Heartbeat—Serving Wounded Warriors provides emergency assistance, therapeutic services, support groups, and morale-building programs for wounded service members and their families in Washington state. Our focus is on the wounded and injured. Heartbeat is a private, 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization — donations are tax deductible as allowed by law.

We offer our programs to wounded and injured service members from all branches of the military: Air Force, Army, Coast Guard, Marines, and Navy.

















How we help

Heartbeat's programs and services for wounded warriors and their families are continually growing. We offer support for many types of needs: emergency, physical, emotional, and daily living.

Current services and programs include

- Emergency financial assistance
- · Back in the Saddle Warriors—equine assisted therapy program
- · Scuba Warriors—therapeutic scuba activity
- · Morale-Building programs and events
- · ARC kits for incoming wounded warriors

Why we help

Our brave families and service members make daily sacrifices for all of us. Heartbeat believes it's critical to step up and serve those who give endlessly for our freedom and way of life.

When brave warriors return home with physical and psychological injuries, everything changes. Health issues present unexpected challenges. This affects both the service member and the family. Injuries such as traumatic brain injury (TBI), post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD), and paralysis are life changing.

Oftentimes, people forget about our brave, wounded warriors when they come home. Oftentimes that is when they need us the most.

Our goal at Heartbeat—Serving Wounded Warriors is to help our brave service members gain control over their health challenges and lead productive lives.

The military teaches our brave men and women to take care of themselves and others—they're givers, not takers. They don't ask for help. When their community voluntarily helps them, it creates a powerful impact on wounded service members' emotional and physical well-being.

History

The events of September 11, 2001, deeply affected many people in our nation. Janice Buckley was one of them. She felt the call to support our nation's military families but wasn't sure what to do. So she baked brownies for the National Guard.

This began a long journey of volunteer work for the United Service Organizations. From there she met many military families and learned different ways to help.

At one point Janice gathered gift certificates around Washington and gave them to soldiers arriving home from Irag.

Determined to do more for our nation's most important resource, Janice founded Operation Homefront Washington (OHWA) in 2004. It became a chapter of the national Operation Homefront organization. By 2008, OHWA had served more than 29,000 families and had grown to more than 250 volunteers.





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Improving Water Quality to Save Lives: A Rotary Peace Fellowship Experience

As many of you know, I have been based at the University of North Carolina in Chapel Hill for the last two years with a strong focus on water issues. My studies here have been generously funded by the Rotary Foundation and I am grateful for much guidance and support from family, friends, colleagues, expert researchers/ practitioners, and corporate/institutional partners in my learning experience.

On Saturday March 31 the Ninth Annual Rotary Spring Peace Conference will be held in Chapel Hill, North Carolina and as one of nine Rotary Peace Fellows I will have the opportunity to share lessons learned on improving access to clean water in developing countries – based on my experience in Kibera, Kenya as a case study and where I will go from here. I would like to invite you to attend the live online video broadcast of my presentation (details below). Attached is a summary with more details of my topic.

Rotary Peace Fellows pursue Master's degrees in areas related to peace and development and our studies are graciously sponsored by the Rotary Foundation, one of the world's leading humanitarian organizations. During the conference, eight other Peace Fellows will discuss topics such as health policies in South Sudan, development in the Brazilian Amazon, and Japan's role in peace-building efforts in Africa and you are welcome to watch their presentations too. My presentation will begin this Saturday, March 31, at 10:40am Eastern Standard Time and will last 15 minutes, followed by a 10 minute Q&A and a demonstration of a water purification method. For those viewing from overseas, this time corresponds to 10:40am in Montreal/Toronto, 5:40pm in Nairobi, 6:40pm in Abu Dhabi, and 10:40pm in Hong Kong. The live web stream starts at 9am until 3:30pm (local time) at: http://global.unc.edu/live_stream/. Viewers will need to make sure they have Microsoft Silverlight installed on their computers. You can install it for free by going to http://www.microsoft.com/silverlight/.

The Rotary Club of White Rock and BC211 Partner to

Launch Valuable Awareness Tool for Seniors

White Rock – March 16, 2012 - The peninsula's oldest Rotary Club is distributing a Seniors' Help Line magnet informing seniors they can Dial 2-1-1 to find help and services they need in the community. Whether it's home support services, subsidized accommodation or a centre to meet others, seniors can dial 2-1-1 to get the information they are seeking. The call is free, confidential, multilingual and available 24/7.

