I Grew Up With Rotary

My earliest memories of Rotary extend back to when I was two years old and my family welcomed our first Rotary exchange student. Because my father was the youth exchange counselor, we met people from many different places; to this day we are still in touch with most of them. Being exposed to so many cultures while growing up was an eye opening experience for our whole family.

During my childhood, I was a member of the Royal City Youth Ballet. The Ballet Company put on productions year round and kept me and my parents very busy. Because the Rotary Club of New Westminster sponsored the Ballet Company, I remember being the entertainment for numerous Rotary luncheons and installation dinners.

My parents and grandmother saw Rotary as an essential part of



their lives and involved us as much as they could. Because of this I attended many events and conferences. In June, 1995, I went with my family and my grandmother to the RI Convention in Nice. France. I remember the town being turned upside down for the conference. Everywhere you looked you could see Rotary. I particularly remember a parade of floats made of flowers. The conference was an amazing experience for me!

This experience allowed me to see first hand the difference Rotary makes in a developing country. I spent 5 weeks in Africa helping on different projects, including installing a microscope in Bilawayo Hospital. Unfortunately, while we were there my grandmother was very ill. My dad flew back home, and I stayed for the remaining time with the rest of the group. My grandmother knew what a opportunity this trip was for me and insisted that I stay. She died soon after my dad returned home, and I came back for the funeral. My grandmother was an amazing woman and truly believed and lived the values of Rotary.

In the summer of 2003, I was asked if I wanted to attend RYLA. I decided that this could be an interesting experience, so away I went for the weekend. RYLA was an opportunity to learn more about Rotary with other youth who shared the same hopes and ideas as I did.

After a year working as a nanny in Austria, I began work at the family funeral home, (Kearney Columbia Bowell Funeral Chapel) and decided that I would take the apprentice-ship program. I started schooling in September, 2004.

On February 12, 2006, my life changed. My mother fell ill with an unknown illness and died at the age of 48. I was 20, the second oldest of 5 children. This as you can imagine turned my life and my family's life upside down. I was living in Vancouver with a friend at the time and moved back home to be with my family and help out as best I could. As terrible as this experience was, it made me stronger as a person.

I completed my funeral schooling and received my funeral-directing license in 2006. Since then, I have been working as a licensed Funeral Director. I am the fourth generation of the Kearney family to be involved in the business, and am very proud of our heritage. As we celebrate 100 years of the company's existence, I know my great grandfather, Thomas Kearney, would be very proud. My job consists of meeting with the families when someone has passed away, arranging the funerals, and ensuring all is completed properly, and that their needs are met. I help organize community events that the funeral home sponsors. Every year we hold an Honour a Life celebration at Christmas for families we have served during the year. We do this in partnership with Queens Park Care Center, QP Hospice, Royal Columbian Hospital, Crossroads Hospice and the Salvation Army. We also do a teleconference, which is a satellite downlink by the Hospice Foundation of America. I arrange for guest speakers. and am now the official voice for the company on CKNW. I am a board member of the New Westminster Chamber of Commerce and BC Bereavement Helpline.

In the spring of 2007, PDG Bernie Pregler asked if I wanted to join the Coquitlam Rotary Club. He put me in touch with PP Pam Stroud and in July, 2007, I joined Rotary. My father and my Uncle Tom (past presidents of the New Westminster Rotary Club and the Vancouver Rotary Club) were delighted to welcome me as an official member of their Rotary family.

In September of this year I married my husband, Jake Power, and we live at the Quay in New Westminster.

In conclusion, Rotary has been a big part of my life and I hope for it to continue to be. It has given me the opportunity to unite with other individuals who share the same desire for public service in our community and the world. I truly believe in the values of Rotary and strive to live them everyday in my personal and professional life. I am proud to be a member, and I am looking forward to my future in Rotary.

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Every week District 5050 club presidents have been receiving email letters from District Governor Larry Stinson sharing important and interesting information. The following is a brief summary of some of these items:

(Rotary) Governor's Weekly Notes

A Project to Reduce Child Mortality - As I have travelled around the District a number of clubs have expressed concern about coming up with a project that will have the effect of reducing child mortality. An article in the November edition of the PAJ told of a project in Niger, West Africa, developed by one of our 2009/10 Ambassadorial Scholars, Brittany Gallagher and involves the planting of Moringa trees, the leaves of which can be used to make a nutritional supplement. The project is being organized through the Rotary Club of South Whidbey Island and is very cost effective (approximately \$600US will fund a plantation in a village). Clubs interested in participating in this project may obtain further information from Cathy Scherer at cwsch@whidbey.com or by contacting their Assistant Governor.

