
### Message from the District Governor



#### **George Henny's Letters From the Convention**

#### Part 1

The Rotary International Convention is underway! **Russ DeWolfe** (Club President for 09-10) and I arrived in Birmingham, England on Friday morning, June 19, 2009. Around 20,000 Rotarians are registered this year. As luck would have it, I managed to get some great tickets for us to the Concert of Concerts Saturday night, with British diva Katherine Jennings and the Birmingham Symphony Orchestra. After scoping the convention area, we headed to Birmingham, exploring the downtown core.

On Saturday, we spent most of the day in the House of Friendship, where you can casually explore all kinds of Rotary projects underway with clubs around the world, enjoy live music, and enjoy plenty of Rotary shopping. After linking up at the Wheelchair Foundation booth, we jumped into the car and headed to central Birmingham for the Concert of Concerts. That was when serendipity and fun took hold. As Russ and I walked up to the front, still in our polo shirt and short sleeves from the House of Friendship, we started recognizing the faces with us. On one side sat **Sakuji Tanaka**, RI Convention Chair and Trustee of The Rotary Foundation. On the other side of Russ were **Incoming RI President John Kenny and his wife Jane!** Next to them was the **Lord Mayor of Birmingham** and his wife, Birmingham

Convention Committee Member **Brian Fuller** and his wife, and **RI President D.K.**Lee and his wife Young. Wow! Imagine getting to meet them all that way, get pictures, and have an outstanding fellowship event, all in one go! Truly wonderful people,

generous of their time and resources, and skillfully leading Rotary forward and inspiring Rotarians to achieve great things in our world and truly Make A Difference Together.

On Sunday morning, Russ and I attended the "Northern Lights Breakfast" where Rotarians from Zones 22 and 23 gather, and what a delight. At our table, **Past RI President Wilf Wilkinson and Joan** sat, as well as **Robert Scott**, chairman of the International Polio Plus Committee. We were also able to visit with **Incoming RI President John Kenny and Jane**, and to wrap things up, **RI President D.K. Lee** spoke to the group. What an experience!

On Sunday the first plenary session launched with an amazing display of Korean culture in honor of RI President D.K. Lee's home country of South Korea. It unfolded in brilliant color and talent as the Korean Dance Troupe displayed what can only be described as beauty in motion, as the dancers twirled and swirled, fans shifting shapes like a turning kaleidoscope. A group of young singers called "The Little Angels" filled the auditorium with their silvery voices. Finally, a demonstration followed of Korea's national sport, Tai Kwon Do, with two dozen black belts smoothly kicking and punching, leaping and splintering boards. The flag ceremony followed, with the flags representing all of the countries where Rotary is present - 153 flown (some flags represented more than one, like the U.K.). After the opening remarks, we got our first surprise. Not listed on the program for security reasons, the **Secretary General of the United Nations, Ban Ki-moon** stepped out and addressed the assembly. He reinforced the U.N.'s support of Rotary in its work around the world, commending the work we are doing as Rotarians to lead the world in the eradication of polio.

**RI President D.K. Lee** spoke about this past year - about all of the ways that Rotary Clubs have done amazing work to "Make Dreams Real" and reduce avoidable childhood mortality. But he also challenged us, because the work is ongoing. Truly, "The Future Is In Our Hands." This has a double meaning - we are responsible for our future, and it requires each of us to do the work necessary to reach the future we envision.

#### Part 2

It is one moment that defines an experience, but the totality of many points of light that creates a lasting image. Simply put, the Rotary International Convention is the singular place to get a true sense of the internationality of Rotary. And it is quite humbling. But one thing is consistently true: Rotarians abide by the same principles around the world, and thus, it is almost a sure thing that you will find a friend, a colleague, and a common bond with the people you meet at the RI Convention. "Service Above Self" and "The Four-Way Test" are spoken - and lived - here.

And just when you are ready to be a mere peon in the Rotary world, **John Kenny**, **RI President-Elect**, said this to our Incoming Club President **Russ DeWolfe** in his Scottish brogue: "You are the most important person in Rotary, because without Clubs and their Presidents, there would be no Rotary International, and I would not be here." During a plenary session, **RI PE John Kenny** eloquently shared, "We in Rotary have potential that is unmatched by any other humanitarian organization in the world. We can bring health to the sick, education to the illiterate, water to the thirsty, and sustainable livelihood to the poor and the hungry." "It is for this reason that I selected the theme, "The Future of Rotary Is In Your Hands."

Some of the other convention presenters and topics:

- Clarissa Brocklehurst, Chief Water, Sanitation and Hygiene, UNICEF, spoke about the huge issues of water, sanitation and hygiene, or as she put it, "taps, toilets and soap." For a successful solution, all three must be tackled at once. UNICEF is looking to partners like Rotary to help.
- **Illiteracy** is closely linked to extreme poverty, pollution and illness, and hunger. "Illiteracy is a form of imprisonment," said one speaker. Literacy projects must be done carefully, and to be truly effective, must be in concert with other vital needs.
- Tom Henderson, CEO of ShelterBox, shared how ShelterBox is making a difference when disaster strikes. Rotarians are there, not only financially, but to be a helpful and trusted source of "real" information in a disaster area. My eyes teared up with pride as I saw what we Rotarians do. I am proud to be a Rotarian!
- Actress **Mia Farrow** spoke on Tuesday. As a polio survivor, she is a fervent advocate for Rotary's efforts for polio eradication. "We are almost there, we just have to push a little further." She also shared about her experiences in Darfur, where millions have suffered atrocities we cannot imagine. Some of the worst affected are the children, so D.K. Lee's theme of reducing avoidable child mortality is emphasized as she works to help the plight of those in the Darfur region.
- Dr. Jane Goodall was featured on Wednesday. Her work with chimps and battling the loss of their environment has enabled her to be an inspiring voice for change. "Find others with your passion and work together." "We need to join our head and our heart." "So how, with our intellect, can we sit and let the world fall apart? What happened to WISDOM?" "Every single day we live, we make a difference, and we have a choice as to what kind of difference we are going to make."

• Our own Past District Governor **Dave Robinson** was featured during a session on membership retention.