The Rotary Club of White Rock joined forces with BC211 to produce the magnets which are available through numerous organizations and churches on the peninsula including Sources Community Resource Centres, Come Share, Fraser Health, Kent Street Centre and CARP.

The magnet is the brainchild of White Rock Rotarians Don Jones and Linda Sinclair. Both are retired and were looking at volunteer options involving seniors. Joining forces, they found there were many service providers in the community to help seniors with problems ranging from overcoming isolation to avoiding abuse to staying at home longer, but finding this information was confusing and overwhelming to seniors as well as to family and caregivers.

"We found it was not easy for seniors to seek the help or advice they wanted or needed," says Don Jones.

"Looking for a simple way to access all these valuable services that are available, Linda and I did some research, found BC211, paid them a visit, and things snowballed from there."

Myrna Holman, Director of BC211, agreed that Rotary is a trusted brand amongst seniors and that partnering to get the 211 message out to seniors was a very good idea. Thus, the magnet with the Rotary Wheel, a world-wide recognized and trusted symbol, was born. As well as the Rotary Wheel, the magnet bears the BC211 logo and the United Way logo. The United Way of the Lower Mainland provides funding for BC211 as part of its Building Stronger Communities foundational strategy, which focuses on removing barriers for vulnerable populations and supporting poverty reduction information and referral services, and crisis and volunteers centres.

"Dialing 211 helps link people rapidly and easily to the services they need, avoiding the stress and confusion of searching for programs and services," says Rotarian Linda Sinclair. "We are happy to be partnering with BC211 to help seniors in our community and beyond find social, community and government services."

Currently, BC211 provides services to communities in the Metro Vancouver, Fraser Valley and Squamish-Lillooet Regional Districts.

Certified Information and Referral Specialists help callers to determine their needs and options when they dial 2-1-1. These Specialists are trained to ascertain which programs and services the caller is eligible for, to handle crisis calls and to advocate on behalf of the caller if needed. Calls to 211 are free; services are multilingual and available 24 hours per day, seven days a week. By simply dialing 2-1-1, callers can easily find the resources in their area that are most appropriate to their situation. A call to 211 is a confidential call. Telephones do not have call display, and I&R Specialists do not ask for any identifying information, beyond what is needed to find appropriate services (usually age, gender, and community).

In Our Own Words Uganda: The Pearl of Africa

Sir Winston Churchill, said to have designated Uganda "The Pearl of Africa," is also reputed to have said the soil in Uganda is so fertile that if he stuck his walking cane in the ground in the morning, it would have taken root by evening.

My visit to Uganda began in Kampala after a flight from Ethiopia, where I had just participated in a National Immunization Day (NID) near the Sudanese border. I had offered my services to the cadre since I was already scheduled to be in Africa, and was pleased to be given an assignment to perform an interim monitor evaluation of a Health, Hunger and Humanity (3-H) Grant that was approved to provide educational and humanitarian aid to orphans and microcredit assistance to adults with HIV/AIDS. The microcredit portion of this project was of great interest to me as a retired banker

I was picked up by a local Rotarian who drove me across the equator into Southern Uganda and to the site of the project. Over the next three days, I was shown the benefits provided to some of the poorest people on the African continent by this 3-H grant. The people may be poor, but they certainly do not lack resourcefulness.

I met a young single mother who borrowed 100,000 shillings (US\$40) through the microcredit program, bought a pregnant sow, and then over the subsequent two years turned that investment into a small piggery with a young boar, a sow, and five piglets. In addition to that, by selling her piglets,

she has opened a small village store with a wide variety of items for sale. Her "empire" is now valued at more than 1 million shillings (US\$400). By western standards this may not seem like a fortune, but by Ugandan standards she is rich beyond belief. Her son will most likely have a much better chance at advancement in Uganda than he would have previously.

The second day of my visit, I was introduced to some of the 38 members of the Rotary Community Corps (RCC). The vice president of the group made a 15-minute presentation to the assembled Rotarians to provide an update on their successes and plans for the future. I discovered that the woman who made the presentation had been illiterate when the RCC was formed and had never before spoken in public. Amazing, to say the least.

The following day, we met at a school where we had a chance to visit with some of the students who benefit from the educational portion of the project. They are provided with tuition fees,

uniforms, and school supplies, none of which they would be able to afford without the help of Rotary.

My first visit to Africa had it all.

Rotary rocks!