TRF Contributions - Canadian Rotarians wishing to take advantage of the current favorable RI exchange rate (\$1.04 CAN = \$1.00 US) should consider making an online contribution to The Rotary Foundation prior to midnight October 31. After that the rate will change. Online contributions can be made at http://www.trfcanada.org/

Humanitarian Service Opportunities - Rotarians often inquire about how they can become involved in humanitarian aid trips. There is an interesting link on the home page of the District 7080 website entitled "Opportunities for Service". Simply go to http://www.rotary7080.org/ and you will see it. While coordinated from D7080 these travel opportunities are apparently open to all Rotarians regardless of location so long as there is available space.

Candidates for District Governor 2011/2012 - The District Nominating Committee will soon be considering candidates for the position of District Governor for the 2011-2012 Rotary Year. Clubs are invited to recommend qualified candidates to the Nominating Committee. The recommendation must be in the form of a resolution adopted at a regular meeting of the club, certified by the club secretary, and forwarded to PDG Harv Jubie, Chair of the District Nominating Committee, at 6717-45th Place NE Marysville, WA, USA 98270, by the deadline of January 31, 2009.

A club may only recommend one of its own members. Candidates must meet the following qualifications: (a) be a member in good standing of a functioning club in the District; (b) will have been a member of one or more Rotary clubs for at least 7 years at the time of taking office; (c) must have served as a club president for a full term or if a charter president for the full balance of the term from the date of charter (minimum 6 months); and (d) be willing and able to fulfill the duties and responsibilities of District Governor.

Canadian Rotarian Magazine Supplement - I have been advised that the RI Board has approved the proposal to create a Canada Supplement to the Rotarian Magazine effective July 1, 2009. An Editorial Advisory Committee has been appointed which includes our own PDG Rod Thomson. As a result of this decision the mandatory annual subscription rate for Canadian Rotarians will increase from US\$12 to US\$16 also effective July 1, 2009. More information will be available in the coming months regarding content in the Supplement.

Attendance & Make-Up Guidelines - There have been a number of inquiries as to what constitutes a "make-up" for purposes of meeting the attendance requirements. Attendance requirements are set out in Article 9 of the Standard Rotary Club Constitution which applies to all Rotary Clubs (page 254 of the 2007 version of the Manual of Procedure). Many of the potential activities require approval of the Club Board and so these will vary from club to club. Attached to the above email to the club presidents was a set of Guidelines that was provided by our District Secretary, Bert Monsma, which you might find useful.

Adventures in Leadership: For Youth Ages 15 - 17

The very first Adventures in Leadership will be held on **February 27 to March 1, 2009** (Friday evening to Sunday noon) at Camp Alexandra in White Rock, BC. The cost to the club is \$250 per applicant. This is our youth leadership program for high school students. We are looking for applicants in the 10th and 11th Grades (ages 15 - 17). Candidates will be accepted on a first come basis until all spots are filled.



Adventures in Leadership is a program offered by Rotary International. All costs are paid by the sponsoring Rotary club - there is no cost to participants. Adventures will give participants insight into some of the basics of what it means, and takes to be a leader: to create a well-rounded individual with increased perspective and enthusiasm for growth, who is able to make informal decisions.

Adventures in Leadership will teach participants through a variety of exercises involving leadership and growth. The sessions include: Pre-judging and assumptions; goal setting and time management; risk taking; and choices and problem solving. The program is led by youth, with guidance from adult Rotarians, in accordance with Rotary guidelines. Candidates are selected and sponsored by a local Rotary Club, with a mix of females and males.

Rotary clubs are being asked to submit candidate applications by December 7, 2008; however, because of the shortness of this notice, you are encouraged to send your applications as soon as possible.

