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Thailand & Children's School Program

I was in and out of BKK last week (2 days) and have been traveling around the northern and northeastern provinces visiting schools ever since. Last week looked like BKK would be spared the worse of it, but now it looks like they won't. Water is slowly creeping into the inner city and my apartment (and area) is only a few kilometers away from the water with nothing in between to stop it from coming in. Luckily I live on the higher floods so there will be no damage to my personal property, but living in BKK might not be possible for a while (1-2 months according to various reports).

I encountered no problems traveling around most of BKK, but the tap water was suspicious (in both smell and colour) even though the government claims it is still safe to drink. Drinking water is unavailable at any 7/11 or grocery store that I went to. However, I did see several big trucks parked in front of my 7/11 selling 10 Baht per litre bottle water for 40-50 Baht, depending on the customers. When I was in Chiang Mai on the 3 to 6th, I saw many 7/11 short of bottled water too. It seems entrepreneurial types and buying all the retail bottled water and driving 700 kilometes to BKK to sell it for 4-5 times the price. Nice huh?

Water is not lapping at the second BTS station on the Sukumvit line (Saphan Kwaii station) and the JJ weekend market is now flooded. The airport is dry and from all accounts should survive (as an island) even in the worst case scenario. So people visiting Thailand (but not BKK) will still/should be able to fly to their destination of choice without too many problems.

The main problem now is political bickering and posturing. This is contributing to the flooding and high levels of stress from constantly receiving conflicting information from different government sources. Even my level headed thinking western friends with Thai families are showing signs of stress and frustrations. Those that can afford have moved to higher and dryer grounds...those that can will have to deal with whatever comes their way.

I wish I could be more informative than this but I really, really don't know who to believe. The only certainty with regards to the flooding is what we can see with our own eyes each day, and the situation seems to be getting worse, not better. IMHO, if BKK floods, it could take longer to clean up than most fear. The Thai government is saying one month, but Honda stated last week that they expect they will need 6 months to get their factories back to pre-flooding production once the water has left the plants. Nakon Sawan which was flooded a month ago is now only getting some of it's streets water free (and that's only the water. The clean up has just now started).

Knowing the kind hearts of Rotarians, I am sure some members will feel the urge to help. There is a lot of fraudulent activity going so please be careful. As a matter of fact, as I am writing this email sitting in front of my hotel room TV, the news is discussing the grafting and corruptions associated with the distribution of survival kits (i.e. 800 Baht kits with only 300 – 500 Baht of items in them). So if your members are interested, I know of one charity in the Koong /Toey slums of BKK run by Father Joe. He has been working in Thailand for over 40 years and is sort of famous with the expat community here for his work (and in many instances, famous overseas with some Rotary clubs too). He is one stubborn Irish priest who has put his entire life into helping the orphans of this slum. He sent out an email (begging for help) via the Thai Canadian Chamber of Commerce. I have verified that the email was in fact sent out via the Chamber. Every dollar given to this charity will reach the kids. I will forward that email to you and you can decide what to do with it.

Never a dull moment in this country. Maybe that is why I am love working here regardless of the discriminations and many hurdles one faces as an expat working here.

Here is the email I received from the TCCC last week regarding Father Joe that I mentioned in my previous email. This guy is legit and the money WILL go a long way to help these children. Direct deposits/transfers from overseas will not touch the hands of any Thai middlemen. This is the **only** sort of organization in Thailand that I recommend to anyone.

There will be a \$25 charge for transferring money from a Canadian bank to an overseas bank, so you may want to have one club collect the money and making one large weekly transfer.

Thailand & Children's School Program (continued)

The following is an email from "Father Joe" in Thailand....

I promised a 'flood update' in a few hours to you good folks with email My apologies to you my brothers and sisters whom I didn't then send a letter by ordinary mail. Anyway, the email, was four days ago when I wrote you all that our Charity 30 Oct Teenage Rock Stars Concert... was... to use an American Baseball term: "Cancelled because of rain." (flooding really). Today the flood picture is a bit more in focus. Here goes.

For the next four days of high sea tides... when...if... the sea water gates are opened, then the sea water flows into our almost below sea-level Bangkok city. We now wait as the flood waters continue to arrive - flowing down in huge volume from the North.

As I write this, eleven Slums where we have shack/school kindergartens are under a meter of water or will be so in a matter of days or hours, where also so many of our staff live. Not to speak of the children who attend our slum/shack schools.

It is an absolute fact that Bangkok is now flooding - flooded - & will continue to flood - as this huge mass of water flows through and around Bangkok into the Sea. Thus, over one thousand slum kindergarten children who attend our schools live in now flooded shacks - living helter-skelter. Their slums, and thus our kindergartens will be flooded for the next two months. At least so the weather man tells us. Plus another month to repair the school & their shacks back to normal. Most of our slum neighbors, especially the elderly, are living in retched conditions - refuse to leave their homes, some from nostalgia, but most from fear of theft. It is a horrible fact here that "flood" theft is as rampant as the waters themselves.

