The Rotary Clubs of the North Shore, stretching all the way to Whistler, have a rich history - with two clubs (North Vancouver and West Vancouver) already past their half Century. Nestled under the peaks of the Coastal Mountains this BC "Group of Seven" is active in all the avenues of service as well as embracing our themes of Lending a Hand, alleviating poverty and extending the Rotary Family.

Well known to all of us for our most recent District Conference, the Whistler Club is immersed in the Youth Exchange program. Who can blame our Youth Exchange Students for wanting to spend time there - many of whom have never even see snow before! Whistler is a natural playground for our youth - and will be hosting the YE Xmas party this year. Their Centennial Project is also well under way - a Scout Cabin, with much of the materials and Site Prep being donated by local Rotarians and contractors.

Down at sea level, West Vancouver Sunrise ("the little club that can") - certainly does! With projects ranging from Seniors' assistance to helping Youth at Risk...to say nothing of hosting it's very own Academy Awards Fundraiser, President Val Stephenson keeps this "little" club in the big league.

Further up the mountain, the Hollyburn Country Club sees the West Vancouver club and President Kevin Conway maintain a varied program - so much so that their remaining Charter Member from 50 years ago, PHF Rupe Harrison, has maintained perfect attendance for all of these years! Their Family of Rotary has included picnics, family meetings and a recent Parent/Child evening. Perishable foods are also collected twice weekly and taken to "The Open Door" in the downtown eastside. Rotaract and Interact - where they award a Student of the Month award - are both enthusiastically supported.

Across the Capilano (watch out for yellow rubber ducks as you go!), the North Vancouver Club - the first and oldest club on the North Shore - sees Randy Fowle heavily involved in the family and fellowship of Rotary. Monthly fellowship events have included attending a Celtic concert, baseball games, the BC Lions Alumni dinner and a RYLA-sponsored IMAX event. Internationally, they are very active with the World Help Network, GSE - one of their members, Neil McDonald is this years Team Leader to New Zealand, Youth Exchange as well as supporting an orphanage in Honduras.

North Vancouver Lion's Gate completes our tour of the North Shore, where President Philip McLeod reports yet another successful Wine Festival last month in Capilano Mall. Shortly, Operation Red Nose will take place in December, to assist people get home during the holiday season. Two Interact Clubs, and an incubator project in Indonesia keep his members busy at their Friday lunchtime meetings.

The North Shore has always been a community - and the clubs there operate together in a community spirit. Many of the events are run jointly, showing us all that the Family of North Shore Rotary is alive, well and ready to welcome new members as well as visiting Rotarians at any time.

New Westminster, Burnaby and Mexican Rotary Clubs work together to Build Schools

In early October – a group of 12 New Westminster and Burnaby Rotarians and spouses travelled to Zihuatanejo-Ixtapa Mexico to learn more about the needs of the Netzahuatcoyotl Indigenous School. Not only did they see how much work Rotary and others in the community had accomplished already but they identified many needs there and at other schools which require International Community assistance.

It all dates back to about 5 years ago – when one of the BC Rotarians heard about the Netza School, and their Dire needs as a growing and important part of the Indigenous community. 2 years ago – the Royal City Rotary Club in New Westminster learned that a dormitory was badly needed to provide housing for many elementary students who had to travel long distances to be able to attend the newly built and fast-growing school.

In July 2002 – the Royal City Rotary raised their first \$3000 for the project – when they entered a team into the Indy 2002 Bike Race in Vancouver BC. Their President, Ron O'Genski, wanted to see more happen – and hoped to turn this project into a Hands-on project to bring the needs "home" to New Westminster Rotarians. So the idea of a trip in Oct 2003 was born.

Two Vancouver area clubs participated in this trip – with most from the **Royal City New Westminster Rotary Club**, and a couple from the **Burnaby Rotary Club**. With the generosity of El Tamarindo Residence in Zihua – the group was able to stay together, meet with local clubs and visit the Netza school, as well as other schools with great needs.

