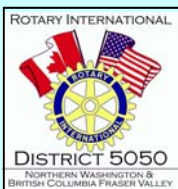

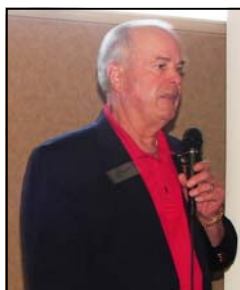

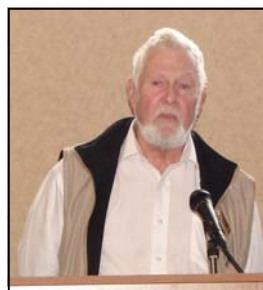

PDG Rob, Group Study Exchange (GSE) Chair, outlined the eligibility for a candidate and noted that Rotary clubs do the initial interviews. An outbound GSE team just returned from Ireland. Two teams will visit D5050 in 2011 (Ireland and Korea), a German team in 2012, and two outbound in 2012.

Gayle and Frank presented the District Simplified Grant (DSG) program. The chair, Steve Miller, was away on a polio NID in Ethiopia. Ten projects have been funded for 2010-11, including two international projects. The largest grant was \$4,000. New projects should focus on one of four areas: clean water, health, hunger, or literacy.

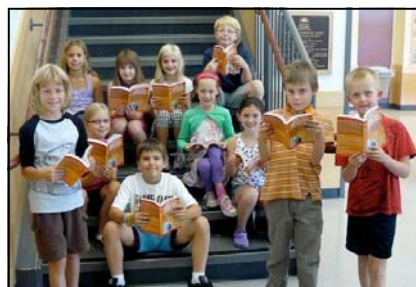

Prior to becoming a Rotarian, I worked closely with the several Rotary clubs to implement Connections, a three day retreat for teens and law enforcement officers designed to break down stereotypes, build positive relationships and address kids at risk. Largely supported by the Rotary Club of Everett, I worked closely with Rotary members to implement the program and learned about the positive work Rotary does both locally and internationally, and I became a huge supporter. In January of 2000, I was inducted into the Rotary Club of Everett, at the time the youngest member of the club.

My current vocational classification is Childhood Development, as I am the Development Director for Little Red School House, a non-profit organization that provides early intervention services to families and their children (birth to 3) who have disabilities or delays, or who are at risk of falling behind. Prior to now I have held classifications of Youth Development Administration and Real Estate Appraisal Research.

Within my club, I have served on several committees, as multiple year chairs for Youth Foundation Services Committee and the Special Events Committee, as Avenue of Club Service and Avenue of Community Service Chair, two years on the Board of Directors, and as Club Vice President. In 2007-2008 I was District 5050 Conference Chair and I have been newly hired as District 5050 Administrator.

One of my favorite service projects is our annual Rotary Park Clean Up that we do each spring. At this project I am able to get dirty, work hands-on outside, and it provides fellowship along with service so I can get a chance to know fellow Rotarians better, something that is sometimes difficult in a club of over 170 people!

In 2006, I was able to travel and spend seven days in Central Mexico to deliver wheel chairs in two different countries with a group of Rotarians from three local clubs. It was a powerful and impacting experience, and one that I would recommend to all Rotarians.

I like to tell people that Rotary provides many opportunities for people to be involved in service, fellowship and fun. If you are not a Rotarian, understand that Rotary is an international organization that is highly effective in making a positive change and building peace in communities around the world. If you are a Rotarian, find the right place where you can grow from being a casual member to truly being a committed and connected one. I am proud to be a Rotarian, and I am always impressed by the quality of our membership and the commitment of the Rotarians I meet.

My husband Jim and I live in Everett with our beautiful blended family, Tyler who is 19 and attending Central Washington University, Katherine who is 14 and is an excited high school freshman, and Lauren who is a happy 7th grader. We take pride in doing projects in our home and yard and enjoy watching sports, listening to music, exercising and playing games. Tuesday, October 26, 2010 **Africa seizes chance against polio**

More than 72 million children to be immunized across 15 countries to tackle remaining risks

Dakar/Brazzaville – This week, Africa seizes an unprecedented chance to drive out polio when 15 countries across the continent launch a synchronized mass immunization campaign to reach 72 million children, capitalizing on gains made this year.

A total of some 290,000 vaccinators have been mobilized to go door-to-door to deliver two drops of oral polio vaccine (OPV) to every child under five in areas considered at "highest risk" of polio transmission.

All countries in the West Africa sub-region will again conduct two full campaigns in February and March, 2011, but high-quality immunization campaigns must be complemented by enhanced routine immunization and strong disease surveillance.

Rotary Club of Arlington Celebrates 40 Years!

On August 19, 2010 the Rotary Club of Arlington held its 40th anniversary Celebration at the Gleneagle Country Club where over 90 Rotarians and their guests attended and enjoyed sharing of our club history by our club charter members.

The first meeting of the “Rotary Club of Arlington” was held April 6, 1970, at the Turkey House in Arlington under the name of Marysville North County Rotary, with President Gordon Shea presiding and 25 initial members. We are one of the oldest Rotary clubs in District 5050, which covers northern Washington and British Columbia. On December 15, 1978, the club changed its name to North Snohomish County Rotary Club, and on April 26th, 2001 the name was changed to Rotary Club of Arlington. Our current membership is 70 active and 11 honorary members. Our club continues to grow and to establish the tradition of fun and fellowship, while focusing on service to others.

In 1984, the decision was made to charter a new club. Since the club was originally the Marysville-North County Rotary, it was decided that Marysville should have its own club.

John Garner was one our members that moved to the Marysville Club as a charter member along with several others. **Dick Post**, who joined 39 years ago, is the longest active member. Other charter members attending the 40th anniversary included **John Mitchell, Don Richards, and Bob Bibb**.

Since its inception, the Rotary Club of Arlington has given back to the community of Arlington, Snohomish County, and worldwide. We annually support the Boys Scouts of America, Arlington Boys & Girls Club, Kids Kloset, Arlington Education Foundation, Open Door Theater, Stillaguamish Senior Center, High School Scholarships for graduating seniors of Arlington, Darrington and Lakewood High Schools, Cocoon House, Foster Families, the Arlington Food Bank, American Cancer Society, Children’s Burn Foundation, and the Kidstown Project. We participate in the effort of Rotary International to wipe out Polio worldwide, the Haiti Disaster Relief Fund, Safe Water Systems in China, and Operation Rescue.

Virginia, who was born east of Snohomish, Washington, moved with her family to Sequim, where she met a young soldier, Leeon Aller. At the beginning of World War II, Leeon was a member of the U.S. Army National Guard. Before long he was ordered out to the Pacific Theater. Shortly after the war, Virginia and Leeon were married. After Leeon completed his medical studies, they returned to Snohomish where he founded the Snohomish Family Medical Clinic. Virginia was a noted artist and taught in the Snohomish School District. As part of humanitarian work in Guatemala, she established a Christian school in the highland city of Barillas.

PCP Rick Homme commented: “I can’t tell you exactly when Virginia joined Rotary, maybe when Leeon was President in 1995/96. If I recall correctly, it was a surprise to Leeon when she became a member. She was a pretty regular attendee, but that changed a bit when she became dependent on her wheelchair.”

On Thursday, December 9, 2010, Snohomish Rotary Club will host a dinner to present the “Aller Humanitarian Award” to honor a Rotarian volunteer, Terry Earnhart, and to raise funds for the Hands for Peace Making Foundation.
