

**Global Grant** applications are accepted throughout the year and are reviewed as they are received. They are used to support large international projects with long-term, sustainable outcomes in one or more of Rotary's seven areas of focus.

Grant awards range from \$30,000 to \$400,000 USD.

The result of the open all year around process creates a rolling number of grants that are in draft, submitted, approved, or paid status.

## TYPES OF GRANTS

The Rotary Foundation offers grants that support humanitarian projects, scholarships, and vocational training teams. Here's an overview:

**Global grants** support large international projects with long-term, sustainable outcomes in one or more of Rotary's areas of focus. They range from \$30,000 to \$400,000. Applications are accepted throughout the year and are reviewed as they are received.

**District grants** fund smaller-scale, short-term projects that address immediate needs in your community or abroad. Applications are accepted once per year, deadline August 31 of each year.

## Clubs must qualify to receive Foundation Funds.

The process ensures that clubs are aware of all Rotary requirements and provides clubs with the tools needed to complete the on-line applications.

### Qualification Requirements

- ◆ Attend a Grant Management Seminar – 2 seminars held each year . **February 4, 2023** Rotary Field House, White Rock **March 11, 2023** Baker Creek Place, Bellingham
- ◆ Two club members must attend each year
  - ◇ One must be the President Elect
  - ◇ The second should be the club grant writer, club Foundation Chair or the grant writer in training
- ◆ Complete and submit a signed club MOU
- ◆ Clubs are qualified for one year, Members that attend the Grant Management Seminar and sign a MOU are qualified for three years
