## Update on PolioPlus in Pakistan

I'm writing to update you on the current status of polio eradication in Pakistan. You have likely seen news reports regarding a possible ban on polio vaccine by the Taliban in a small region of the country, resistance, and most recently, the tragic news of injuries of WHO staff in Karachi.

Here are some key points:

Recent actions have complicated the polio eradication situation in Pakistan, but they did not create it. There are anecdotes of very isolated impact of these stories on the polio vaccination campaigns and there is some evidence that rates of vaccine refusal are due to these stories. A dialogue has been instigated to overcome the situation as the program has had to do in many countries over the years.

The real barriers however to eradicating polio in Pakistan are a lack of accountability, poor management of the program, some corruption at local levels and insecurity in specific areas of the country. However with a huge increase of WHO and UNICEF staff all of these problems are undoubtedly diminishing.

### Polio in Pakistan in 2012

Pakistan is one of the last polio reservoirs of Asia. In 2012, Pakistan has reported 22 cases (compared to 59 cases at same period in 2011). Pakistan is also the only remaining reservoir of type 3 polio in all of Asia. In 2011, polio spread internationally from Pakistan to cause an outbreak in China's western Xinjiang province.

But despite this, Pakistan this year has perhaps the best chance ever to achieve success, because tremendous new efforts are being undertaken, led by the Government of Pakistan in implementing a national polio emergency action plan that mobilized all government and civil society resources.

There is strong evidence that implementation of the emergency plan is showing results, particularly in key reservoir areas such as Balochistan (Quetta area) and Sindh (greater Karachi and northern Sindh).

#### Rotary's Work in Pakistan

Through the work of Rotary National PolioPlus Chair Aziz Memon and many Rotary clubs throughout the country who are organising walks, town meetings, health camps, and advocating to local government authorities, there is still plenty of good news to share regarding Rotary's fight against polio in Pakistan.

#### WHO statement on serious security incident in Karachi, Pakistan

On the morning on 17 July 2012, a serious security incident took place in Gadap Town, Karachi, Pakistan, involving World Health Organization (WHO) staff. One WHO staff member and one international consultant were injured, when their vehicle was shot at by armed men.

The two men working for WHO are in stable condition. WHO is grateful to the Pakistani medical professionals for the rapid and high-quality medical aid provided.

Both men were supporting the currently-ongoing polio National Immunization Days (NIDs). At this point, there is no evidence to suggest that this was a deliberate or targeted attack against polio eradication efforts or WHO. WHO is grateful to the Pakistan authorities for launching an investigation into this event, to determine more clearly the circumstances.

Incidents like these highlight the incredible bravery of the more than 200,000 mainly Pakistani volunteers who run every vaccination campaign. The vaccinators, social mobilizers and frontline staff are the heroes of this campaign.

WHO, UNICEF and all polio partners remain committed to supporting the Government of Pakistan and the people of Pakistan in their efforts to eradicate polio. This incident will not distract from the progress Pakistan is making this year, as the country is closer than ever to eradication.




## 2012 Delta Half Marathon

## White Rockers on a Pilgrimage; Trekking the Camino de Santiago de Compostela

White Rock, BC – July 31, 2012 - Fellow White Rock Club Rotarians Bonnie Goodwin and Ramona Kaptyn returned from Spain recently jubilant that they had walked the Camino de Santiago conquering mountains, mud, rain and injury. They completed 666 KM in 40 days and Bonnie raised \$2000 in pledges for PolioPlus, an International Rotary program for the eradication of polio worldwide. Thanks to Rotary and its partners, the world has seen polio cases plummet by more than 99 percent, preventing five million instances of child paralysis and 250,000 deaths. When Rotary began its eradication work, polio infected more than 350,000 children annually. In 2009, fewer than 1,700 cases were reported worldwide, mostly in Pakistan and Africa.

"But this is still too many," says Bonnie. "Rotary is calling on everyone to contribute to banish this dreadful disease to the history books once and for all and I wanted to be one of the contributors."

The Camino de Santiago is one of the most important pilgrimages in Christendom; the others are to Jerusalem and Rome. It is over 1,000 years old and is walked by thousands of people from all over the world yearly, not only for religious reasons but for spiritual, meditative, accomplishment and other.

"The Camino is also known as 'The Way' and it is an excellent metaphor for life," says Bonnie. "I've done it twice and feel I got it right the second time around."

The women say they saw the wealth of centuries along the route, not only in architecture and art, but in the customs, celebrations and cuisine of the people of Basque Country and Galicia. There are several different ways or trails; Bonnie and Ramona took the Camino Frances, diverting briefly to the Camino Primitivo after Bonnie twisted her ankle in Leon. They stopped at various cities along the route including Pamplona, famous for the 'running of the bulls' and Ernest Hemingway; Burgos, famous for El Cid; and the ancient walled city of Lugo.

"My favourite spot was atop the 777 metre Alto del Perdon or Mount of Forgiveness," says Ramona. "The Camino follows The Milky Way and this is where The Path of the Wind crosses the Path of the Stars. It was a breathtaking catharsis but my feet have still not forgiven me."

Bonnie and Ramona add there are two major highlights of the Camino. One is reaching Santiago de Compostela and seeing the magnificent baroque cathedral where the bones of Jesus' Apostle St. James are buried beneath the altar and the other is going on to Finesterre which is about 90 KM from Santiago. People believed Finisterre was the end of the world before Christopher Columbus discovered America.

Bonnie will be leaving her wine making business soon to spend more time working on Rotary projects and Ramona is the Incoming Chair of the White Rock/Surrey Chapter of CARP – A New Vision of Aging for Canada. CARP is no longer an acronym and is not for retired people only. It welcomes everyone from their 40s to their 90s.
