On page 3 is a copy of a letter from the Governor for Rotary District 5100 regarding the death of two exchange students and the injury of several others. The January 28, 2009, edition of *The Seattle Times*, in an article written by Mary Hudetz for *The Associated Press*, it was reported that a 24-year old male (who later died from self-inflicted gun shot) "fired at a group of young people outside an under-21 night-club...among the seven injured in the shooting spree were five foreign youths - all exchange, like the Peruvian who died. They were from Italy, France, Ecuador, Guatemala and Taiwan."

With a heavy heart, District Governor Larry Stinson has shared the following:

"We are all saddened by this senseless act and express our sincere condolences to the families of the victims, their fellow Youth Exchange students, and all Rotarians in District 5100. I am attaching information (on page 3) regarding a fund established by District 5100 to assist in dealing with this tragic event. District 5050 will be making a contribution to this fund on behalf of the Rotarians in our District and our own Youth Exchange program. 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# WHITE ROCK PENINSULA PHS ROTARY CLUB "THE NEW GUYS ON THE BLOCK" Our Short History By Cass Parel

White Rock Peninsula PHS Rotary Club was chartered 6th March 2008 with 23 Paul Harris Society members. Charter President Lyle Konner. This is a unique achievement, the first and only Rotary club in the world to achieve this status, hence the letters P.H.S. This status is achieved by every members' commitment to contribute US\$ 1,000 annually to The Annual Programs Fund, Polio Plus, Polio Plus Partners or The Humanitarian Grants Program.

The mandate for our club was to have fun whilst working together on local and international projects. In the short time since our charter we believe we have achieved our mandate and have had fun whilst achieving our set short term goals, with the realization that there is still a long road ahead to implement all our ambitious goals.

Since our charter, members have raised funds and completed a wheelchair distribution project in Mexico. The joy expressed by the recipients was a heart felt

and humbling experience. This to be an annual project.

Funds for the next wheelchair distribution project in Mexico are in hand. The Wheelchair Foundation has arranged for another container of wheelchairs to be delivered to our host Rotary Club in Cancun. The funds were raised at our first annual "Drive For Mobility", a no prize golf fellowship weekend at Predator Ridge Golf Resort Vernon. This will be an annual event for golfers and non golfers alike in the Kelowna region.

We have now partnered with the South Surrey Learning Center. At their Christmas dinner, a \$5,000 cheque was presented to them for the purchase of technical equipment.

A project for the provision of clean water to a remote village consisting of fifty homes and a school in Guatemala has been approved. Total value of the first phase is approx. \$ 59,000. This will be partially funded by our contribution to The Paul Harris Society and Rotary Foundation.

Together with the White Rock Players we are currently presenting the successful Covent Garden production of *The Royal Opera House in HD*. The five performances are *Carmen*, The Sleeping Beauty, The Tales Of Beatrix Potter, Le Nozze Di Fiagaro and Romeo and Juliet.

One of our members will soon be leaving on a one month long mission providing much needed dental services to rural areas of Guatemala. Two of our members will be leaving for India to participate in the Polio Plus National Immunization Day in Delhi.

A local project supported by our club is a weekly "Bread Run". About 50 unsold fresh loaves of bread are collected from a bakery, bagged and delivered to a local Womens' Shelter. To enable this project to include meat and vegetables, fridges have been purchased.

Funds have been approved for local scholarship awards and recipients will soon be selected.

Well done guys. Not a shabby achievement.

At the orientation meeting in Simi Valley last weekend, I learned that it takes some 10 to 15 oral

vaccinations to complete the process where in North America, three doses suffice. Hence the intensity of the program in the four remaining endemic areas.

The leader of the trip (DG Anil Garg of District 5240) and I will be traveling in India by air to a remote northern territory, directly south of Nepal."

# Joint letter about polio from the RI president and Foundation chair

Dear fellow Rotarians,

This is another historic day for Rotary. Our organization was honored today to host philanthropist Bill Gates Jr. at Rotary's International Assembly in San Diego, California, USA.

