Rotarians At Work Day happens the last Saturday in April each year - this year the date is April 26, 2014

The program started in 2006 as a joint effort between two Rotary Districts (one in the United States and one in Mexico)

Rotarians at Work Day continues to grow - currently with 44 participating Districts, 2,830 clubs and almost 110,000 Rotarians.

Each year, Clubs around the world identify a hands-on project that all members can participate in to help their local community.

What Are The Benefits?

Rotarians At Work Day is a great way to revitalize your Club, bring in new members and generate publicity for Rotary

What To Do:

Pick a project – The idea of Rotarians at Work Day is to get all your members out in your local community on a visible, hands-on project. Your project may involve other community volunteers (Future Rotarians), your Interact Club or Rotaract Club (Future Rotarians). Involve your children! (Future Rotarians!)

Publicize your project – Plan a public relations campaign to let your community know when the event will occur and how they can become involved.

Put on Your Rotary Gear – On project day, dress all of your members and volunteers in Rotary shirts and hats. Make your team stand out by having a "uniform" look for the day.

Application Process Open for 2015 Rotary Peace Fellowships

The Rotary Foundation has announced a unique opportunity for international study. Information and application form are available from the Rotary web-site at www.rotary.org/en/peacefellowships

Studies are in peace and conflict resolution at the master's degree level (15 to 24 months) and professional development certificate level (3 months). The Fellowship includes tuition and fees, room and board, round-trip transportation, and internship/field study expenses. Candidates should have a bachelor's degree or equivalent in a related field, a minimum of 3 years full-time paid or unpaid work experience for the master's degree program or for the certificate program, a minimum of 5 years experience (paid or unpaid). The certificate program may be of interest to first responders and emergency personnel.

Potential applicants should fill out an application form and submit it to his/her area Rotary club (address available at www.rotary.org). The Rotary Peace Scholarship Committee contact person in Rotary District 5050 (northwest Washington/Fraser Valley British Columbia) is Committee Chair Jack Rae, at bettyjackrae@shaw.ca. Applications must be submitted to their local Rotary club by 1 May 2014.

The applications must be forwarded to Jack Rae by 15 May 2014. The committee must send their recommendations to Rotary International by 1 July 2014.


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



District 5050 Rotarian Earns President's Volunteer Service Award

SARASOTA, Fla., April 1, 2014 – As National Volunteer Week, April 6-12, approaches, Connie Lewis, a member of the Rotary Club of Everett Port Gardner of Rotary District 5050, has been recognized by President Obama and humanitarian organization, ShelterBox USA with the President's Volunteer Service Award for her efforts in 2013 to assist disaster survivors.

When disasters like Typhoon Haiyan in the Philippines and the Syrian refugee crisis strike, many want to help. Lewis took action for <u>ShelterBox</u>, an international disaster relief organization that delivers <u>emergency tented shelter and other lifesaving supplies</u> to survivors of disasters and other humanitarian crises.

Through Lewis's efforts of raising awareness and funds for ShelterBox, the organization was able to respond to more than 25 disasters in 19 countries last year, providing families with disaster relief tents, cook stoves, water filters, blankets, mosquito nets, children's packs and other essential equipment. In one of the longest responses in ShelterBox history, ShelterBox has sent aid to support over 5,000 families affected by the Syrian crisis in Syria, Iraqi Kurdistan, Lebanon and Jordan. Already in country, ShelterBox was able to respond immediately when Typhoon Haiyan hit and have distributed shelters and other supplies to help 5,900 families to date.

"I am incredibly honored to work alongside our volunteers, including Connie," said Emily Sperling, president of ShelterBox USA. "It is through their continuous efforts that we are able to bring shelter, warmth and dignity to so many families displaced by disaster around the globe."

The President's Volunteer Service Award is a special recognition presented on behalf of President Barack Obama. The award is part of a national recognition program created in 2003 through the President's Council on Service and Civic Participation for individuals of all ages who contribute a significant amount of time to volunteer activities.

Rotary International President Ron Burton receives PolioPlus Tie from the Stanwood/Camano Island Rotary Club

Back on February 10th, I met with Rachel Greenhoe, Annual Giving Officer, Zones 24 & 32 and Dean Rohrs, the new Regional Rotary Foundation Coordinator for Zone 24 West, for lunch and to go over ideas for increasing Rotary Foundation giving.

I told them about one of the Stanwood/Camano Island, WA Rotary club's projects, to raise funds for Polio eradication, by selling PolioPlus ties and scarves for \$30.00 each. I often wear them to Rotary meetings and that I had clients that had asked me about the ties, when we got together for financial review meetings. I found out that some of my clients were Polio survivors or had family members that had experienced Polio.

As a result, our club has received a couple thousand in donations toward Polio, from outside of the club and that we have sold more than 100 PolioPlus ties and scarves throughout District 5050. In addition, we are helping to make people aware of Rotary's efforts to eradicate Polio.

According to the 2012-2013 Rotary International Annual Report from 2013-2018, every \$1 Rotary commits to direct support for Polio immunization will be matched 2 to 1 (up to \$35 Million per year) by the Gates Foundation. If fully realized, the joint effort - called End Polio Now - Make History Today - will result in \$525 million for Polio eradication.

I gave Rachel one of the Polio Plus scarves and requested that she present a PolioPlus tie to Rotary International President, Ron Burton and to get a picture, if possible. Rachel sent me this picture for the Stanwood/Camano Island Rotary club's newsletter and for the D5050 Peace Arch Journal.
