

D5040 District Grants 2026-27

FUNDING FOR: short-term, small-scale projects with a grant from C\$1,000 to C\$10,000.

PURPOSE: to address needs in your community and abroad.

HOW TO APPLY: after becoming qualified, club members apply to the District using the Grants module on the District website.

HOW IT WORKS:

- The District is allocated funds by the Rotary Foundation (District Designated Funds or DDF).
- DDF comes from donations made to the Rotary Foundation Annual Share Fund 3 years ago.
- Applications approved by District & Rotary Foundation.
- For 2026-27 we will have about C\$74,290 available for District Grants.



QUALIFICATION REQUIREMENTS 2026-27



Qualify Your Club – applies to District Grants

- Qualification must be completed each year.
- The qualification process helps ensure that your club understands the grant process, and your stewardship & financial responsibilities.
- To qualify:
 1. at least two members of your club participate in **the District 5040 District Grants training sessions** (this session).
OR at least one member attends the **District Grants training**, and one other member takes **the Grants Management Seminar** in the Learning Center on My Rotary.
 2. Your President and President-Elect * **must sign the MOU.**



Grants Management Seminar & Re-certification



People who have completed the full 10-course seminar will now need to take just the **Grant Management Recertification** course each year.

To qualify, send me a copy of the course certificate.

NOT on the Grants Center in My Rotary.


Only qualified members have access to apply for or update grants on the system.

Members who take the Grants Management Seminar or the Re-Certification course need to send a copy of their certificate of course completion to the District Grants Chair and will be valid for 12 months.

CLUB QUALIFICATION MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING THE ROTARY FOUNDATION

1. Club Qualification
 2. Club Officer Responsibilities
 3. Financial Management Plan
 4. Bank Account Requirements
 5. Report on Use of Grant Funds
 6. Document Retention
 7. Reporting Misuse of Grant Funds
- 1. Club Qualification**
To participate in Rotary Foundation grants, the club must agree to implement the financial and stewardship requirements in this memorandum of understanding (MOU) provided by The Rotary Foundation (TRF) and to send at least one club member to the district's grant management seminar each year. The district may also establish additional requirements for club qualification and/or require its clubs to be qualified in order to participate in district grants. By completing these requirements, the club becomes qualified and eligible to participate in Rotary grants.
- A. Upon successful completion of the qualification requirements, the club will be qualified for one Rotary year.
 - B. To maintain qualified status, the club must comply with this MOU, any additional district requirements, and all applicable TRF policies.
 - C. The club is responsible for the use of funds for club-sponsored grants, regardless of who controls the funds.
 - D. Qualification may be suspended or revoked for misuse or mismanagement of grant funds involving, but not limited to: fraud; forgery; membership falsification; gross negligence; endangerment of health, welfare, or safety of beneficiaries; ineligible contributions; use of funds for personal gain; undisclosed conflicts of interest; monopolization of grant funds by individuals; report falsification; overpricing; acceptance of payments from beneficiaries; illegal activities; use of grant funds for ineligible purposes.
 - E. The club must cooperate with any financial, grant, or operational audits.
- 2. Club Officer Responsibilities**
The club officers hold primary responsibility for club qualification and the proper implementation of TRF grants.
- Club officer responsibilities include:
- A. Appointing at least one club member to implement, manage, and maintain club qualification
 - B. Ensuring that all TRF grants adhere to stewardship measures and proper grant management practices
 - C. Ensuring that all individuals involved in a grant conduct their activities in a way that avoids any actual or perceived conflict of interest

TERMS AND CONDITIONS FOR ROTARY FOUNDATION DISTRICT GRANTS

District grants fund small-scale, short-term activities that address needs in your community and communities around the world. These activities align with The Rotary Foundation's mission to help Rotary members advance world understanding, goodwill, and peace by improving health, providing quality education, improving the environment, and alleviating poverty. Districts decide which activities they want to support with district grants.

The Rotary Foundation may modify these terms and conditions at any time to clarify them or to reflect policy changes. Changes made as of December 2022 include:

- Clarifying that funds can be used to support activities in Rotary and non-Rotary countries (see section 1, Eligible Activities)
- Adding that funds cannot be used to pay for international travel for anyone under age 18, unless they are accompanied by a parent or guardian or are participating in the Rotary Youth Exchange program (see section 2, Ineligible Activities and Spending)

1. ELIGIBLE ACTIVITIES

Activities that are eligible for district grant funding:

- A. Align with The Rotary Foundation's mission
- B. Can include:
 1. Local or international service projects and related travel
 2. Scholarships for any educational level
 3. Vocational training teams (groups of professionals who teach others about a particular field or learn more about their own) and related travel
 4. Scholar and vocational training team orientation
 5. Grant management seminars
 6. Rotary members' participation in, and travel to and from, Rotary project fairs, to help clubs and districts find project partners
 7. Projects and activities in countries where Rotary has clubs as well as in areas where we do not, and in

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

DISTRICT GRANTS – allocating the ~C\$74,290

- 1. Clubs submit District Grant applications via the Grants module on the D5040 website.**
- 2. After applications close on May 15, applications are reviewed by the District Grants Committee.**
- 3. We submit a spending plan of the approved District Grant applications to the Rotary Foundation.**
- 4. We receive back single block grant to fund approved projects.**
Administered by the District Foundation Committee with more flexible guidelines.

Recent Changes and Limits for District Grants

The District will match \$1 of District Designated Funds to each \$1 of cash contributions for club sponsored local community projects that:

- create a tangible asset that will have a lasting impact
- are sustainable
- are clearly identified as a Rotary project
- and involve active participation by Rotarians.

The District will match \$.50 of District Designated Funds to each \$1 of cash contributions for club sponsored projects that are seen as basically a contribution to another organization.

For any single grant project

- The **maximum District Grant funding is \$10,000**
- The **minimum grant will be \$1,000.**

Scholarships, Youth Exchange, and RYLA are not supported by district grants in D5040.

Subject to the availability of funds

Applying for a District Grant

- Must be done online in the Grants module on the **D5040 website- www.rotaryy5040.org**. ***NOT the Grant Centre on My Rotary!***
- Only members who are qualified can apply for and manage District Grants.
- Clubs submitting more than one grant request must rank their requests.
- Projects **must NOT start** until you receive notification that your application is approved.
- 50% of grant funds released when the block grant is received from the Rotary Foundation.
- 50% released when the project is complete and the final report is done and accepted.



District GRANTS Committee Review - T&Cs District Grants

District Grants **CAN NOT** be used to fund:

1. Continuous or excessive support of any one beneficiary, entity, or community
2. The establishment of a foundation, permanent trust, or long-term interest-bearing account.
3. The purchase of land or buildings
4. Fundraising activities
5. Expenses related to Rotary events such as district conferences, conventions, institutes, anniversary celebrations, or entertainment activities
6. Public relations initiatives, unless they are essential to carrying out the project
7. Project signage that cost more than \$1,000
8. The operating, administrative, or indirect program expenses of another organization
9. Rotary Youth Exchange*, RYLA*, Scholarships*

**D5040 exceptions to Rotary Foundation T&Cs*

District GRANTS Committee Review

District grant requests will be processed in the order they are received.


Early submission does not guarantee receiving a grant.

The committee considers the following criteria:

- Does the project meet all District Grant Guidelines?
- Has the club contributed to the Foundation annual fund in the past 3 years?
- Multiple grant applications must be ranked.
- Does the club have any outstanding projects (no final report)?
- The impact and sustainability of the project.
- Has the club received a grant in the past year?
