Today as I write my last Digest for the newsletter – I sense a **new energy in our district**. So many of the clubs have embraced the Club Leadership Plan and in doing so – have taken on my challenge of bringing Rotary into today, into 2008. Thank you.

We have **grown our membership** for the first time in 5 years. We started our year with 1711 members and today it stands at 1810. We stand No 1 in our Zone, Zone 22 for membership growth. Thank you.

Our **contributions** to the Rotary Foundation are the highest ever and we stand at just under half a million Dollars for the year. And as 50% of the Annual giving funds which stand at over \$280,000 - come back to us to use – this is amazing. Once again I am proud to say that we stand No 1 in Zone 22 for the % per member as based on the Annual Giving total. Thank you.

You sponsored 12 young people to go to the **Peace Summit** in Windsor, Ontario and during the conference and the club presentations they are giving, they tell you how this experience has changed their lives. Thank you

My dream of having all Rotarians at the conference nearly came true – and who knows, it could have – if we did not sell out!! What an **amazing conference**. I don't think any one of us who attended the Masquerade Ball will ever forget the fun we had – the energy and partying that happened that night. The speakers were fantastic, the fellowship stunning and the venue delivered all that it promised. Thank you.

Thank you all for being here, thank you all for giving me – in the words of the Youth Exchange Students – **the best year of my life**. Thank you for your dedication to your communities and the world. Thank you for being Rotarians.

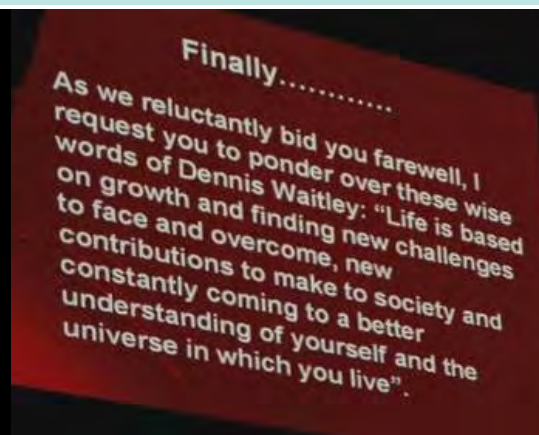
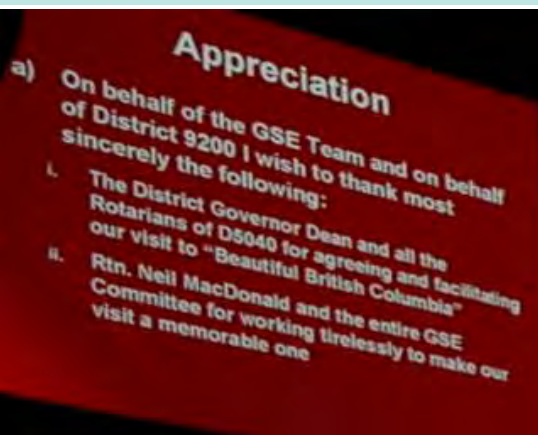

ROTARY IS THE OPPORTUNITY FOR SERVICE & FELLOWSHIP

If you had to describe Rotary in one word, "what would that one word be?" My response to this question is "OPPORTUNITY". Rotary is all about opportunity. **Rotary is the opportunity for service and for fellowship.**

When we are talking to prospective Rotarians, they sometimes ask, "what's in it for me? This is a fair question. There are a number of answers to that question. One of them is **Rotary Fellowships**. Another is **Rotarian Action Groups**. Both of these are opportunities for new members to get involved and experience the internationality of Rotary.

The two pillars of Rotary are Service and Fellowship, By the way - "Fellowship" is a gender neutral term. The initial purpose of Rotary was fellowship. It was some time later that Rotary determined that service wasn't a bad idea either.

A good Rotary Club needs a balance of service and fellowship, and sometimes our clubs lose sight of the need for fellowship. Rotary fellowship doesn't have to be limited to within the club, or between clubs. Some great **lifelong friendships** are created between Rotarians, and their spouses, through individual and personal, and often international contacts.

I have always encouraged Rotarians to "**expand their Rotary horizons**". One very rewarding way to expand your Rotary horizon is **through participation in a Rotary Fellowship or a Rotarian Action Group**.

Benefits - or - what's in it for me? Rotarians participating in these Fellowships/Action Groups will benefit from:

- Sharing of experiences, cultures, ideas, professional and technical knowledge, and the enjoyment of making new acquaintances and friends.
- Increased opportunity for service through further acquaintance.
- The opportunity to network with other Rotarians with whom you share common interests.
- The opportunity to broaden your Rotary

horizon.

Your Rotary Club will benefit because Fellowships/Action Groups can:

- Help attract new members who may have special interests in the Fellowship groups.
- Build membership by retaining experienced Rotarians. "Rotarians who play together, stay together".
- Supply ideas, knowledge, enthusiasm and skills to Rotary projects.
- Provide opportunities to exchange project experiences, social activities and fundraising ideas
- Provide networking opportunities.
- Provide opportunities to make new acquaintances.