Keramati, who gave a wonderful pres-







Assistant Governor, Area I

I'm proud to say that I'm a 24 year veteran of Rotary. As a busy ophthalmic surgeon, my club (Arlington) in the early days often granted me "grace" for violating the 100% attendance rules in vogue back then. I appreciated that and soon realized that Rotary was much bigger and more important than a single weekly meeting. This really became apparent whenever I visited a Rotary Club meeting overseas, where my wife and I were always treated with an esteem usually reserved for the closest of friends. But then, again, as Rotarians, we were friends.

I was granted the privilege of Club Presidency in 2004/5, the Centennial Year. As a surgeon, I learned much during my presidential year, especially that a surgeon's training and mentality (read: style of leadership!) can often run roughly when applied to a volunteer organization like Rotary. We accomplished a lot (the club receiving the Presidential Citation) but it wasn't an entirely smooth year. When asked to consider Assistant Governorship several years later, I knew I'd have to mellow out and research other leadership styles,

all of which would be more suited to Rotary Success than my personal "benevolent dictator" style. I credit Denis Boyd's Leadership Institute and his efforts at PETS to bringing these small points to my leadership awareness.

During the World Vintage Air Rally in 1990, my club president wrote a simple note to all of the fellow presidents of clubs we might encounter along the route of flight. Though my aircraft was usually the slowest and therefore last of 35 airplanes to arrive, at each stop Rotarians, particularly in the developing world, met us and treated all the pilot/participants with great honor and respect, as if each was a Rotarian. Landing in Islamabad, Pakistan, late one Sunday night, everything was closed....until the Rotarians there opened up banks, restaurants and a hotel to host us. Simply amazing. The absolute highlight of that trip was "making up" at a Rotary Club in Calcutta, sitting next to a lady Rotarian (no ladies in the US clubs at that time) and finding out she was professionally involved with Mother Teresa's "Mother Houses." Through her, the very next day, two of us were introduced and shook hands with Mother Teresa. What else need I say? To complete the experience, 35 antique vintage aircraft arrived in London, 27 took off, and 12 of us made it all the way to Brisbane, Australia. Without Rotary along the way, the group of us might well not have successfully completed the trip.

My latest Rotary high point was last summer having the opportunity to visit the Resita, Romania, Rotary Club (refer to the Rotary Foundation dinner report on page 6). It was there that I learned that one of their favorite "projects" was discovering, be-friending and promoting a 39 year old, self-trained artist. Mr. Vasile Popovici is a severely handicapped Polio survivor (of the same epidemic which claimed the life of his older sister at age 16.) Vasile lives with his mother in a very poor home, painting with his mother's help by holding the brush in one hand as a fulcrum and the end in his mouth to move the brush. I've recently been asked to be next year's District Polio Plus Chairman. There's lots to be done and I hope to round out my Polio Plus knowledge by participating in a National Immunization Day (NID) program next year.

A clarification in connection with the November, 2008, edition of the PAJ, "100% Paul Harris Fellow Club"

PDG John Bosch has noted that the Rotary Club of White Rock Peninsula (WRP) is the second club in District 5050 to receive the 100% Paul Harris Fellow Club award. The first club to receive this honor was the Stanwood Camano Island Club. Their banner was presented to them by DG Rod Thomson and District Foundation Chairman Rob Martin in November, 2006.

Stephen Morach, Foundation Chair, Stanwood/Camano Island Rotary Club, said that his "club wants to congratulate the White Rock Peninsula Club for becoming the second club in District 5050 to be so honored. It appears that the White Rock Peninsula club is the first Canadian club in District 5050 to have achieved this honor. It is wonderful that two clubs in our district have been recognized as 100% Paul Harris clubs, and we hope that other clubs will join us and continue to support the Rotary Foundation."

DG Larry Stinson has noted that WRP is the first 100% Paul Harris Society Club in the District, i.e. every club member has committed to contributing \$1,000 per year to The Rotary Foundation.



Projects Using Engineers Without Borders

ROTARY HAS THE REACH to effect life-saving changes in even the poorest, most remote villages. Club members who travel on Water, Health and Hunger projects experience the "Before/After" results of these projects. Rotary is not an engineering/construction outfit – we rely upon partners & subcontractors. Introducing the kindred organization -- **ENGINEERS WITHOUT BORDERS** ("EWB"): professional engineers and students who put concrete reality into the Rotary Reach (see: http://www.ewb-usa.org/index.php).

Rotary Project ideas need engineering design and implementation; and well-planned EWB projects need local leadership, liaison and funding that Rotary

clubs world-wide provide.