Now let me say clearly that today, here in Klong Toey in our Mercy Centre, we are not yet flooded. Will be flooded? Maybe not. Maybe yes. But the road in front of our Mercy Centre will certainly have a meter of water - garbage filled water stagnant for a couple months. Our Mercy Centre is one meter above road level. However, the 4 slums around us are even lower than road level. Road Level is the same as normal Chao Phaya River water level and although we are two hundred meters from the River - there are no barriers between us and the River. No dikes, no flood gates.

I must add something here and this is so important. We are not closing our schools for 2 - 3 months. We will not let these kids miss 3 months of school because this kindergarten time is such an important part of their education. What are we going to do? Right now, at this minute, I don't know. But do believe me, in a couple weeks, all these kids will be back in school, somehow, someway. We will spend what money we have to do this for our kids. I live and die by my word.

These kids, plus their teachers so many of whom are also flooded out, will soon go back to school and the teachers will teach. All of you who are all in our Mercy family now reading this please do help us. And if you can't, then say some powerful and intense prayers for us. How will we get our one thousand slum kids back to school? As I said above. I don't know how, at this moment as I write this, but believe me..., oh yes, we will...

The price of eggs! Last week half a dozen eggs cost 60 cents USD, and today, it's One Dollar & fifty cents USD for that same half dozen eggs !!! Stores? They are pretty much sold-out and can't get in new supplies!!!! .We have stock-piled enough rice for two weeks to feed our 65 HIV/AIDS kids and the other 140 street/slum/orphan kids & 30 bed ridden HIV/AIDS patients who live with us. We have instant noodles for the kids on the streets. We have prepared our Mercy Centre, much as we can. For Grannies & their grandchildren and especially the HIV/AIDS infirm who will need a place to stay. Over 400 Commercial Bank outlets are closed. We are hurrying-scurrying to get our payroll out as I write this today, so the staff can still go to the big banks to get their monthly salaries.

On a wider scale, The major flood relief centres on the outskirts of Bangkok are now closed and the 9,000 people who a week ago - took shelter in these relief centres, including those who are hospitalized have been moved elsewhere because the centres are flooded. All 12 industrial estates around Bangkok are flooded, thus more than 600,000 people have been laid off. The military are doing first rate service with thousands of sand bags - shoring up broken water walls - rescuing people and puppy dogs and kitty cats.

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This is now a disaster of tsunami proportions. What do we need? Think of it this way, let's send a child back to school. So... a pair of school shoes, a school uniform. A book bag, pencils and notebooks. Even a Teddy Bear for the smaller children! A wooden board to repair the floor in a school. A can of paint. A couple of wood 2 x 4's for a door frame - a chair to sit on. A new gas burner stove to cook on.

Anything to re-stock - to re-store. Again, I shall be brazen and send you our bank account number. Never, in my life as a priest of over 45 years have I ever asked for anything for myself, and I shall not start doing so now, but I am not ashamed to beg for our kids, and that is what I am doing now. Begging for our kids - who are part of all our Mercy Family - yours and mine.

Help save the *Generations of Hope* orphanage (Haiti)

We are contacting you at this time in response to an urgent need that is threatening the survival of a Haitian orphanage. The name of the orphanage is *Generations of Hope* and it is situated near Port-au-prince, Haiti. We participated in the initial setup of the orphanage during a 2 week visit this past May. We have also contributed, along with a great number of others, to fundraising efforts here in Canada.

At this time, the situation in Haiti is quite different than many people may be aware of. While literally billions of dollars have been contributed to relief efforts, a very small percentage of those funds have yet to have been used to directly help the Haitian people. In fact, in some ways the relief impact has produced negative results. For example, with a near 200% increase in the number of NGO's (nongovernment organizations) working in Haiti (post quake), millions of dollars have been spent on administration and the effects on inflation have been dramatic. For example: rental vehicles, water, and land prices have more than doubled or tripled in some cases.

So here's how this is our problem. While GOH (*Generations of Hope*) has placed a large deposit on the land it currently resides upon, the balance remains unpaid. Due to the enormous financial backing of some NGO's, we are at risk of losing the land to an organization that is prepared to pay double the land value to the current owner. If we do not produce \$100,000USD by year-end, we may lose the orphanage. This would likely force the children back on to the streets and put them at risk of sexual abuse, kidnapping, child slavery, disease, and malnutrition. Additionally, we would lose all that we have worked toward (both time and money). The neighborhood would also lose a food program that feeds hundreds of homeless children every week. For those that are willing to support, this is a truly unique opportunity. With no administration costs, nearly 100% of contributed funds reach the orphanage. We may lose 3-4% in exchange rates and transfer fees.

Our purpose is not solely to ask for financial aid for this project (although that would be great!), but also to network with individuals who may have experience in this type of work or who may know someone working in Haiti. At this time, personal connections are so vital; it could be all that we need to save GOH. We would be happy to speak personally with any individual or group willing to help.

We have registered charitable accounts in both Canada and the U.S. and issue tax receipts.
