
Just what is the ROSE program?

- Rotary Overseas Summer Exchange generally known as the "Short Term Youth Exchange Program"
- applicants must be 15 to 19 years old and cannot be full time employed or at school during the exchange (previous exchange students are welcome to go overseas again with this program)
- the local club youth exchange rep needs to meet with the family to make sure they will be good ambassadors for Rotary
- the application is sent to me and then I forward it to the requested country for a match
- when a successful match is found the families are notified of the details of their matching student and begin contact and making travel arrangements.
- All the travel arrangements are made by the families so they figure out what works best for them - there is no cost to the sponsoring Rotary Club
- The students do a direct family-to-family exchange, each staying with the other family for 3 to 4 weeks
- students can be from Rotarian or non-Rotarian families
- exchanges take place during summer break (July/August)

The deadline this year for applications to be received is December 31, 2004 for exchange in Summer, 2005.

"Effective clubs start and end with training, which provides the base to make each element of an effective club a reality."

"The first element of an effective club is the ability to sustain and increase membership. Obviously, membership development is fundamental to Rotary's viability. I believe that the most detrimental thing that can happen to a new member is to not be given a job. When the member is not immediately involved, interest wanes and we eventually lose that member. Training and involvement must start from day one. We should all consider ourselves responsible for training and mentoring new members and ensuring that every individual is asked to participate in something meaningful to them."

"One of the ways to make sure members stay involved in Rotary is to implement successful service projects. This is the second element of an effective club. To sustain and increase membership, a club must have a reason to exist. Rotary clubs exist to serve, through projects at the local, district and international levels. An effective club will have a well-balanced program that affords every member an opportunity to serve. Such a program will sustain the membership of the club and attract new members who want to be a part of a positive, vibrant force in the community that is doing something visible."

#### College Students Build Prince Rupert Rotary Club Website

College students at the Prince Rupert Campus have helped local not-for-profit organizations in constructing their own websites as community projects. Four learners created an anti-racism and multi-cultural site for the Coalition of Inclusive Communities (www.princerupertlibrary.ca/erace) and three learners prepared the Prince Rupert Rotary Club website (www.princerupertlibrary.ca/rotary).

The idea of involving college students in website design originated when the Prince Rupert Airport Authority designed its own website (www.ypr.ca) two years ago. According to John Shepherd, a member of the Prince Rupert Rotary Club, "The inspiration came from similar volunteer work done by the Prince Rupert Public Library for not-for-profit organizations. Two of my college students, reviewed existing airport websites, noting the features that they liked and disliked".

The latest website was prepared by Corinna Morhart, Jennifer Frank and Bess Leeson for the Prince Rupert Rotary Club, volunteering each Monday night after the classes ended in April. Their goal was a website that highlighted the Club's numerous achievements over its illustrious 83-year history and which provided information concerning Rotary International.

Much of the content for the website was provided by the Club Historian, John McNish, and the Prince Rupert City Archives. Consistent with the colours of Rotary International, the homepage uses gold lettering, against a dark blue background. According to John Shepherd, "We tinkered with the colour schemes and layout of the home page until everyone was satisfied with the end result". For consistency, the same "look and feel" was applied throughout the site.

The Club's home page includes a picture of the Rotary Waterfront Park, a project sponsored by both Rotary Clubs during the late 1990s.

In regard to future plans, "We want to keep the website current, posting the monthly Club's newsletter and photographs of Club events on the website. It will be a way for past members who have moved to other communities, to keep in touch with their Club and find out what is happening".


#### Ed's note:
