Make Dreams Real to end child mortality – what an appropriate theme that RI President D.K. Lee passed along to all Governors Elect in San Diego in January 2008. All who were present understood quickly what President DK was asking of Rotarians. He went on to say 30,000 children die each day throughout the world from preventable causes and that we should address issues surrounding health, hunger, clean water and literacy.



Over the past year I have observed what our District has been doing in relation to the four areas that President DK was referring to. To my surprise I found that many clubs were partnering with Rotary Districts around the world to address issues surrounding clean water, health, hunger and literacy but feel that more can be accomplished. As our 2007 – 2008 Rotary year comes to a close I note that our matching grants from the District Designated Funds (DDF) have not been totally spent. It is my goal for 2008 – 2009 to encourage clubs to take on projects addressing child mortality and use up all of our matching grant funds. World Community Service Chair Peter Ackhurst has made a commitment that his committee will assist clubs through an easy to understand process as they apply for matching grant funds.

Another opportunity has arisen in relation to child mortality and literacy as a result of a conversation with the Lt. Governor of British Columbia, the Honorable Stephen Point. He pointed out that during many of his visits to isolated communities throughout British Columbia he found that those communities had no books or libraries. He felt, given the opportunity, children from those communities would enjoy what many children throughout British Columbia already have if they were given books to read. As a result of this conversation our Rotary District has been asked to partner with the Government House Foundation to assist in providing books and building mini libraries in partnership with those communities identified by the Lt. Governor.

Finally as we move into our new rotary year, 2008 – 2009, I see a resurgence of our district in relation to membership and a record breaking year of giving to our Rotary Foundation. I also see and feel positive energy from Rotarians throughout the district and see the future for our district is going to be a healthy and vibrant one. Both Judy and I look forward to visiting your clubs during my year.

Dear Club President:

In February of 2008 I wrote to request your assistance in contacting your Member of Parliament to urge Canada's continued financial support for Global Polio Eradication. Clubs throughout Canada responded to this call for action by declaring their own commitment to a polio free world and urging Canada's continued support. I thank you for your follow up to my urgent appeal.

I am pleased to report that the Government of Canada heard our collective voice and has announced a commitment of C\$60 million over the next three years to support polio eradication efforts in Afghanistan. Minister Oda has also advised me that the Government is considering a further grant to assist the Polio Eradication effort that would be less country specific.

You may wish to highlight any efforts your own club is making as part of Rotary's \$100 Million Challenge Campaign to ensure we seize the opportunity to rid the world of polio once and for all.

I am confident that the Government of Canada will continue to demonstrate its longstanding leadership in support of global polio eradication, and I look forward to sharing news of our ongoing collaboration with the government of Canada toward our shared goal of a polio free world.

Member Access, online service changes Rotary International Website Security

In July 2008, Rotary International will implement a more comprehensive registration and login process for Member Access and other password-protected online services. The new system will improve security and provide self-service features.

When the new system is fully implemented, all registered users will be able to reset their passwords and update their e-mail addresses. In addition, the new system allows Rotary to increase and improve secure online content and service to non-Rotarian constituents.

Starting July 2008, both new and existing users will be required to register, or re-register, with a unique e-mail address, password, and a secret question and answer.

If you use spam blocking software, Rotary International Website recommends you to add **secure@rotarymailings.org** to your approved sender list. This will ensure that you receive e-mails that support the new self-service features.

New deadlines for retiring RI-CAS and RI-DAS

1. New deadline for ending RI support of software – 31 December 2008

Based on feedback from clubs and districts, RI will continue to provide support to users of the standalone versions of the software until the end of the calendar year, 31 December 2008. This means that Rotarians will still be able to download the software from Rotary's Web site, purchase it from the catalog, and discuss issues on the CAS/DAS forum on <u>Member Access</u> until 31 December 2008.

2. New deadline for online users of RI-CAS/RI-DAS – 30 September 2008

RI will continue hosting the online RI-CAS/RI-DAS versions until 30 September 2008. Web access for online users will not be available on 1 October and thereafter. Correspondingly, software support will continue for standalone users that have downloaded their online data to a standalone version of the software through 31 December 2008. Doing so allows three months of support to former online users to adjust to the standalone software version. RI is still investigating if another entity would be able to host the site at a reasonable fee basis to online users. We will announce the results about the viability of this option in early June 2008.

3. Other software alternatives to RI-CAS and RI-DAS

While RI cannot endorse or recommend another product, we have posted a <u>list of several Web sites</u> offering club administrative software tools for Rotarians. This list is not exhaustive, but can be used as a starting point to assist Rotarians in locating alternate software.

4. Archiving RI-CAS and RI-DAS knowledge-base

All of the information in the CAS and DAS User Forum will be converted to a PDF file on Rotary's Web site so that Rotarians can search it for information. No new questions or changes will be permitted to this file after 31 December 2008.





5. Synchronization of Rotary club data with RI data

Rotary International would like to provide the ability to synchronize data between the club and RI, but there are a number of issues that need to be resolved first. Protecting the privacy of our members' data is a key concern and worldwide privacy laws are complex. Many such legal questions would need to be addressed prior to deciding to provide this type of data interchange. RI is currently reviewing these issues and will only be able to provide synchronization functionality in the future if it complies with privacy laws worldwide.

6. Other alternative paths suggested by users

- Providing RI-CAS and RI-DAS Source Code
 - → Unfortunately, RI does not have working source code for this software. In software technical terms, this specifically means that the source code will not compile (generate an .exe file).
 - → In order for Rotary to release the source code, it would need to spend thousands of dollars to fix the source code and to verify that the code will generate an .exe file that does exactly what the existing RI-CAS and RI-DAS software does today. In addition, for protection of RI's trademarks, all references to Rotary would have to be removed from the code, further increasing the costs to update the source code before its release
 - → Finally, perhaps the most compelling reason that this option is not viable is that the underlying software technology is over eight years old. In the software industry, this is considered completely out of date. Current trends for administrative software have developed in a completely different direction and use different approaches (e.g. online access) to provide this functionality.
 - \rightarrow Selling the software to a district, not-for-profit entity, or user group
 - → Given the current condition of the source code, it would be a massive undertaking for another group to take the code as is and clean it up as outlined above. Rotary International is also very concerned about not making the current situation for users worse by providing a sense of false hope. RI was unable to fully support this software or to promote its widespread use. Expecting another group to be able to change this situation may be unrealistic.
 - \rightarrow Asking another entity to continue Providing support on a fee-basis
 - → We have not been able to come up with a workable business model. RI estimates that there are a total of about 1,000 clubs that use RI-CAS in the United States, Australia, and South Africa. Given what we know about the need to promote, upgrade, provide training, and support the software, all clubs participating in this type of arrangement would be required to pay a substantial fee on a yearly basis. Our research has shown that many clubs use RI-CAS because it is so cost-effective (free) for their small club and are not willing to pay a fee to continue using it.

Everyone is excited for the new Rotary year. **District 5040 Newsletter** had a chance to grab a few minutes off Bob's busy schedule for a brief interview. Read on to find out what he has to say.

Who is Bob Blacker as a Rotarian?

"Service above self - local and international. I get a real kick out of helping people, in leadership, and doing things that they've never done before. When I see people who are not as fortunate as us, I'd really like to do something for them. I want to do what I can do to make sure that they have a better life."

What made you decide to run as the District Governor?

I had some folks come up to me and saying "Have you ever thought about running as the Governor for the District?" because I have been GSE Leader as well as the Chair, and I've learned a lot from that. That was my first taste of [the] district. Past District Governor and folks who I respect asked "Why don't you put your name for it?" I thought and spoke with Judy about it. I asked her "What do I write down?" she said "Well, you do what you want. Whatever you decide, I'm fine with it." I thought that this was a golden opportunity to get out there and do a lot more, not only for my own club, but for my district and British Columbia.

Was it a shock when you were elected?

Yeah, the interview process was very complete. Judy and I were interviewed and I remember the day very well because we just finished RYLA South and we had to get back real quick that day. When they asked me all these questions, I knew so much about Rotary that they couldn't shut me up.

What plans do you have for District 5040 that have not been done by past DGs?

The Rotary Alumni Club - I really believe that it is going to be extremely successful. It's for like-minded people who's been out there and done it. For the young, making the club to be one that would suit their



needs and do things that they've already done, especially group exchange members - they go overseas, they come back, they want to do something. This helps keep them in Rotary. Invite **Rotaractors** who are interested to do something about forming bonds with the **Interact** and **RYLA**. All the programs for these kids to say "Well, there's some place I could go and everybody I can talk to in that club who's been there and done that." That would be the first club in North America and the third one in the world. **Kanawaga- Shounen in Japan** is the second, and a club in the **Philippines** was the first one. I think that it's time that we did that.

