Seven Simple Steps for Recruitment Success Expanding the Chairs



Many clubs find it to be a challenge to recruit new members and don't realize the power of selling. Not comfortable with sales? Few people are, but the truth is that every day you unconsciously persuade people and sell your ideas by showing what's in it for them. To apply the same principles and persuasion techniques you use daily, simply follow these **seven simple steps**, and you will be well on your way to successfully increasing membership.

- 1. Be prepared. Have information regarding membership readily available. This may be in the form of a club brochure, a guest invitation card, or simply your "elevator speech."
- 2. Take advantage of a wealth of information on benefits. Have on hand current and accurate information about Rotary and the District, as well as International events. Many brochures are available for download at the RI website, often in printer ready format.
- 3. Reflect on the primary reason you first joined, and why you continue membership. A personal anecdote, relating how the organization has benefited you, is often most compelling. You know the value of membership; the challenge is to communicate it.
- 4. Listen to prospects and uncover their objections. Once you've determined the primary objections to joining, tailor your message to address those concerns, especially showing how your club accepts various forms of membership, such as honorary members, only requiring 60% attendance for meetings, or how makeups are an accepted way to keep membership attendance requirements.
- 5. Be enthusiastic, and don't let objections throw you. Objections —particularly "I don't have the time" or "I don't have the money"—are a natural part of the sale. Objections are often a request for more information, or they may give your member prospect a pause, a chance to think through the idea of joining.

One of the best ways to deal with objections is the "feel, felt, found" method. For example, if someone tells you that membership is too expensive, you can reply, "I know how you feel" and I know how hard we have to work these days to make every dollar count. Others felt that way, until they found how invaluable membership was to keeping connected with fellow members of the community, giving back in ways that go over above simply writing a check, as well as networking opportunities." Give it vour own personal touch.

- **6.** Follow up with your prospect. Generally you have to reinforce and reiterate the reasons for joining the club at least once.
- 7. Practice these steps and don't get discouraged. You are helping your club by getting the word out there, just as your work in your club helps society and your community.

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Marysville Rotary Community Grant Awards This year.

Marysville Rotary recently awarded community service grants totaling \$25,668.48 to 15 different organizations, in the Marysville service area. With these awards, Marysville Rotary has awarded a total of \$48,668.48 to

some 20 different groups over the last year. Some of the groups to benefit from these awards were YMCA, Snohomish Co. Arts Council, Providence Hospice, Marysville Pilchuck High School Mock Trial Club, Special Olympics, Marysville School District, Marysville Food Bank, and Little Red School House.

The chair of the community service committee said, "given the economy, we were pro active with these second half awards and sent out over 150 post cards to groups in the area letting them know that we had grants available. As a result of that we got back 27 requests, totaling \$146,000.00 showing a real need in the community."

The Marysville Rotary board dipped into reserves to fully fund the community service grants, after this year's auction revenues were less than expected. The board wanted to fully fund the amount budgeted to the community services committee given the economy, but, if the auction fund raiser this year doesn't do better than last year, it will most likely mean fewer grants for the upcoming year, at a time when it is needed most.

Having Fun Getting It Done

It was a great day on Saturday. But it wasn't the beautiful sunshine that made it great. It wasn't the gardening, or steaks on the grill. It was better!

We gathered at Building Source at 9 AM—five of us—**Ray Green** spearheaded the project, and **Dick Sutton**, **Steve Kaz**, **Bob Jacobs** and I jumped in to help. The parts were ready; all that was needed was the focused energy of good Rotarians to bring the project to life. And life it had! So much potential, just waiting to be brought to completion! Boards, pre-cut to length, painted and stacked—Rotarians had done this work two years before. And now the pieces sat, waiting for this particular sunny Saturday to blossom into true form.

Then the fun began! From 4 x 4s and drilling in toe-nailed screws, the hands flew, first uncertainly, then with building confidence. Piece after piece, the structure took shape. Sheeting was applied;

screws were sunk into wood. Soon the team was finding its pace, and each person was having a great time. And then the first bus shelter was done, and the second begun. But this time, the team knew the drill, literally. And like a well-oiled machine, the team set to work, and in no time it seemed, the second shelter rose up from the ground. It had taken two hours to build the first, and only one hour on the second.