Remember - the first Object of Rotary is: the development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service. Fellowship is the foundation upon which Rotary was built, and it is the source of Rotary's strength.

WHAT CARING ROTARIANS ARE DOING TO AID BURMA VICTIMS

In Feb, D6740 just completed a water project at an Orphanage outside of Yangon, capital of Myanmar. When **AG J.T. Warring** arrived on May 12 (his 18th travel to Burma), Yangon scene was of pervasive, ground-level devastation. **Rotarians in Pattaya and D3340 in Thailand** raised 105,000 Thai baht and sent it with him for 3 diesel generators to be installed at the three community orphanage sites and direct food aid to one or more orphanages.

These same Rotarians from five Pattaya clubs are already **coalescing with the other service clubs**, the 400-member powerhouse women's club, the Mayor's office, and churches and individuals to **raise another minimum one million Baht for direct aid to the hungry**. ROTARIANS CAME TOGETHER TO FIGHT MALARIA

Malaria is one of the biggest disease killers in the world. It is entirely preventable and treatable.

- 1 to 3 millions people die of Malaria each year.
- 70% are children under 5.
- The single most effective means is a mosquito net.
- Each long lasting insecticidal net (LLNTs) costs US \$5.
- 20 nets = 1 child's life.



Last fall we issued a request to clubs to support the Canadian Rotary Committee for International Development (CRCID) "**Against Malaria**" initiative to purchase mosquito nets for Tanzania. From across Canada and two USA clubs, the response has been gratifying and matching grants obtained.

Excerpt of updates from PDG Terry Youlton who coordinated this project:

- We have a total over \$618,000 which will purchase and distribute 120,000 LLNTs nets to institutions mostly boarding schools for poor children in Tanzania.
- 19 of 23 Canadian districts plus 2 American districts participated out of the 720 Canadian clubs with 29,000 Canadian Rotarians. the nets are being purchased through "Against Malaria" from A-Z Mfg in Tanzania and distributed without any charge by Population Services Inc. (PSI) to the institutions.
- There are over 250 boarding schools now registered for our delivery trucks.
- Rotary has succeeded in opening the door to Tanzania where, until we pushed hard on that door, a solid "No Free Nets" policy was in effect.

"VANCOUVER WAS READY FOR ROTARY" ... 1913

Rotary Club of Vancouver celebrated their 95th Anniversary.

In the late fall of 1912, while Bela Smith, President of Minneapolis Rotary club was holidaying in Vancouver, he called on J.B. Giffen, manager of R.G. Dun Company to introduce the idea of Rotary. Giffen immediately demonstrated interest and contacted four colleagues. Smith alerted the Seattle Club that "**Vancouver was ready for Rotary**" and L.F. Allen, the secretary came to Vancouver to discuss Rotary with his associates.

As a result the Vancouver Club was organized on the evening of March 8, 1913. When a Seattle delegation of 11 Rotarians led by Ernst Skeel gave a banquet at the Elysium Hotel for 19 Vancouver men. A decision was reached to proceed.

The Charter and the official recognition of the Rotary Club of Vancouver, was presented at a luncheon on April 22, 1913. The Roster of the day listed 94 members. See complete club history at [Rotaryfirst 100.org](http://Rotaryfirst100.org)

"MAY PEACE PREVAIL ON EARTH"

The **Peace Pole** is an eight foot western red cedar post with the peace prayer, "May Peace Prevail on Earth," hand carved in eight languages, two per each of the four sides.

Under an initiative begun by **Tsawwassen Rotary President Orv Nickel**, the pole will be added to Tsawwassen Rotary Square as a permanent reminder of a universal desire and basic Rotarian goal. The Peace Pole movement received renewed vigour following the terrorism of 9/11 when people around the world reacted by seeking symbols of peace, understanding and unity.

Ugali is the paste made from maize flour that most Kenya's survive on. The post election violence has crippled the Ken-

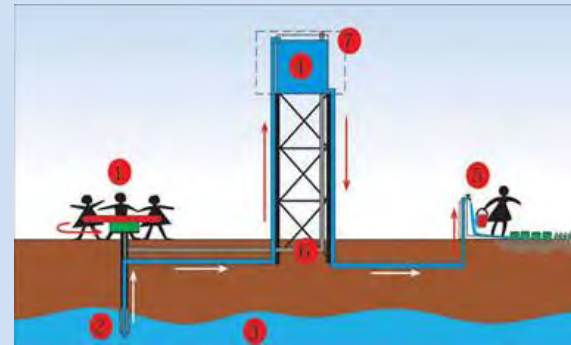
yan economy and made it much more difficult for Kenyans' to survive

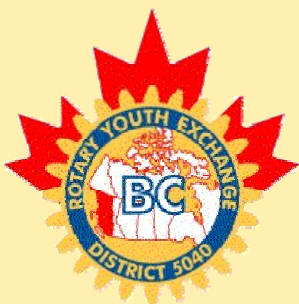