Speaking to 2009-10 district governors-elect, Gates congratulated Rotarians on the success of the partnership between Rotary International and the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation to raise funds for polio. To date, Rotarians have already committed more than US\$60 million toward the \$100 million Gates Foundation challenge grant awarded in November 2007.

In recognition of Rotary's impressive fundraising success and steadfast commitment to polio eradication, Gates announced that his foundation has decided to increase its challenge grant by \$255 million – for a total of \$355 million. By accepting the increase, Rotary also accepts the challenge to raise an additional \$100 million in matching funds by 30 June 2012 and raises the combined Rotary-Gates Foundation commitment to a total of \$555 million.

All of the resulting \$555 million will be spent in support of immunization activities carried out by the Global Polio Eradication Initiative in polio-affected countries. The initiative is spearheaded by Rotary, the World Health Organization, the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and UNICEF.

In another welcomed development today, the United Kingdom's Department for International Development pledged £100 million (US\$150 million) and the German government is giving an additional €100 million (US\$130 million), both to the global initiative. These contributions are separate and will not count toward Rotary's match of the Gates Foundation challenge grant.

The infusion of funds is crucial if the world is to finally be rid of polio, a crippling, sometimes fatal disease that poses the highest risk to children. Although the initiative has reduced the number of polio cases by 99 percent over the past two decades, the wild poliovirus still persists in four countries -- Afghanistan, India, Nigeria, and Pakistan -- and imported cases from these endemic countries threaten other developing nations.

Your continued participation in this effort is vital. The Rotary International Board of Directors and the Trustees of The Rotary Foundation have unanimously agreed to accept this challenge grant to ensure the success of the PolioPlus program. Rotary and the Gates Foundation intend for their funding partnership to set an example for the rest of the world. We feel confident that this extraordinary partnership will serve as a catalyst for further donations from others to help us realize the dream of a polio-free world.

When Rotary entered the fight against polio in 1985, we promised every child a world free from the threat of polio. We are almost there. This funding agreement between Rotary and the Gates Foundation is a huge step forward, bringing us even closer to our goal. Success is our only option. Together, we can End Polio Now. # Rotary Foundation Announce Important Changes to the Rotary Foundation's Programs and Services Beginning in 2013

# **Rotary Foundation Six Areas of Focus:**

Peace and Conflict Prevention/Resolution Disease Prevention and Treatment Water and Sanitation Basic Education and Literacy Economic and Community Development

## **Rotary Foundation District Grants**

Opportunities for smaller activities, either locally or internationally will be available through District Grants. These will be modeled after the District Simplified Grants as they are currently established. These will be provided to the District as a block grant from the Districts available DDF. Up to 50% of a District's DDF may be applied for each year. These funds will be administered locally using the guidelines established by the Rotary Foundation

# **Rotary Foundation Global Grants**

These grants will focus on larger, **sustainable impact** projects that concentrate on long term effects that meet specific standards for quality and have clear Rotarian involvement. These will focus on maximizing global resources from Rotary partners. These will be awarded in the six areas of focus.

These grants may be either Club or District developed projects, or packaged projects identified by the Foundation's Partner Non Government Organizations. Club or District sponsored projects will function much as they do now. Both Humanitarian and Education projects will be included in these Global Grant project opportunities.

Packaged grants will be coordinated with one of Rotary's Global Partners. These will have a standardized approach to developing and managing these projects. These funds will come entirely from the World Fund, not District Designated Funds (DDF).

The Foundation will identify partner organizations in each of the six areas of focus. These partners will provide funding, expertise and advocacy.

The Share system will remain in place. Total District/Club contributions will be split 50/50 as they are now. A District may elect to receive up to its 50% or can elect to receive a lesser amount. The current World matching arrangement will remain in the current model, but this will only applies to the Global projects, NOT the District sponsored projects with their half of the DDF funds. This is much as it is now. District Simplified Grants are smaller but don't receive any match, except from Clubs' contributions. It is important that every Club become familiar with the different new grant options and understand how these may affect their projects.