My other goal is *literacy*, a project with **Government House Foundation** because of my affiliation with Government House as an *Aide de Campe to the Lieutenant Governor*, which I still am. It was interesting - Lieutenant Governor and I were having a conversation when we were going up to *Whistler* one day and I said to him, "We got to get Rotary more involved with our First Nations" and he told me that there is a way. He said "I've been up and down the coast in many isolated communities that don't even have books or libraries. They really need them and that's something that Rotary can do." We can do that real easy. We're ready to start on a project that is would really help these kids in isolated areas and the only way that you can get there is by boat or plane. They run their generation on diesel for electricity.

Would there be teachers or instructors for this Literacy Project?

We have got a great literacy chair who was actually an administrator with the school district in Richmond and she was a librarian in her time. She's going to be the one who's going to be coordinating this. We know that once we get started into this that it's going to lead to other directions. What we're saying to the clubs in our district is to adopt a village, so that way, the club and the village and all of us can get to know each other and build a relationship, and then keep them going for five or six years - you can't do this in one year.

What do you expect from your fellow Rotarians during your term?

There is a great buzz out there right now and that was created by **Dean**. She's done a great job in going around to all the clubs and getting them to embrace the idea of increasing their numbers and looking at projects that people will be interested in. People want to give out there, so you need to have something that picks their interest. She did that, and as a result, their numbers are going up astronomically. I want to carry that on. I want to give people areas where they can go out there and do some really good stuff.

Any messages to our Rotarians, Rotaractors, and Interactors?

Have fun, enjoy your fellowship, look at *service above self* and most of all, help your communities out because I know that you can do it and I know that it would be rewarded down the line.

Bob and Judy currently own a small business that ensures an easy and less stressful arrival for healthcare professionals from all over the world. He has assisted over 250 nurses and Australia, Germany, doctors from New Zealand, Saudi Arabia, and the United Kingdom. Even in his retirement as a knight of justice up to his own business and to his Rotary family - Bob is still inclined with public service, sharing his time, knowledge, and talents for the greater good. He is not just your regular Rotarian. He is a true noble man with a very kind heart who will blaze the trail for us in this year to make dreams real.

Lobsters for Lives By Kaylee Magee



Local Rotary Clubs have eaten their way into the hearts of aid recipients all over the globe! On June 14, 2008, the **Rotary Club of Vancouver Arbutus** held *LobsterFest 2008*, an evening of fun, laughter, and scrumptious, mouthwatering Atlantic lobsters. The event raised \$18,000 in total, \$9000 is to be used for the said club's international projects and \$9200 was raised for **ShelterBox** organization.

ShelterBox was founded in 2000 by the Rotary Club of Helston-Lizard in Cornwall, England. The original concept was to help provide temporary shelter to victims in the wake of disasters. Immediate disaster relief is generally focused on providing food, water, and

medical services, but the sudden widespread homelessness can take months to address. ShelterBox provides disaster victims with a box containing a tent and supplies for ten people to survive for six months. Other items in the box range from thermal blankets to cooking equipment to mosquito nets, with the exact contents determined locally to ensure they match the specific disaster at hand.

To date, ShelterBoxes have helped more than 500,000 victims of tornadoes, floods, and countless other disasters. ShelterBoxes have been sent to every continent, including those which helped 13 000 victims of Hurricane Katrina in 2005. Over forty counties have benefited from the help of Shelter Box, such as Pakistan for the Kashmir earthquake, Indonesia, and Sri Lanka for the Boxing Day Tsunami. A dedicated group of volunteers, known as **The ShetlerBox Response Team** physically transports and hands out the boxes, ensuring widespread and timely assistance.

Rotary has always played a prominent role in work of ShelterBox. After founding the organization in England, Rotary clubs around the world continue to contribute half the funds ShelterBox receives each year. When a natural disaster strikes, ShelterBox stays in close contact with the local Rotary clubs, to learn how best to equip the boxes and how to distribute them most efficiently. RI president stresses diversity

Rotary International President Dong Kurn Lee stressed that a diverse Rotary is a strong Rotary during a visit to the Rotary Club of Chicago on 1 July.

As part of a long-standing tradition for RI presidents, Lee addressed members of the Chicago club, the birthplace of Rotary, as one of his first official acts. He stressed the need to bring in new leadership to take over for the old as part of the 2008-09 RI theme, *Make Dreams Real*.

