

How we Sowed the Seeds in 2002-2003

We are pleased with the spirit of cooperation that is apparent in our District. This spirit allows us to build on the accomplishments of the previous year.

In Brisbane at the International Convention, President Bhichai encouraged us to continue to "Sow the Seeds of Love" as we "Lend a Hand".

We have had an exciting year in District 5040. Rotarians committed themselves to many worthwhile community and international projects. We surpassed our goal for donations and commitments to the Polio Eradication campaign raising in excess of \$400,000 Canadian.

So, what were some of the other highlights? We hosted Rotary International President Bhichai Rattakul early in May. What an event! Both the incoming and outgoing GSE Teams represented their countries extremely well. A number of Ambassadorial Scholars studied in our District this past year and we were very pleased to see them involved at District events and meeting Rotarians in our District.

Also, Sue Birtwell, an Instructor at Kwantlen University College, with a Rotary Grant for University Teachers, successfully organized an "On-line/Distance Education" programme for the University of the West Indies. Jim Patenaude, a Vancouver Policeman, was a cultural scholar in Mexico. Both Sue and Jim were great ambassadors for our District.

The programmes for youth, including Youth Exchange, Rotaract, Interact and RYLA were very successful once again. In fact, we chartered 4 Rotaract clubs and 1 Interact club in the District this past year.

We had a fun-filled and informative District Conference in May in Whistler, put together by an enthusiastic and hard-working Conference committee led by Conference Chair Dennis Magrega. We had a number of outstanding speakers who motivated and inspired us. Rotary International President's Representative PDG Bill Sturgeon and his partner Sandra were very supportive and complimentary of the achievements of our District. We believe we met the objectives of our theme "Love, Laughter and Literacy".

At the conference, we recognized several dedicated Rotarians: PDG Irwin Stewart with the Rotary Foundation "Distinguished Service Award", PDG Chris Offer with the Rotary Foundation "Citation for Meritorious Service Award" and Rotarian Shafique Pirani with the Rotary International "Service Above Self Award". We recognized Rotarian Frances Kolotyluk and Rotaractor Stephanie Brodie with a "Paul Harris Fellow" for their work in the area of Literacy. Also, we acknowledged five Rotarians for their great contribution to the District. They were DGN (now DGE) Ron Neukomm, District Secretary Jacci McTavish, District Newsletter Editor Gordon Dalglish, Past President of the Rotary World Help Network George Sandwith and Past Chair of Youth Exchange Neil McDonald.

Finally, Roxanne and I wish to thank all Rotarians in the District who welcomed us warmly to their communities. We appreciated the hard work of the Presidents and the Club Directors for their leadership at the club level. Jonathan Majiyagbe, a senior advocate of Nigeria, is the principal counsel of the law firm J.B. Majiyagbe & Company, in Kano. A member of the Nigerian and English bars, Majiyagbe also belongs to the Honourable Body of Benchers, the panel that evaluates the qualifications of those seeking to practice law in Nigeria and formally calls them to the bar. He is a graduate of London University and a member of the Chartered Institute of Arbitrators, London.

Majiyagbe is chairman of the Kano State branch of the Nigerian Red Cross Society and was for many years chancellor of the Anglican Diocese of Kano. He is also a member of the Kano Chamber of Commerce, Industry, Mines, and Agriculture and is trustee of various international cultural organizations.

A Rotarian since 1967, Majiyagbe has served RI as district governor, International Assembly discussion leader, committee member and chairman, Foundation trustee, aide to the president, and director. He is past chairman of the African Regional PolioPlus Committee and the African Affairs Committee. Majiyagbe is currently a member of the Rotary Club of Kano. He and his late wife, Ade, are Major Donors to The Rotary Foundation.

As Chairman of the African Regional PolioPlus Committee and member of the International PolioPlus Committee, Mr. Majiyagbe is dedicated to the global effort to eradicate polio. Rotary's PolioPlus program, launched in 1985, is an aggressive public/private partnership to assist international health agencies and government to certify the world as polio-free by the year 2005, Rotary's centennial anniversary. By that year, Rotary will have committed nearly a half billion US dollars to the eradication effort. To date, more than two billion children have been immunized against the deadly poliovirus.

While her children were young, Mary was involved in their worlds as a Brown Owl with the Girl Guides, Boy Scout Advisory Board, Chair of the Home and School and on the Magee High School Music committee.

Mary joined the Burnaby Metrotown Club in 1989 as the first female Rotarian in District 5040. She served on their board as International Director, Vice-President and President in 1992-93 and was recognized by her club with a Paul Harris Fellowship in 1994. Mary moved to the Rotary Club of Vancouver Arbutus to be closer to her new workplace location and home in Vancouver.

Mary's interest in Rotary includes a 12 year involvement in Youth Exchange with her husband Sandy, serving as Youth Exchange Chair from 1997-2000. Other activities include work with the District conference (Registrar 1994, 1995 and 1997), serving as District Treasurer and being a workshop leader at PETS and RYLA. Mary was a Rotary Volunteer to the Philippines last summer. Sandy joined her and they had a wonderful experience working with a micro-credit project on the Island of Negros.





The 94th Rotary International Conference



From the initial vibration of traditional Aboriginal didgeridoos, to the closing Ceremony finale, Rotarians were treated to a magnificent conference in Brisbane, Australia, last month. Almost 16,000 Rotarians and guests packed the Brisbane Conference Centre and gave a standing ovation to the keynote address from **President Bhichai Rattakul**, that we had exceeded our goal for Polio Eradication.

The figure, which is still growing, was announced and included over \$7.5 million form Canada - one of the largest contributions from any country outside the US.

Good reason for **Del and Roxanne Paterson - joined by Assistant Governor Otto Rieve** - to be smiling as they attended the Northern Lights breakfast following the announcement. Our District exceeded it's target of \$350,000 - bringing in well over \$400,000 in donations and pledges.







It's difficult to try and summarise all that went on during these few days, but there are some presentations that were highlights. We welcomed two new Rotary countries - East Timor (The Rotary Club of Timor Leste) and Afghanistan (The Rotary Club of Kabul).

President Bhichai presented club president Karima Farani (Kabul) with their charter. In an emotional speech, President Karima asked Rotarians to "....help rebuild her broken country".






