
Message from the District Governor



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A CLEAN BILL OF HEALTH FOR LOUIS

AS A ROTARIAN, LOUIS FORTIN
has been raising money for Peace Arch
Hospital and thinking he was doing it
for the community. But two years ago, it
became personal. That's when he found
out he had bladder cancer. "I am in my
60s. I am fit and... thought I was very
healthy," said Fortin. "So I was shocked
when I heard Dr. Skepasts say, "You have
bladder cancer." Since his diagnosis,
Louis has had multiple surgeries and so
many cystoscopes he has lost count.

He is not alone; bladder cancer is the second most common cancer found in men. The Hospital's urologists Drs. Skepasts and Kwan perform approximately 25 cystoscopes per week at Peace Arch Hospital.

In the fall of 2010, the Foundation appealed to the community to invest in new equipment for the Hospital's urology department. A relatively new technology used by urologists has been enhanced to make what is usually a very uncomfortable medical procedure more comfortable for patients. The instrument

is a second-generation video cystoscope, which is primarily used to detect and sometimes treat bladder cancer. Together, six of these instruments cost approximately \$100,000.

The Foundation is pleased to report that the campaign met its goal and six new second-generation cystoscopes are now in use at Peace Arch Hospital.

"People's generosity – through the Foundation – has done so much for my patients," says Dr. Skepasts. "Donations have made ours one of the best equipped urology departments in a community hospital in Canada and it helps us recruit and retain outstanding specialists to work at our hospital."



FROM THE MUSIC DIRECTOR The music I commissioned to be composed for the "Remembering 911" event, by my music colleague Rick Vale, I have just received. I have finished listening and working through the full orchestra and chorus music of September Requiem. What a gift we have been given. This really does need to be heard by the world. I am really falling short on words that can adequately describe the inner feeling and the mental place where I am right now. I have been working on this project since the fall of 2007. It is just past 4:00 AM and I am tired. All minor effects, compared to the feeling of being completely relaxed following such a superior "Sonic Bath".

Rick has truly honored those who lost their lives in the infamous attacks of September 11, 2001. His work is breathtaking, exhilarating and restful. The first melody is a Tenor Saxophone solo playing a theme that represents Tower one. This is followed by the Oboe and supporting string section playing a second theme that represents Tower Two. These two themes are found in threads, woven throughout the Requiem. Symbolically there are also 11 different movements, Rick has used the text and order of the traditional Requiem, and written in a contemporary style that is inspiring, moving and sensitive

In my "Directors Notes" in the program, I open with, The time that we set aside today is not a time for politics, nor is it designed to be a religious moment. Rather, it is a time that we as a community, in solemn reverence, acknowledge that on September 11, 2001, lives were lost, lives were saved, lives were changed ...forever. I am completely confident that as we as a community of both performers and audience come together for Remembering 911, our lives will be changed.



District Homelessness Grant

The mission of this matching grant is twofold. We want to provide matching funds to clubs for projects that will help end family homelessness in our region. Secondly, as Rotarians, we are seeking to become better educated in this serious local issue. This \$100,000.00 funding came through a dialog that began in the strong of 2010 with the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation. These discussions included our neighbouring Districts (District 5020 and District 5030). All three of these Rotary Districts applied for a grant and each of our Districts were successful.

This is an important distinction, a grant was awarded to District 5050 and the grant we are discussing is a grant from District 5050 to successful grant applying clubs. The Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation have strict guidelines that prohibit our clubs from suggesting they have been awarded funding from the Gates Foundation. Please keep this in mind with regards to PR or any presentations at your club meetings.

Duck Race Raises \$70,000

On July 31 the Meadow Ridge Rotary Club held its first Annual Duck Race and, much to our surprise, raised over \$70,000 to enable our local youth to participate in the sport of their choice. Tickets were \$10 and sold like hotcakes. Rather than saddle only the club members with selling the lottery tickets, something most of us loathe, we engaged the leadership of all local youth organizations and committed to have a minimum of \$5 per ticket sold return to their group. We were aiming to sell 5000 tickets to make it a worthwhile undertaking, but ended up selling 7000.



The result is that \$25,000 will go to the local Kidsport group and all the other clubs will get the full amount of \$10 per ticket sold to support their organization. The feedback has been more than positive. "It beats car washes and bottle drives" was one quote. The preparations involved the majority of our Rotary club members, but all of us had fun and are proud to have taken a part in greatly lessening the financial worries of many of our local youth organizations and in keeping our youth off the streets and help them become good citizens.