"Every Rotarian that we bring into our clubs helps to *Make Dreams Real*," Lee said, to a packed second-floor room in the elegant Union League Club in downtown Chicago. "Every single one is another pair of hands, and another mind, and another heart to do Rotary's work."

Lee called on every district to increase membership by 10 percent and to add two clubs during this Rotary year. "If we do not bring in younger members, we will miss out on a great deal of energy and expertise," he added. "And we will not be training a new generation of members to become club presidents, district governors, and senior RI leaders in the years to come."

Lee said the membership of a healthy Rotary club is made up of men and women of different ages, vocations, professions, skills, and talents. A club that is not diversified is less able to conduct ambitious projects and has a narrower range of resources.

As part of the push for growth, Lee asked Rotarians to be creative in promoting membership and to expand their quest for new members.

"There are many qualified professionals who may simply be overlooked because their professions are not typical for Rotary members," he said.

At the International Assembly in January, <u>Lee unveiled the 2008-09 theme and service emphases</u>, urging Rotarians to become involved in clean water, literacy, and health and hunger projects aimed at reducing child mortality. He also encouraged them to contribute to <u>Rotary's US\$100 Million Challenge</u> to eradicate polio.



"We will *Make Dreams Real* by giving children hope and a chance at a future," Lee said.

Chicago club member Ruth Ann Watkins said it is fitting for the new RI president to begin his year at the club. "Rotary started here. It carries historical significance and continues our focus on the future," Watkins said.

Club president Arol Augsburger, who was inducted during the meeting, said Lee's remarks hit all the right notes. He also praised Lee's theme choice: "We reach a much broader audience, and it broadens our sphere of influence to promote diversity."

Danny Girton Jr., an adjudicator for Guinness World Records. confirmed that Rotary now owns the record for Most Books Donated in Seven Days at the final plenary session on Wednesday.

At the convention, a symbolic "mountain of books" display provided a backdrop for reading sessions allowing Rotarians, celebrities, and other notables to read to students visiting on field trips. Project organizers set a goal of collecting a quarter of a million books. Convention registrants from more than 140 countries brought books representing their home cultures and languages.

"Everyone here embraced this book drive, and I could not be more proud of our Rotary clubs and more grateful for the support we received from the public," said Werk.

Overachieving students will save many lives

Elementary students from four Tsawwassen schools joined with **SDSS** to raise \$5,000.00 in *Nickels for Nets* to far exceed their \$1,000 fund raising target! The amazing achievement by students of **South Delta's Interact Club** will save hundreds of children's lives in Rwanda and Liberia with insecticide treated nets.

As part of the UNICEF *Spread the Net* project, five hundred insecticide treated nets at a cost \$10.00 each will be purchased for distribution in the tropical countries. The nets protect sleeping African children from malaria-carrying mosquitoes.

"The students were so great and so supportive" said outgoing Interact Club, President Johanna Johnson, who tirelessly worked to enlist student and community support.

"This wonderful accomplishment will save hundreds of lives and help make rural African communities healthier. We are very grateful for the support" said Joan Beaty when accepting the funds as the representative of UNICEF on Thursday June 5, 2008 at SDSS.

Joan explained developed countries around the world each take a malaria burdened region to assist. "Canada has been paired with Rwanda and Liberia as countries that need malaria protection. A \$5,000.00 contribution is huge!"

Each insecticide treated net is large enough to protect a sleeping family of five. So the Tsawwassen contribution has the potential to help up to 2,500 people.

"The nets are not the total answer but they cut the infection rate in half giving many children a chance to grow" exclaimed Joan. "It is the small children and pregnant women that are very vulnerable. This will save many lives."

Also in attendance was teacher, Interact counselor, and local Rotarian, **James Brown** who said, "These Interactors are an excellent group of very responsible students. Rotary is proud to be involved with them." Students in the **South Park** grade 4 class of Mme. Maurice raised \$320.00 to win acknowledgement as the top fundraisers. Last week they received a Certificate of Achievement as well as a movie and munchies prize. Their efforts helped South Park raise \$1,500.00 to rank first among the schools that contributed to the program.





Local businesses **Harris Nursery** and **Video Land** provided major boosts to push the project well beyond the original target.

Other schools contributing to the project included: Beach Grove, Cliff Drive and Pebble Hill.

About UNICEG Spread the Net:

A U.N. sponsored campaign to raise awareness and help prevent death by malaria. The 3 year goal is to raise \$5 million to distribute 500,000 simple, effective insecticide-treated bed nets to families Africa.
