Canadian Rotary Centennial Project

To celebrate the first one hundred years of Rotary in Canada, all 23 Rotary District Governors with

Canadian based Rotary clubs, have agreed to raise funds to build a school in Jalalabad Afghanistan. Approximately 4,000 students (mostly girls) will attend the school in three shifts. It will be similar to another Rotary built school and other buildings in the area.

The Canadian Federal Government, as part of its Afghanistan Challenge Program, will match dollar for dollar donations from Canadian Rotarians and clubs. The overall goal is to raise CAN \$200,000.00 (about \$250.00 per Canadian based Rotary club). Donations are also wel-

comed from our American Based Rotary Clubs as together we make a statement about who we are as Rotarians and what we stand for.

This is a very important project for our District to participate in. Several of our clubs have asked how to support this project. There are two ways to donate.

gas." Participating teams were to prepare five gallons of chili the day before to serve to the judges. The following is the "Red Hot Rotary Chili" recipe President Jack developed for their first annual chili cook-off.

- 1 lb ground beef or veggie ground
- 1 large can red kidney beans
- 1 large can romano or pinto beans
- 1 large can of diced tomatoes
- 1 chopped medium yellow onion
- 1 cup diced celery
- 1-2 clove of garlic, minced
- 3 tbsp butter or oil
- 1 tbsp chili powder
- salt to taste

Optional:

hot sauce (you pick the heat)

1 cup water, or enough for desired consistency


Instructions:

Heat butter or oil in frying pan, add onion, garlic and celery, cook for two minutes. Add ground beef or veggie ground, cook well. Mix in chili powder, add beans and tomatoes. Add optional ingredients and simmer for 30 minutes, stirring often. Top with shredded cheddar cheese and serve with fresh buns or tortilla wedges.

Rotaractors sound off about future of Rotary

Let's face it: If Rotarians don't succeed in attracting younger members to their clubs, there won't be any clubs to attract members. **Megan Cotugno**, a former Rotaractor who is now a Rotarian, doesn't mince words when she talks about the importance of younger generations to the future of Rotary.

"One thing I've done in the past few years is really advocate for Rotaract as an integral part of the family of Rotary," she says. "Rotaract is the future of this organization. Youth may only be a small percentage of our community, but we are 100 percent of the future."

Cotugno became hooked on Rotary while accompanying her mother, who had just become a Rotarian, on a mission trip to Mexico City in 2001.

Rotaractors like Cotugno represent an important source of future Rotary club members. In honor of New Generations Month, we tracked down a couple of Rotaractors who went on to become Rotarians, as well as some who are waiting to make the leap, to see what they had to say about making the transition from Rotaract to Rotary.

Jonathan Nish, former Rotaractor and member of the Rotary Club of Putney, Greater London, England, since 2006: "The key is for clubs to invite Rotaractors. The relationship between the Rotaract club and the sponsoring club is important. You have to keep those channels open. The more young people who join, the more we sort of tip the scales and make it easier for others."

Nina Kolenc, a former Rotaractor and member of the Rotary Club of Maribor Lent, Slovenia, since March: "My father was a Rotarian, and my mother and brother were in Rotary clubs. I think it's very important that Rotarians know about Rotaract. To be invited, they first have to know you. It is better if Rotarians have some projects together with Rotaractors; it's easier to make those connections."

Jorge Aguilar, president of the Rotaract Club of Chicago: "Rotaractors see ourselves as the next generation. I think it's very important for Rotary to attract younger members -- just look at the demographics. A great tool Rotary has is its educational programs. I was an exchange student in Switzerland in high school. I never would have been able to spend the time abroad as a young person if it wasn't for the [Rotary] Youth Exchange program. What family can afford that? That's how I got involved and what made me want to give back."

Philippine Typhoon Disaster

The information on the flooding in the Philippines and the photographs were provided to the *Peace Arch Journal* by many people including PP Robert Campbell, DG Larry Jubie, GSE Leader Mark Kendziorek, and Manny Reyes, who is working with the Red Cross and sent the photographs.

As many of you know, Manila, Philippines, was recently devastated by a typhoon which produced one month's worth of rain in about 10 hours.









Over two million people were severely affected, including many Rotarians. This is the same District 3800 which our GSE Team visited in March, 2008, and from which a team visited us in May, 2008. Several Clubs in our district are contributing funds to the disaster relief fund which has been established by Rotary District 3800, Philippines. District 5050 Rotarians Travel to Ethiopia for Polio NID and Wheel Chair Distribution

Editor's note: The following is extracted from emails sent by Assistant Governor Carol Tichelman to our district from Ethiopia. We hope that Carol's notes will encourage you to attend the district's Foundation Dinner on November 14, 2009, in Surrey, B.C.

On our first day we had breakfast and then were introduced to our hosts from the seven Rotary clubs in Addis, Ethiopia. We were divided into seven groups and were taken on a tour, which was an eye opening experience, by our respective host clubs. I know why you have to be a licensed national to drive in the city/country and learned that

Our group included 50 Rotarians (not including three members of a film crew from the Gates Foundation who joined us a few days later for the Polio NID).

We spent most of the day at the Cheshire Hospital. They serve about 70 children at a time, doing repair to those afflicted with two diseases - polio and noma. Noma is a gangrenous disease of the mucous membranes believed to be caused by malnutrition that causes incredible disfigurement to the face. We could not help falling in love with the children. After some initial shyness they laughed, talked, played and sang for us. We had lunch on the grounds there and watched them play. It is amazing how well those kids compete at soccer on crutches!!! After lunch we participated in a very emotional delivery of about 25 wheelchairs. Later we toured a NGO (non-government organization) HIV/AIDS orphanage in which all of the kids (from newborns to seven year olds) have the disease, but no families. The smiles and love brought tears to our eyes.

On day two my group toured a workshop for persons with intellectual disabilities, toured through some of the ghettos of Addis, and had morning refreshment on the outskirts of town in a beautiful area overlooking a volcano lake. During lunch we learned about the amazing life our day's host, and later visited his bamboo factory (the only facility of its kind in all of Africa) where they produce everything from laminate flooring to toothpicks and smokeless charcoal briquettes. In the evening two members of our host club took us to a traditional Ethiopian restaurant (the oldest one in town).

Day three started with a breakfast briefing that included a representative from the World Health Organization (WHO). We then visited three schools, two slums and a community water project. At one of the schools we were greeted by 2,300 students lining 4 levels of balconies and filling the outside grounds area (see center photograph below). As we entered the compound a HUGE roar of greeting came and carried on for a long time. It was quite powerful. Later most of the group went to the American Embassy for a reception. In the evening I attended the meeting of my host's Rotary club.

Day four we traveled ten hours by bus to the very remote assigned immunization area (near the border with Somalia). See photograph (lower right) of Carol Tichelman giving a child the drops.