The Canadians brought with them kits for each of the dormitory kids of the Netza school – with shampoos, towels, toothpaste, toys, crayons, books, soaps, and more. Unfortunately, the temporary dorm which had been in use in former years was no longer available, however it was expected that with community and the support of the **Zihuatanejo Rotary Club**, a temporary dorm would be up and running within weeks, and that plans for a permanent building to house 100 students could be realized over the coming year or so, depending on up-coming fund-raising efforts.

Also – the BC Rotarians brought with them a T-shirt for each of the 340 students of the Netza school as well as for the 15 or so staff members teaching at the school. Each shirt had the name of the school – as well as the Canadian/ Mexican flags, and the "Rotary wheel". These were presented to each student by the 12 Rotary representatives at a morning ceremony at the school, where the students sang "Cielito Lindo" in Nahautl language – and the Rotarians responded by singing "O Canada" for the students.

The local Mexican Rotary Clubs (1 in Zihua and 2 in Ixtapa) were magnificent hosts for the visiting group of Canadians, inviting the 12 to participate in their local meetings, and in tours of Rotary projects accompanied by Rotary District Governor Rafa Mora from Cuernavaca, Morelos, Mexico.

It was during one of these tours that the group was shown a mountain top pre-school that had a student enrollment of 35 but nothing but a dirt floor and no furnishing whatsoever.

The group learned that recent Mexican legislation had made 3 years of pre-school education obligatory – but that the buildings and equipment to fulfill this challenge were not yet in place in all areas – especially in the poor areas of the state of Guerrero. So the Canadian group of twelve along with several members from the **Ixtapa Tercer Milenio Rotary Club** (3rd Millenium) took the volunteer teacher with them shopping.

The building that on the Friday of the first visit had nothing but slap board walls and no doors or security – by Monday morning had painted walls, tables and chairs, blackboard and chalk, books and crayons, cupboards to store supplies, a lockable door and secure windows, and lots of happy faces. The two Rotary groups – the Canadians and the Mexicans, both pledged their support determined that this was just the beginning as there is much yet to do, and could not wait to meet again to see the new Tercer Milenio Kinder on solid footing in the near future.

Although the 9 or 10 day trip for the BC Rotarians was very busy and sometimes wet and tiring in the final days of rainy season, it was also a time for social activities and friendships that none of them will forget as they met many new acquaintances amongst the local Rotary community. The BC group express their sincere thanks to both the Zihuatanejo Rotary Club and the Ixtapa Tercer Milenio Rotary Club for their wonderful hospitality and their giant efforts to make their communities better places to live – especially for the children.

CRCID Monitoring & Evaluation - Call for Monitors 2004/2005

CRCID is now requesting monitors for the 2004 / 2005 fiscal year to evaluate CRCID funded projects in District 3200 and District 3160 in India. [CRCID - Canadian Rotary Committee for International Development; part of the Matching Grant process- *ed*.]

We would greatly appreciate your assistance in informing the fellow Rotarians in your district of this opportunity. Those Rotarians who are interested, can complete the Monitor Interest Form(*) or request the form from the CRCID Secretariat. The completed request must be received by the CRCID Secretariat no later than **December 31, 2003** to be considered for the 2004 / 2005 Monitoring Mission.

If a Rotarian is interested in being a CRCID monitor, but not necessarily for projects in India or in 2004 / 2005, they should still submit a completed Monitor Interest Form, indicating what are their preferred countries to monitor. CRCID will keep these Interest Forms on file for future monitoring missions.


CRCID is a uniquely Canadian Rotary funding agency that advances Canadian Government funds to World Community Service projects being implemented in the developing world with the assistance of Canadian Rotary Clubs and Districts. What is less known is that CRCID also monitors these projects after they are complete.

Each year CRCID despatches 2 or 3 monitors to evaluate 12 - 16 projects and submit a report on each project evaluated. All eligible expenses are reimbursed and a training and orientation workshop will be provided prior to the monitors travelling to India.


TRF is able to do this good work through the generous support and commitment of Rotarians like you and me. Rotary International hopes that by 2005 every Rotarian will give \$100 every year.
