

PROGRAMS

PolioPlus Since 1988, Rotary and our partners have immunized nearly 3 billion children against polio. As of June 2021, Rotary had committed more than \$2.2 billion to global polio eradication. We're still working to eliminate the wild poliovirus in the last two countries where it remains endemic and to ensure that it does not return elsewhere. In 2020-21, program awards, including PolioPlus Partners grants, totaled \$152.9 million.

Rotary Peace Centers Each year, the Foundation supports the training of peace fellows at Rotary Peace Centers, where they earn master's degrees or professional development certificates. Since 2002-03,1,487 fellows from more than 115 countries have participated. In 2020-21, 117 fellows from 63 countries began their studies at the Rotary Peace Centers, and program awards for the fellows and centers totaled \$4.4 million.



As of July 1st, 2022 the new international Chair of the Rotary Peace Centers Committee, which every year selects the Rotary Peace Fellows for the 50 Master's Degree or 80 Professional Certificate programs in peace and conflict resolution at seven universities throughout the world, is Past District 5040 Governor Chris Offer. Member of the Rotary Club of Ladner, Chris also serves on the board of The Rotary Foundation Canada.

The seven universities are: Chulalongkorn University, in Bangkok, Thailand; University of Bradford, in Bradford, England; University of Queensland, in Brisbane, Australia; Uppsala University, in Uppsala, Sweden; Duke University and University of North Carolina, in Durham and Chapel Hill, North Carolina; International Christian University, in Tokyo; Makerere University, in Kampala, Uganda.

PROGRAMS

District grants District grants support small-scale, short-term projects related to the Foundation's mission. In 2020-21, the Foundation approved 467 district grants, and program awards totaled \$31.1 million.

Global grants Global grants fund large-scale international activities with sustainable, measurable results that support Rotary's areas of focus. Activities include humanitarian projects, scholarships, and vocational training teams. In 2020-21, the Foundation approved 2,066 global grants, and program awards totaled \$130.0 million.

Disaster response grants Rotary's disaster response grants support relief and recovery efforts in areas that have been affected by natural disasters within the past six months. In 2020-21, the Foundation approved 55 disaster response grants, and program awards totaled \$3.1 million.

The Pakistan Flood Response Fund and the Ukraine Response Fund

In January 2023 The Rotary Foundation Trustees established two temporary funds to assist Pakistan and Ukraine, two areas that are facing extreme need.

The Pakistan Flood Response Fund and the Ukraine Response Fund address the humanitarian crises caused by devastating flooding in Pakistan and the war in Ukraine. Donors can give directly to relief efforts led by Rotary members.

Contributions will be accepted until 31 December 2023. Districts can apply for grants from the funds until 30 June 2024 or until the funds have all been allocated. Any contributions that haven't been spent by 30 June 2024 will be transferred to the general Disaster Response Fund, to be made available for disasters worldwide.





Pakistan Disaster Response Fund

- Devasting flash floods-Monsoons/Atmospheric River last year
- 33 million people were affected
- 2 million homes destroyed displacing 8 million people
- One third of the country was submerged
- Funds are to be collected until December 31st and to be used up by June 30, 2024
- Raised \$1,312 To-Date





Ukraine Support 2022

- The Rotary Foundation- Disaster Response Fund grants raised \$15.5 US million in just 2 months (March/April)!
- 400+ Disaster Response Fund Grants to spend the \$15.5 million
 - Medical Equipment/Supplies, ambulances, fire trucks, RIB, Diving equipment, food, water, shelter, generators, warm clothing, etc...
- Our District raised over \$300,000 CDN
 - \$130,000 US for the Disaster Response Fund Grants
 - \$ 25,000 US District Designated Funds
 - \$ 80,000 CDN Shelter Box
 - \$ 30,000 CDN Red Cross





Ukraine Disaster Response Fund

- 18 million people have fled the country
- 40% of the country's population have had to leave the country for safety
- Medium- and Long-Term needs are growing
- Total destruction of many villages, towns and cities
- Destruction of key infrastructure has impacted access to power, clean water, ability to heat their homes/living quarters, accessing food etc...
- Working group that meets every 3-4 weeks on what is most needed.
- Working on a Disaster Response Grant- Village of Moshchun- 300 Modular Units needed
- Raised \$7,763 To-Date





Turkey/Syria Disaster Response Fund

- Earthquake
- Over 60,000 people killed
- Over 400,000 apartment/homes destroyed displacing close to 1,000,000 people
- Difficulty in assessing the Syrian side due to government/border issues
- \bullet Expected short-term relief and funds were collected until March 31^{st}
- Primary needs is Medical, Housing, other basic needs
- Shelter Box (Hero Awards)
- Raised \$8,953 (31 donors)





Year End Reminders

Clubs

- Meeting Annual Program Fund (20 clubs still under plan) and Polio Plus (24 clubs still under plan) Goals set in RCC
- Donate at least \$1,500 US to Polio (21 clubs have achieved and 4 are close)- Certificate from RI
- Check results and if close to \$10,000 US (APF + Polio)- Certificate of Appreciation 17 Earned already and 4-5 clubs are also very close
- EREY and TRF Giving Banners (7 earned so far with 3 clubs at 80% or better)- If close to 100% of club donating
- Individuals
 - Commitments to Paul Harris Society (37 of 102 have made their \$1,000 US commitment for this year).
 31 Rotarians have made at least \$1,000 US donation and have not joined the PHS!!
 - Commitments to Polio Society (70 of 140 have made their minimum \$100 US commitment so far this year)
 - EREY/Sustaining member donations (currently at 41.0% compared to 56.5% last year at the same time)



D5040 District Grants 2023-24

FUNDING FOR: short-term, small scale projects with a grant from C\$1,000 to C\$10,000.

