Season of giving is in full swing as Jan 30, 2011, Lalgadh Leprosy Hospital and Service Centre in Nepal receives a large container filled to the brim with much needed medical equipment and supplies through Rotary world Help Network.

So the wonderful massive container arrived at Lalgadh Leprosy Hospital today. Well the container is so long that the container-truck couldn't get up the road through the local village to the hospital so it was unloaded onto a smaller truck at the highway and then the equipment transported up to the hospital.

Suman finished all the clearance procedures in Birgunj yesterday ...he worked very hard at it as is the necessity here in Nepal, and it took him 2 days. Birgunj is 2 3 hours away (for our vehicle, but 4-6 hours for a container truck), on the border with India. Then the container truck arrived this morning at (i.e. as close as it could get) Lalgadh Hospital.

Sunil Gupta and the President of the Rotary Club of Patan South went down to Lalgadh Hospital yesterday, and then this morning there was a lovely handing-over ceremony at Lalgadh Hospital, with speeches and a lot of very excited people and much gratitude. Sunil has been terrific in tirelessly pursuing the clearance process at Kolkata and getting the transport agent to get the container to Nepal...

We are all totally bowled over and thrilled at this marvellous thoughtful and so very helpful equipment donation from Rotary World Help Network and the Rotary Club of Vancouver, and for all the enthusiasm and encouragement from your end.

I can fill in that middle bit and how the project emerged especially at this Nepal end and how the RWHN got into the picture as far as I know, as it was such an exciting prospect for us lot at Lalgadh.

Following Robert and David's encouraging communications about the real possibility of helping LLSC with equipment (that was in March 2010 and Robert was in Haiti), at Robert's urging I e-mailed David on April Fool's Day -what a day! – and promised that I would find and get the agreement of a local Rotary Club here in Kathmandu, and to produce an equipment-wish-list-to-end-all-wish-lists.

The Rotary bit at this end was interesting too. We had been already pursuing the Rotary Club of Patan South in the anticipation that we might be able to organise a nice Rotary Project with the Rotary Club of Sydney Business District (Australia)... and since the Vice President of Rotary Club of Patan South (Sunil) is a close friend of Meena (my better half's) family... it was Sunil who we approached. So we went to a meeting of Rotary Patan South and presented David's proposal to them, and they said they would be delighted to be the coordinating local Rotary Club, and that Vice President Sunil should be their focal point for the project. And from there it developed.


At Lalgadh we filled in the RWHN application forms and sent them to Sunil for finalising and sending to you in Canada. Meantime we developed the equipment- wish-list-to-end-all-wish-lists.... we were a bit slow on that as it was quite a task, and you David patiently encouraged us with it.

During October the project was being discussed at the RWHN, and at the same time the Vancouver Rotary Club's World Community Service (WCS) committee approved funding for the shipment. All this went before the RWHN on 9th November as a recommendation from Vancouver Rotary Club... and it was magnificently approved. The 44 ft container was scheduled to be loaded on Saturday 27th November, but with the terrific enthusiasm the has characterised this project, the Rotary volunteers went on Friday 19th November and did the lot... an estimated 30,000lbs of cargo.

Suman then did an amazing job managing the enormous task of getting clearance papers through various ministries and departments, to ensure the equipment could be cleared tax free. It took him pushing and clearing and persuading. Meantime Sunil worked on the shipping agents persistently and patiently to ensure papers were ready in advance at Kolkata for when the container would arrive... and then likewise persistently and patiently to ensure the container left Kolkata and reached Birgunj dry dock in Nepal. Then more work for Suman at Birgunj, taking the Customs agents through the shipment, and ensuring (after 2 days of non-stop perseverance) that the container and contents were finally cleared. Then unloading the container and somehow managing to overload two great Tata Trucks for the final road trip to Lalgadh Hospital.

On Tuesday (15th February) Meena and I will go to the meeting of Rotary Patan South, to show them along with Sunil, the photos of the arrival and handing over ceremony of the equipment at Lalgadh Hospital, and to formally thank the Rotary Club of Patan South for its coordinating role in this wonderful project.... and to hope that more will follow.