EWB chapters in District 5050 -- Student Chapter at WWU and Northwest Washington Professionals, Bellingham -- provide opportunity for synergistic cooperation with Rotary, here and now. Consider EWB's "Axim Water System Extension" project in the seaside fishing town of Axim, Ghana:

The community public water system does not include approximately 60 percent of the population. This project will extend the public water system to supply the poorest part of the population. In addition, the public main will be constructed to front public property, schools and churches so that people without plumbing to their homes will still have access. Future phases include emergency back up power for the water treatment plant so that water availability is guaranteed during power outages. Water quality testing equipment will be furnished so local operators can verify water quality on a regular basis. Finally, the project includes public education on the importance of hand washing in maintaining good health.

Port Moody Rotary Club's Support of PolioPlus and the Family of Rotary

After attending the 2008 District Conference our Club President, Keith Vernon, thought that we should give each guest speaker a 'certificate' with the words that Polio eradication is within our grasp and that the Rotary Club of Port Moody is committed to ensure that the risk of crippling and deadly polio is eliminated throughout the world. As a token of appreciation for speaking at our club, we will donate vaccine for ten children.

Along with that thought, we have put out an invitation to our club members that if they are invited out to someone's home for dinner, a birthday party, anniversary or some 'celebration' where you would 'take' a gift, that they take a 'certificate' instead with however many 'dollars' they would like to donate. They write a cheque to the Rotary club for the amount. A certificate is made and they take it as a 'gift'. The Rotarian who wrote the cheque will get a credit towards his 'Paul Harris'; Rotary gets the money for Polio; and the recipient is happy. We have done it for a retirement gift and dinner invitation gifts. The club keeps a 'spread sheet' and three times a year we send the money to The Rotary Foundation.

In our bulletin we now have a 'page' just for the Family of Rotary. Photos are put on that page of people who have just joined the club; people in the club who are ill; and just fun Rotary photos. It seems to be going over very well and the club looks forward to see who will be on the next week. Our Family of Rotary person sends cards out to anyone who is ill, first bringing it to the club for all the members to sign. We had one Director who was in hospital on his birthday, so we did a video at the Club of everyone singing "Happy Birthday" to him.

We have many activities throughout the year that we invite the spouses to participate. We go to the Eagle Ridge Manor and decorate the manor for the seniors; and then a couple of weeks later throw a big 'tea party' for the residents and their families. Santa shows up and it is a great 'family' activity.

The Rotary Foundation Policy Changes

Posted on the District 5050 Web Site on October 15, 2008, by Bill Robson, District 5050 Foundation Grants Subcommittee Chair

The following new policy changes are scheduled to take place effective July 1, 2009:

- Paul Harris Fellow medallions will not be provided automatically but will be available for purchase.
- The individual donor will be the only person authorized to transfer Foundation recognition points.
- Foundation recognition points will expire upon the death of the donor or the death of the surviving spouse of a Major Donor (US\$10,000+).
- Foundation recognition points and recognition amounts will only be transferred for transactions of 500 points or more.

Why are these changes being made?

• It has long been the wish of The Rotary Foundation Trustees to simplify the Foundation's programs and allow more resources to meet donors' expectations. The Future Vision Plan and these changes are intended to simplify the recognition program and, therefore, make the Foundation a more efficient, timely, and cost-effective steward of the gifts of many Rotarian and non-Rotarian donors.

Will club presidents still be able to transfer Foundation recognition points from members' IDs?

• Historically, Rotary club presidents have been allowed to authorize transfers of Foundation recognition points from the IDs of current and former members of their club. Once this change is implemented, <u>only the Individual</u> donor may transfer Foundation recognition points from their ID.

What does it mean that Foundation recognition points expire upon the death of the donor or the death of the surviving spouse of a Major Donor?

• Because only the donor will be authorized to transfer Foundation recognition points, any remaining points will expire after the donor's death, A surviving spouse of a Major Donor, however, may still authorize transfers on the donor's behalf.

What does the new 500 point threshold for transfers mean?

• Though individuals, clubs, and districts may still transfer Foundation recognition points to name new Paul Harris Fellows and present further Paul Harris awards, the minimum transfer from an account will be 500 points. Transfer requests of less than 500 points, or Paul Harris Fellow recognition amounts, would not be processed.