PURPOSE: to address needs in your community and abroad.

HOW TO APPLY: after becoming qualified, clubs apply to the District using the Grants module on the District website.

HOW IT WORKS:

- The District is allocated funds by the Rotary Foundation (District Designated Funds or DDF).
- DDF comes from donations made to the Foundation Share Fund 3 years ago.
- When there are sufficient club applications, we send a list (spending plan) of the approved projects to the Rotary Foundation.
- We receive back a block grant which is used to fund the individual grants for approved club projects.

Before you can apply for a Grant you must:

- 1. Qualify your Club.
 - Have at least 2 trained members.
 - Sign the Memorandum of Understanding MOU.
- 2. Plan your Project
 - scope
 - partners
 - budget
 - resources

Qualify Your Club – applies to District Grants

- The qualification process helps ensure that your club understands the grant process, and your stewardship & financial responsibilities.
- Qualification must be completed each year.
- To qualify:
 - 1. at least two members of your club participate in the District 5040 District Grants training sessions (this session).

or at least one member attends the District Grants training and one other member takes the Grants Management Seminar in the Learning Center on My Rotary.

2. Your President and President-Elect must sign the MOU.








People who have completed the full 10-course seminar will now need to take just the Grant **Management Recertification** course each year.

Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) - signed by President & President-elect

"The Memorandum of Understanding is an agreement between the club and the District and the Rotary Foundation and acknowledges that the club will undertake measures to ensure the proper stewardship and implementation of grant supported projects."

- Have a proper financial management plan
- Maintain copies of all financial transactions
- Accurate and timely reporting
- Ensuring no conflict of interest
- Report potential or real mismanagement of grant funds

The Rotary Foundation or the District Grants committee may audit clubs or projects.

Only qualified members have access to apply for or update grants on the system.


Members who take this session will have access rights valid until June 30th 2024.



DISTRICT GRANTS – allocating the ~C\$95,000

- 1. Clubs submit District Grant applications via the Grants module on the D5040 website.
- **2.** Applications are reviewed by the District Grants Committee.
- 3. When we reach applications for 80% of the available funds we can submit a spending plan of the approved District Grant applications to the Rotary Foundation.
- 4. We receive back single block grant to fund approved projects. Administered by the District Foundation Committee with more flexible guidelines.



Recent Changes and Limits for District Grants

The *District will match \$1 of District Designated Funds to each \$1 of cash contributions* for club sponsored Projects that:

- create a tangible asset that will have a lasting impact
- are sustainable
- are clearly identified as a Rotary project
- and involve active participation by Rotarians.

The District will match \$.50 of District Designated Funds to each \$1 of cash contributions for

club sponsored Projects that are seen as a contribution to another organization.

Scholarships will no longer be supported by district grants

For any single grant project

- The maximum District Grant funding is \$10,000
- The minimum grant will be \$1,000.

Applying for a District Grant


- Must be done online in the Grants module on the D5040 website.
- Only members who are qualified can apply for and manage District Grants.
- Clubs submitting more than one grant request must rank their requests.
- Projects must NOT start until your application is approved and funds are received from TRF.
- 50% of grant funds released when the block grant is approved and received.
- 50% released when the project is complete and the final report is done and accepted.





Club Authorization Form

- Required for each Grant application/project
- Signed by Club President
- Identifies 3 people involved in the project
- Filed in Documents section of the Grant Application





District GRANTS Committee Review - T&Cs District Grants

District Grants CAN NOT be used to fund:

- 1. Continuous or excessive support of any one beneficiary, entity, or community
- 2. The establishment of a foundation, permanent trust, or long-term interest-bearing account.
- 3. The purchase of land or buildings
- 4. Fundraising activities
- 5. Expenses related to Rotary events such as district conferences, conventions, institutes, anniversary celebrations, or entertainment activities
- 6. Public relations initiatives, unless they are essential to carrying out the project
- 7. Project signage that cost more than \$1,000
- 8. The operating, administrative, or indirect program expenses of another organization
- 9. Rotary Youth Exchange, RYLA
- 10. Scholarships

District GRANTS Committee Review


District grant requests will be processed in the order they are received. Early submission does <u>not</u> guarantee receiving a grant. The committee considers the following criteria:

- Does the project meet all District Grant Guidelines?
- Has the club contributed to the Foundation annual fund in the past 3 years?
- Multiple grant applications must be ranked.
- Does the club have any outstanding projects (no final report)?
- The impact and sustainability of the project.
- Has the club received a grant in the past year?






The Rotary Foundation Timeline

- Plan your projects and submit your applications ASAP.
- The best projects engage club members, have a high impact and visibility, and are sustainable.

March 2023	PE's start planning projects
March 2023	District Grants Training
April 3, 2023	Applications Open
By end of May 2023	Signed MOU's submitted
June 30 th 2023 //	Applications Close subject to having reached 80% of the funds available.
July 2023	The proposed spending plan based on approved grants is submitted to TRF
July-August 2023	Receive TRF approval for spending plan followed shortly thereafter by funds received by District
July-August 2023	District distributes 50% of funds to clubs (Clubs may apply for hardship consideration)
Sept 2023-June 2024	Clubs enter final report information on-line and receive final funds


