest speakers included **Barb Rees** of Dreams Inspirations who spoke Friday evening about "dreaming big" and gave some examples of what can happen if the advice is followed. **Judi Tyabji Wilson** put together a power-point presentation for Saturday morning on parts of India and spoke about the need for clean water. **Rotarian Jan Gisborne** came at noon to talk about her upcoming trip to India as a *PolioPlus* immunization team member who will provide children with a vaccine to protect them from the ravages of polio.

"I'm very happy with the results of this year's famine," Interact president Clara Croft said. "We had a good turnout, raised a considerable amount of money, and the speakers were excellent. I believe a good time was had by all."

Interact is a combination of the words "international" and "action. Interact clubs are sponsored by local Rotary clubs to foster leadership and citizenship skills among young people of secondary school age. Each club must complete at least one community service project and one project promoting international understanding each year.

Past Interact projects in Powell River include purchasing Spanish books for Mayans in Guatemala and buying paired

goats for a village in Uganda.

Meetings are held Wednesdays at 11:43 in the cooking room at Brooks Senior Campus and are open to interested students.

Important Reminder -District Policy Amendment

1. Resolutions proposing to amend the policy of the district may be submitted by:

- Any Rotary club in the District, such resolution having been adopted at a general meeting of the club, or by the Board of Directors of the club at a regular meeting.
- The District Governor.
- The District Resolutions Committee or the District Advisory Committee, such resolution having been adopted by a majority of the members of the committee.
- 2.
 - All resolutions to be considered must be submitted to the District Governor at least 75 days prior to the opening date of the Annual District Conference.
 - b) The District Governor shall refer all resolutions received to the District Resolutions Committee which shall not less than 30 days prior to the opening day of the District Conference, forward a copy of such resolutions to the President of each club in the district, to the chair of each District Committee, and to each member of the District Advisory Committee.
- 3.
 - Resolutions submitted to the District Governor, unless withdrawn by the proposer, shall be submitted by the District Resolutions Committee together with the Committee's recommendation for consideration at the District Conference.
- 4.
- Voting on resolutions may be done by a show of hands at the District Conference. Every conference registrant, provided they are members in good standing of a club in the District, shall be eligible to vote. However, should a roll call vote be called for by one elector, the provisions for conference voting as set out in the Manual of Procedure of Rotary International shall apply.

Note: the last day for resolutions to be received by the District Governor is March 1, 2004; District Resolutions Committee

Rotary Women's Auxiliary Inner Circle Society

A short history 1921-2003

In 1919, an informal association of wives of Vancouver Rotary Club Members devoted to assisting the work of the newly opened Rotary Clinic for Chest diseases, began what has now reached eighty two years of service to the community.

In 1921, the Women's Auxiliary to the Rotary Clinic for Chest diseases was formally established. In 1932, in response to expanded demands and social service calls, the organization changed its name to the Rotary Women's Auxiliary. In the 1920's, provisions of clothing and small luxuries were added to the contributions given to the Rotary summer camp in Point Grey for less fortunate children.

During the 1930's, food hampers were distributed, and visits were made to the sick and the underprivileged. During the Second World War, members added a Red Cross unit to their other commitments, and made everything from heavy reversible ambulance driver's coats to knitted socks

In the post-war period, tuberculosis was no longer a major concern, and social services were largely taken over by government agencies. R.W.A. charitable projects continued, and in 1953 layettes were sewn and given to the Vancouver Health Department. Bursaries were awarded to outstanding students, and the Camperships program was started.

Fund raising to cover all these endeavors became an essential activity early in the organization's history. Tea dances, garden parties, bridge parties, and golf tournaments increased, until the nineteen sixties when bazaars and rummage sales was a reliable source of funds for two decades.

During the 1970's and 1980's the two major fundraisers have been a bazaar and the sale of Ice Capade programs in association with the Vancouver Rotary club.

In 1981 sixty years of service and fellowship were celebrated with the publication of a cookbook. The R.W.A. Anniversary fund, whose capital comes from cookbook profits, memorials and bequests was established at the beginning of 1985.

In 1983 the R.W.A. was registered under the Society's act and officially changed its name to RWA Inner Circle Society, but the familiar Rotary Women's auxiliary continues to be used.

Monthly meetings are now held at the Royal Vancouver Yacht club on the third Monday of each month from September to June, and feature interesting guest speakers. The Annual General Meeting and Installation luncheon is held in March

The RWA Inner Circle Society has raised and spent close to \$650.000 on community service. Service activities now include:

- Summer Camps for less fortunate or leaning disabled children.
- Vancouver Community College where we help fund a needy student to reach their full musical potential.
- Sara Society.
- The Canadian Society for M.P.S. where our donation is used for research in genetic diseases.
- The Vancouver Health dept where the materials for 160 layettes are bought and' packed in a members home, from there, they are distributed by the community health nursing, staff, to families such a single mothers on low incomes.

DISTRICT GOVERNOR'S AWARD

Recognizing that the strength of the Rotary movement is founded on the service carried out by club members, the purpose of this award will be to provide a means for Rotary Clubs in District 5040 to personally recognize a member of the club for his/her outstanding efforts in service to the club and/or community (local and world).

Eligible Nominees: Candidate for nomination should be Rotarians in good standing in their clubs who have consistently demonstrated their support of the Object of Rotary through participation in a variety of service activities.

Selection Process: The nomination of a candidate to receive this award will be made by the club. The method of selection will be determined by the club. The club president must endorse the nomination and submit it to the District Governor.

Requirements: A fee of \$300 Canadian is to accompany the nomination. This fee will be accumulated in a special fund to be used for a project or projects at the discretion of the District Governor. The Current Plan for the monies in the Special Fund is a Centennial Project.

A special pin and certificate will be available for presentation to the recipient. This award is to allow clubs to honour members for exemplary service and is separate and apart from the Paul Harris Fellowship which is a recognition for a contribution to the Rotary Foundation.