In less than four hours, we assembled two shelters for kids in the community to stay dry waiting for the school bus. Kind of hard to imagine rain with a day like Saturday, but indeed it DOES rain (occasionally) here. The bus shelters will be placed where the School District believes they will be of greatest benefit, and will sit with the Rotary emblem proudly displayed on the windows.

This is one important part of what being a Rotarian is all about. It is more than just attending meetings. It is about getting involved, picking up the tools, pitching in to help make a difference. It's about camaraderie, getting to know people, telling jokes (only some can be repeated!), and having FUN getting the work done, all to benefit folks in our community. It was just about one p.m. when the last of the screws were set, the drills were quiet, the sun high in the sky. A sense of satisfaction was enjoyed by all. The final finishing will be another team event a week or two hence. This was great work, and great fun. Thanks, team, for a job well done!

Mixed Items from Editor's In Basket

Excerpts from some of DG Larry Stinson's weekly messages.

Future Vision Plan Survey Results - I am pleased to report that we received survey results from over 90% of the clubs in the District and that all were in in favor of District 5050 applying to be a participant in the Pilot Program being undertaken by The Rotary Foundation (TRF) with respect to grants. The application will be filed with TRF and we will await the decision of the Trustees as to which districts will be included in the Pilot Program.

TRF Minimum Transfer Amounts - A reminder was sent to clubs regarding the Foundation Policy Changes taking place July 1, 2009, including the fixing of a threshold for the transfer of recognition points. The Trustees in their April, 2009 Meeting

have reduced the minimum point transfer number coming into effect July 1 from 500 to 100.

June 30, 2009, Deadline for TRF Contributions Approaches - The latest Monthly Contribution Report from The Rotary Foundation shows that a number of clubs in the District do not appear to have sent in their contributions to the annual programs fund for the year. District Foundation Chair PDG Rob Martin would like to remind clubs not to delay in submitting contributions that are intended for the 2008-09 Rotary Year.

New Rotary Club - I am pleased to announce that we have a new Rotary Club being formed in District 5050. It is the Rotary Club of Surrey-Fraser Heights and is meeting Wednesdays at the Satay Garden Restaurant, 15976 - 108 Avenue, Surrey, BC, commencing at 6:45 in the evening. Club President is Cathrine Levan (tel 604-562-0300) and the new club is being sponsored by the Surrey-Guildford Rotary Club. Provisional status has been granted so Rotarians can do make-ups at the new club. A trip to Belize for Linda and George Balzer a couple of years ago, which included a makeup Rotary meeting, has resulted in a Belize connection and an amazing work project by three members of our club. Ron Baker, George and Linda Balzer, Bob and Gayle Carter, and Randi O'Conner made a journey to the capital of Belize in January, 2009, to follow through on the idea that our Rotary club might be able to help the new Belize Sunrise Club with their library project.

Belize is a developing Central American country with poor infrastructure, many people living in squalor and huge issues facing its citizens. Photos of the community surrounding the library show housing of minimal standards and decrepit buildings on stilts to avoid the floods. We were reminded that the photos actually make the buildings look better than they are. Life is challenging in Belize.

The Port Loyola Library was the focus of the project. Vandalism and damage from flooding necessitate a long list of work needing to be done. Our trusty team of Canadian workers rolled up their sleeves to tie rebar for a concrete wall, push and shovel concrete into the hole and sort through enormous pallets of donated books from Ohio. The books arrived by a military plane organized by Sarah, a 4 foot 10 inch powerhouse and the local club president.

We took photo after photo showing the team sweating in the heat, sorting books.

Gayle confessed that she has had it with books! Lead helper, Jorge from Belize, proudly sported his Rotary shirt and

worked along side our team, making sure they had food, drinks and a real Belize welcome.
