Global Grant applications are accepted throughout the year and are reviewed as they are received. They are used to support large international projects with long-term, sustainable outcomes in one or more of Rotary's seven areas of focus.

The following are examples of the benefits of applying for a Rotary Foundation Global Grant.

The added benefit of working with other clubs in our district, plus working with clubs from other districts and then getting the other district to support their club's investments with their District Designated Funds (DDF).

This results in a lower investment for all and a greater return for the community we are trying to support.


OUR MISSION

TYPES OF GRANTS

The Rotary Foundation offers grants that support humanitarian projects, scholarships, and vocational training teams. Here's an overview:

Global grants support large international projects with long-term, sustainable outcomes in one or more of Rotary's areas of focus. They range from \$30,000 to \$400,000. Applications are accepted throughout the year and are reviewed as they are received.

District grants fund smaller-scale, short-term projects that address immediate needs in your community or abroad. Applications are accepted once per year, deadline August 31 of each year.

Clubs must qualify to receive Foundation Funds.

The process ensures that clubs are aware of all Rotary requirements and provides clubs with the tools needed to complete the on-line applications.

Qualification Requirements

- ◆ Attend a Grant Management Seminar – 2 seminars held each year.
- ◆ Two club members must attend each year:

One must be the President Elect, The second should be the club grant writer, club Foundation Chair or the grant writer in training.

- ◆ Complete and submit a signed club MOU.
- ◆ Clubs are qualified for one year, Members that attend the Grant Management Seminar and sign a MOU are qualified for three years.
